THE RIFLE.—The result of the recent telegraphic matches has been made public. In the teams of ten men, for which twenty prizes were offered, the 20th Batt., Georgetown, Ont., takes first prize, with a total of 4,200 points; 96th Batt., Port Arthur, second, 4,181; 13th Batt., Hamilton, third, 4,126. Last year's winners, the 54th Batt., Windsor Mills, take eighth place, with 4,076 points, and the 82nd Batt., Charlottetown, is twelfth on the list, with 3,917 points. The Island Artillery team occupies fifty-sixth place, with a score of 2,971, and the Engineers sixty-sixth, with 2,739. There were six competitions, and ninety-three teams faced the butts. Prizes were also offered for teams of twenty, thirty and forty men, and there were individual prizes, the latter being badges. The individual champion of the League is Lieut. Spearing, of the 53rd Batt., Sherbrooke, who made 455 points. He gets a special prize.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Captain West Killed. HALIFAX, Oct. 20. Captain West, of the Montreal barque Argentine, fell from the weather yard arm of his vessel on Saturday to the deck and was killed. The barque was off Bird Rock, Magdalen Islands, when the accident happened. Captain West had gone aloft to assist his men taking in the upper topsail yard. He belonged to Pictou and leaves a family of small children.

A Premier Resigns. LONDON, Oct. 20. News has been received here to the effect that Sir Henry Parkes, premier of New South Wales, has resigned as a result of the defeat of his Government last week on the labor bill. It is said that Sir Henry, owing to his advanced age, will retire to private life.

To be Transferred. OTTAWA, Oct. 20. A cable despatch says that in December the Imperial Government will transfer 700 men-of-war from England to the China Station via Halifax and the C. P. R. On their arrival at their destination the 700 men they will replace will return to England by the same route.

Sale of Steamers. HALIFAX, Oct. 20. Negotiations are about completed for the sale of the steamers Ulunda and Barcelons, to the Furness Line. These boats went ashore and were brought to this port and made as good as new in the dry dock.

Senecal Arrested. OTTAWA, Oct. 20. The first practical effect of the Government Act to prevent frauds on the Government was made to-day by the arrest of Senecal, who will be tried as soon as possible.

The Storm Continues. LONDON, Oct. 20. The gales which have raged on the British coast for a week continue with unabated fury. Storms are also sweeping over parts of Spain.

To Run For Cork. DUBLIN, Oct. 20. William Redmond has been selected as the Parrell candidate for the Parliamentary seat for Cork, made vacant by the death of Parnell.
