SUMMERSIDE'S ASSESSMENT.—The Summerside Town Council has just fixed the rate of Assessment on real estate for the current year. The per centage is \$5 on the \$1000. The amount of property returned by the assessors as within the town limits is \$1,342,011. The tax for last year was about \$1,244,788. The assessors have returned about 610 names as having to pay poll tax.

MORE CHEAP EXCURSIONS.—The Canadian Pacific Railway will run four cheap excursions to the Canadian Northwest from 11 points on the P. E. Island Railway, on June 13th, 20th, 27th, and July 18th, good for return in six weeks. This will enable parties to attend the land sale at Edmonton and the Winnipeg Agricultural and Industrial Exhibit. The rates for the round trip will be as follows: To Deloraine, Nesbitt, Ox Box, Boisassiette, and Mossomin, \$28 each; to Regina, Moose Jaw and Yorkton, \$30 each; to Prince Albert and Calgary, \$35 each; and to Edmonton, \$40 each.
