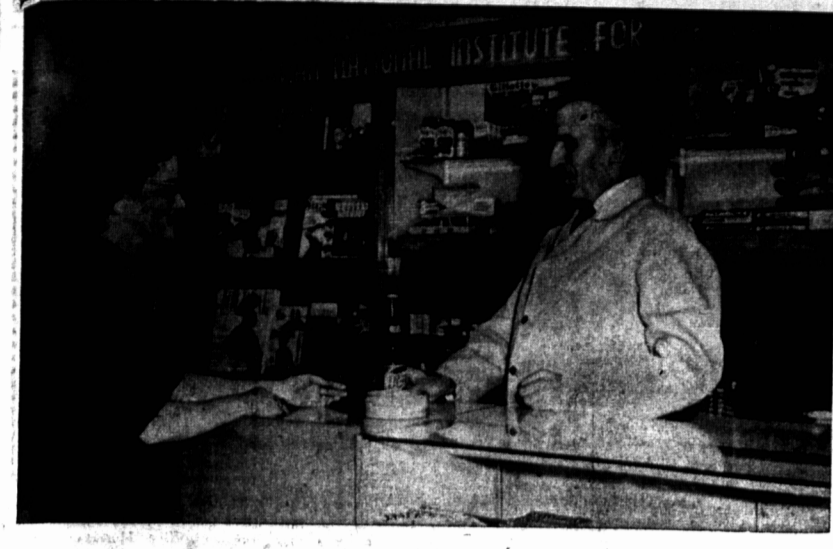


Fire Levels Sawmill At Bridgetown, N.S.

TO OPEN NEW C. N. I. B. CANTEEN

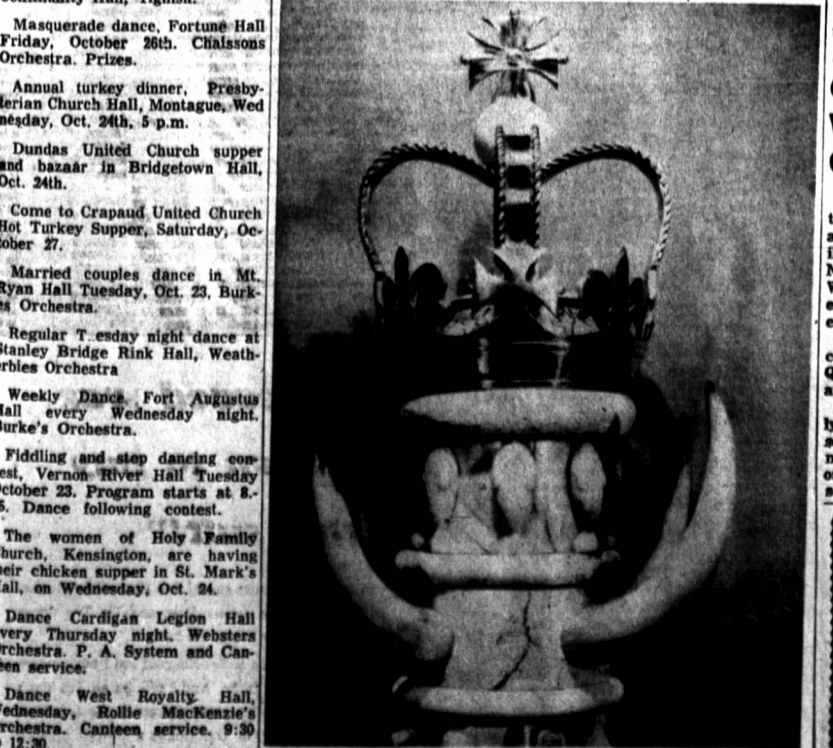
The Charlottetown Hospital Canteen shown above is similar to the one that will be opened in the near future in the new Confederation Building in Charlottetown. The above canteen was the first of this type to be installed in P. E. I. in Feb. 1950 by the C. N. I. B. and has been operated since 1953 by the above operator. The well appointed and well stocked canteen is capably managed by Mr. Peter McGarry with the supervision of the Institute, and serves not only the staff and patients at the Hospital but having tuck shop facilities for them right in the building, but makes it possible for a sightless citizen of this Island to earn an independent livelihood. The operator lost his sight through an accident on his father's farm while still a young man. He received his training in one of the three canteens which the C. N. I. B. operates in the Charlottetown area. Not only does Mr. McGarry buy and sell a large variety of soft drinks, cigarettes, confectionery, magazines, etc., but he keeps his own accounts by using Braille, which was taught him at the Halifax School for the Blind. The Hospital Board and the Canadian National Institute for the Blind are justly proud of this canteen and the opportunity it has afforded for one of the 178 blind of this Island to become a self supporting citizen. There are at present 47 such canteens in the Maritimes, which give full or part time employment to 62 men and women under the supervision of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, and sites are constantly being sought for the installation of more canteens in public and private buildings. With the support of the citizens of this province, the employment services of the Institute can be expanded, so that more blind men and women of P. E. I. will be able to find happiness and some freedom from the limitations of their handicap. The public will be supporting this service and the many other light giving services of the C. N. I. The Academy Of Notre Dame Celebrates Its Centenary

This year marks the 100th anniversary of Notre Dame Academy, Charlottetown. Over the long years this fine old institution has woven into the history of its existence varied threads of sunshine and shadow, many of which are unknown to the present generation. "It was with this thought in mind that we opened the pages of its annals faithfully kept from the beginning and gathered there from some interesting facts. These we plan to publish in serial form, so that friends of Notre Dame and the public at large, will be well acquainted with its past. Notre Dame Academy was founded in 1857 by His Lordship Bishop Bernard MacDonald, who brought the first Sisters to Charlottetown on September 25. "For a long time I have wanted a house of education in my diocese directed by religious, in order to provide young girls of the parish of Charlottetown and those of country parishes when possible, the advantage of a polite education coupled with moral and religious training," he told the Reverend Superior General of the Congregation of Notre Dame in Montreal when he asked her for Sisters to open a convent in far-away Charlottetown. The Superior General, a zealous woman, ever anxious to extend the kingdom of God graciously acceded to the Bishop's request and sent four members of her Community. Sister St. Eulalia, Sister St. Pulcheria, Sister St. Felicitia and Sister St. Claire. The distance between Montreal and Charlottetown a hundred years ago seemed insurmountably far, rather than it is in our day of fleet winged planes and fast-moving locomotives. The Sisters left Montreal on September 16th, and arrived in Charlottetown ten days later. Their trip by land and water contacted such places as St. Hyacinthe, Portland, St. John and Shediac. Discomfort, delays and fatigue were constantly with them along the way, but all were forgotten when they disembarked at Charlottetown, their "land of promise" at four o'clock in the morning. NEW CHAPEL On the Feast of the Presentation, November 21, His Lordship Bishop MacDonald blessed the new Chapel which he dedicated, to the Immaculate Heart of Mary and offered Holy Mass to draw down God's blessings on the scholastic future of the institution. As we cannot help but remark the tangible proofs of those blessings so richly bestowed on the humble beginning of this apostolic endeavor. The entry for July 15 of that same year gives a detailed account of the first Closing Exercises. As was the custom, these took the form of a public examination at which four hundred people attended. His Lordship, twelve priests, Governor Daly and his family distinguished the gathering. As there was no room in the Academy large enough to hold this number, the exercises were held outside under an awning spread along the southern wall of the school building where a grassy slope fell gently away to the South. "The pupils acquitted themselves with such facility and perfection that both examiners and the audience were astonished at the progress they had made. This eulogy from the humble pen of the first analyst seems to re-echo even to our times, when Notre Dame Academy has secured for itself a place among the best of our Island institutions of education.

It was ordered by Mr. Massey for presentation to the council, it was made by Eskimon out of narwhal tusk, whale bone, musk-ox horns, gold, coppers, and incised brass.

Long-time objective of automotive engineers, Ramjet fuel injection will be introduced on the Corvette engine, a lively new V8 of 233-horsepower that is to be available as an option throughout the line of Chevrolet passenger cars. The 1957 Chevrolets go on display at dealer showrooms shortly. Also to be unveiled for the first time is the new transmission, known as Turboglide. In eye-appeal and physical appearance, the 1957 Chevrolets differ strikingly from the 1956 models. While two and one-half inch until the present time have been true and loyal friends of Notre Dame. These weeks of general hard work fatigue and sacrifice - but they were rewarding weeks, for by October 12th, all was in readiness for the first opening of classes. Almost a hundred times since have the welcoming portals of this venerable Academy swung open in hospitable invitation to the pupils who presented themselves on opening day. At no time, however, were pupils more kindly and lovingly welcomed, as were the seven boarders and eight day scholars who, on that memorable date, were privileged to call themselves "the first pupils of Notre Dame." Within a short time the number increased so rapidly that the good Sisters were assured that the future was secure.

Common to the design of all passenger cars is a rugged front end that combines a massive guard and bumper ensemble with an aluminum grille screen and set parking lamps. Hood-shaped wind splits on the hood add a touch of modernity. However, most of the duplication in the appearance between the three series ends here. Chevrolet again offers exclusive exteriors and interiors in each of its series. In respect to the mechanical advances on the new Chevrolets Ramjet fuel injection replaces the customary carburetor. Because of quicker power response and faster warm-up, it is expected to gain wide adoption within a few years. It carries the principle of torque conversion - first introduced in Chevrolet's Powerglide in 1950 - to a new peak in efficiency. The triple turbine - with infinitely variable ratio characteristics - produces an uninterrupted driving force at all speeds. There is no feeling of "shift" at any level. Incorporating an unusual "hill retarder", Turboglide is included in a choice of 22 power trains, suggestive of the customized trend that has so greatly influenced passenger car models in recent years. Chevrolet offers 20 different models for its 1957 passenger car line-up with the widest color choice in its history - a total of 460 model color combinations compared with 364 at the outset of 1956 production. Of the 17 exterior colors, seven are new. The following body styles will be available in the 1957 Chevrolet: BEL-AIR - Two and four door sedans, two-door sport coupe, four-door sport sedan, Nomad station wagon and four-door, six-passenger station wagon. TWO-TEN - Two and four-door sedans, two-door club and sport coupe, four door sport sedan and four-door six-passenger station wagons, and four-door nine-passenger station wagon. ONE-FIFTY - Two and four-door sedans, utility sedans and two-door six-passenger station wagon. CORVETTE - Two passenger sport model with manual or automatic fabric top or solid plastic top. Although the 1957 Chevrolet boasts a number of improvements that will enhance the comfort and safety of driving, major interest of the chassis story is found in the greatest variety of power plants ever produced by a low price car builder.
