What About That Fence?

It is pleasing to note that the fountain on the Square has been repaired as a result of the efforts of Messrs. T. A. McLean and John Crockett, and that it will now be more beautiful to look at. But the fence around the Provincial Government's end of Queen Square continues to contrast most unfavorably with that which encloses the Dominion Government's building. We hope that the needed improvement will, as soon as possible, be attended to by the Commissioner of Public Works. From the economical point of view, it will be much better to have a permanent iron railing than a wooden fence liable to be broken and rotten; and from the aesthetic point of view the matter does not admit of a question. The extension of a good iron fence around its eastern side would make Queen Square very creditable to Charlottetown and the Province.

Notes and Comments.

The Government majority in the House of Commons, inclusive of the Speaker, is now 66, and is still increasing.

Advices from Cape Tormentine report that high winds have somewhat delayed the work of boring. But the borings have all been laid and one boring has been made to a depth of a hundred and one feet, the result fully establishing Mr. Bunn's estimate of the character of the strata.

Obituary.

It is our painful duty to-day to record the death of Mrs. J. B. Strong, which occurred at Summerside on the 15th inst. A correspondent writes: "The deceased was in the 50th year of her age, was a devout and exemplary member of the Roman Catholic Church, and leaves a sorrowing widower and five children to mourn the loss of an affectionate wife and mother. She bore her protracted illness with Christian resignation and the Divine Will, and in her last hours she was fortified with the sacraments of the Church to which she belonged. On the 17th inst. her remains were followed from her late dwelling in Summerside to St. Paul's Church by a large number of citizens, where a solemn High Mass of requiem was offered for the repose of her soul, after which the funeral cortege proceeded to the Roman Catholic cemetery, where her remains were interred. May her soul rest in peace."

The Lobster Fishery.

Recent advices report the lobster fishery at Cape Breton almost a failure in that section. Many of the factories have already closed and the pack has been much smaller than usual. Herring of excellent quality, large and fat, are abundant about Cape Breton. Mackerel have also struck in and are of large and good quality. We learn that lobster packers at Murray Harbor have closed down owing to want of fish, and all the packers on the eastern coast complain of poor fishing. Unless the Government give an extension of time until the 15th July there will be a serious loss to the packers and fishermen of King's County.

They are accompanied by Master Frank Creamer, of Williamsburg, son of Dr. Joseph Creamer, formerly of Charlottetown. Mr. John Coombs, one of Charlottetown's sport loving citizens, passed through Summerside on Thursday last, after enjoying some rare sport at Mr. David Milligan's, at the west of the Island. Besides a very fine sample of trout, of which he had some four or five dozen, he secured five wild geese out of a late flock that was decoyed by the decoy game at Mr. Milligan's place. This is something very unusual for this season of the year.—Agriculturist.

General Assembly.

(Special correspondence of The Examiner.)

On Monday the attention of the Assembly was occupied with the reports of its various theological colleges, which all, with the possible exception of Morrin College, Quebec, are in first-rate condition. These, with reports of various committees and some routine work, took up the forenoon and afternoon sessions. The evening was devoted to the report on French evangelization, which was more vigorously prosecuted and more heartily supported than in any previous year. The total amount received for carrying on the work in all its branches was \$56,500. The Point aux Trembles school for boys and girls, and the Coligny College for higher education of the girls, are steadily gaining ground. The report on the State of Religion, while dealing very fully with the obstructions and difficulties, both within and without the Church, was, upon the whole, decidedly cheering in its character.

Tuesday morning the debate on Queen's College was resumed, and after a most trenchant speech from Principal Grant the Assembly rejected the amendment to locking the College by a very large majority and adopted the report. It was, however, decided to look into the relationship of all the colleges to the church, so that the next General Assembly might be prepared to consider the question. Tuesday afternoon was taken up with a hot debate on a proposed summer session of Manitoba College. The object was set free a number of students for work in congregations and mission stations during the winter months when, under the present system, work is largely suspended. The scheme was opposed by many of the professors of colleges partly on the ground that they feared the educational training of our students might not be so thorough, and partly on the ground of increased expense. The Church and Assembly, however, are so fully determined on vigorous prosecution of work in the Northwest that Summer Session was carried by a large majority. The evening was devoted to an elaborate report on Sabbath Schools by Rev. T. F. Fotheringham, of St. John, N. B., and to the discussion of the Temperance report. The friends of temperance will be glad to know that this report was not merely sentimental, but gave facts and figures, from which marked progress could be seen. For the first time for many years, if not absolutely the first time in its history, this report was carried without a division, and the deliverance of the highest court of our church is not only practically but absolutely unanimous. This, of itself is a long step forward. It was further agreed that the church itself should in conjunction with other religious bodies take steps to represent the Prohibition side of the case before the Royal Commission, and that congregations be appealed to for funds necessary for that purpose. On Wednesday the Sabbath Observance report was presented and was spoken to by John Charlton, M. P., and Hon. D. Laird. This report indicates progress in the Maritime Provinces and presents grounds for renewed effort all along the line. The Western Foreign Mission Committee secured the appointment of a paid agent to superintend this large and growing work. Rev. R. P. Mackay, of Fairdale, Ont., was selected for this office.

The work of the Assembly is steadily drawing to a close and no burning questions remain to be dealt with. It is, however, probable that the session will last till Friday. It is not too much to say that the Assembly has been one of the most satisfactory and happy gatherings in the history of the church. No burning questions of doctrine or discipline marred the harmony. The arrangements of the church were presented and discussed in an admirable manner. Montreal was at its best, and everything combined to render the meeting enjoyable. The fraternal greetings of the Congregational Union, the grand address from Dr. Gray, of Edinburgh, ex-moderator of the church of Scotland, and the happy replies of our own moderator, were very pleasing breaks in the press of business. On the whole it is manifest that the Presbyterian church in Canada has been entrusted with a great work to do both at home and abroad, and it is equally evident that in a spirit of earnestness, devotion and liberality, she is making at least an honest attempt to do that work.

Methodist District.

AN IMPORTANT RESOLUTION PASSED AT THE LAST MEETING—REPRESENTATIVES AT CONFERENCE—SOME STATISTICS.

The following is the resolution adopted after a careful review of the state of the work of God in the district:—

"In reviewing the state of the work of God and the greater efficiency of our ministerial labor, this district, whilst finding substantial encouragement, in the various departments of our work, realizes most deeply that increased attention to the spiritual instruction of our children is one of the demands of the hour; that more attention be given in our pulpits to the obligations involved in church membership; and pledges itself to a more Christy devotion to our calling; and would earnestly recommend the appointment of a conference evangelist for the coming year."

The following were elected to represent the district on the several conference committees:

- 1. Stationing Committee—Rev. E. Slackford.
2. School Committee—Rev. W. J. Kirby and Isaac Oxnam, Esq.
3. Epworth League Committee—Rev. W. Lawson and L. Morris, Esq.
4. Nominating Committee—Rev. C. W. Hamilton and J. M. Hood, Esq.
5. Missionary Committee—J. F. Stewart, Esq.
6. Sustentation Fund—Rev. John Goldsmith and J. M. Hood, Esq.

The state of Church membership is as follows: Received into the church, 296; removed from the church by all means, including death, 271.

There were baptized during the year 436; marriages solemnized, 77.

For the missionary fund there were given \$2,640.06; for the supernumerary fund, \$253.49; for the educational fund, \$643.40; the contingent fund, \$73.83; general conference fund, \$70.69; union church relief, \$51.04; Sunday school aid, \$47.52; sustentation fund, \$334.66; children's fund, \$1,659; Women's Missionary Society, \$1,722.99, making a total of \$7,395.68.

There was raised for ministerial support \$9,983, which was supplemented from the following sources by the following amounts: children's fund, \$1,190; missionary fund, \$1,019.50.

There was total received as salary by the ministers on the district of \$12,192.50, leaving a net deficiency to be borne by the brethren of \$2,942.50. It ought to be mentioned that this deficiency will be somewhat reduced when the Sustentation Fund shall have been disbursed at Conference.

The School returns show the following totals: Teachers, 443; scholars, 3,669; vols in library, 4,194; raised for missions, \$548.67; raised for school purposes, \$948.78; raised for S. S. aid, \$47.52.

It is reassuring to find that in a year of great financial depression, the funds of the church have been so well sustained. It is hoped that the same may be found true of every district in the Conference.
