

Tommies Defeat Saints 8-4 In Hockey Tilt Sat.

Ed Hospodor led St. Thomas College Tommies to an 8-4 intercollegiate hockey triumph over St. Dunstan's University Saints in SDU rink Saturday afternoon. Hospodor scored half the Chatham boys' markers and assisted on three of the other four as the visitors grabbed their second triumph in as many N.B.-P.E.I. intercollegiate starts. Previously the Tommies edged the University of New Brunswick 3-2 at Chatham. Saints own a 7-4 decision over Mt. Allison.

The Tommies, defending intercollegiate champions and heavy favorites to "wallop the local Saints, were given a great bat-

tle by the underdog Red and Whites who were in the thick of things until well into the third period.

The visitors didn't assume the lead until the dying seconds of the second period. Indeed it looked like Saints were finishing the sandwich session in front 3-2. Gerry Gillis had given the locals their 3-2 edge when the Saints were short-handed at 18:44 and that appeared to be the only goal of the session. However with 20 seconds of the period remaining, Keating managed to beat Callaghan for the equalizer and 17 seconds later Woods put the New Brunswickers in front to stay.

LOTS OF POWER

However the Tommies had loads of power left for the final frame and they outscored the Red and White lads 4-1 during the 20-minute. Hospodor had a whale of a time, firing three of these four markers with Keating sinking the other one. Defenceman George Trainor beat Keith Raymond for the lone SDU counter.

The teams divided four markers in the opening stanza. Saints got tallies from the sticks of Marshall and Tingley, with Hospodor and Gramann firing the visitors' goals.

Each team collected seven penalties, with one of the Tommies being a major to Jones for high sticking Marshall. Jack Ready and Don Whalen were the referees.

Ramblers Top Windsor 6-2

AMHERST — (CP) — Alain Caron, top scorer in the Nova Scotia Senior Hockey League so far this season, picked up three goals and one assist Saturday night to pace Amherst Ramblers to a 6-2 victory over Windsor Maple Leafs.

The league leading Ramblers easily outplayed Windsor, in last place in the five-team league. The first period was scoreless, with Windsor collecting singles in the second and third periods.

Beside Caron's tallies, which gave him 57 goals and 37 assists for 94 points for a 23-point lead in league scoring, other Rambler goals were scored by Gerry Boss, Germain Mungler and Doug Polley. Jim Beckman and Gun Mason scored for Windsor.

Snow Postpones Crosby Tourney

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (CP) — A snow and hail storm on the Monterey Peninsula Sunday brought postponement of the final round in the \$50,000 Bing Crosby golf tournament. It will be played today.

It was the first postponement of the 72-hole tournament since 1952 and never before has snow been the cause.

The leader at the 54-hole mark Saturday was Joe Campbell who fired an even-par 72 over the tricky Cypress Point Course for a total of 210, two strokes ahead of the field—reduced to the low-60s—and 40 low pro-amateur teams.

Veteran Doug Ford moved into close contention when he shot a 69 over the same course for a total of 212. A crowd of 25,000 swarmed over the three courses on which the tournament was played Saturday.

Stan Leonard of Vancouver led the Canadian contingent, reduced to three players. Leonard shot a 71 for a total of 249 and

was bracketed with seven other players. The other Canadian survivors were Toronto's Al Balding, also with a 71 for a total of 221, and Wilf Homenuk of Winnipeg with a 74 for a total of 224.

OTHERS ELIMINATED

George Knudson of Toronto, Jerry Magee of Toronto and Al Johnston, another Torontonian, were eliminated. Knudson posted 75-227, Magee 75-226 while Johnston didn't have a card.

In the pro-amateur division, the leaders remained pro Bob McAllister and Albie Pearson, Los Angeles Angels outfielder. They had a best-ball score of 62 and a 185 total.

It took a 54-hole score of 224 or better for a pro to stay in the tournament for \$5,300 first prize and Gary Player of South Africa, last year's leading money winner, was among those who didn't make it.

A team score of 203 or better was needed to stay in the pro-amateur division where a \$3,000 top prize awaits the pro on the winning twosome.

Tiger Bombs Fernandez

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (CP-AP)—Dick Tiger of Nigeria, a bull-necked boxing machine, pummelled stiff-punching Florantino Fernandez of Cuba into submission Saturday night, badly breaking the No. 1 middleweight contender's nose to win a victory that went into the books as a sixth-round technical knockout.

Fernandez, ranked the leading challenger by the National Boxing Association after he lost a close 15-round decision in his last start to champion Gene Fullmer, was unable to answer the bell for the sixth round. The televised bout had been scheduled for 10 rounds.

Tiger, British Empire middleweight champion and himself a leading contender for world honors, weighed 160½; Fernandez 160.

The Nigerian, who developed a devastating flat-footed style as he gained experience in the ring, finished Fernandez, supposed to be the much heavier puncher, with smashing lefts and rights to the face that left the Cuban covered with blood.

Fernandez, at 25 seven years Tiger's junior, had been stopped only once previously. Saturday night he went for Tiger's body, but the Nigerian, who never has been knocked off his feet, took everything the Cuban could offer and never backed up.

Johansson Starts On Comeback Trail

GOTEBORG, Sweden (AP)—A 29-year-old Swede, former stone-breaker and ex-champion of the world, has started his preparations for a comeback in the boxing ring.

Ingemar Johansson is about to wind up his training for the Feb. 2 match against former British Empire heavyweight champion Joe Bygraves, 30, of Jamaica.

Ingo seems determined to get back into the world picture. He started early last summer to trim his weight by taking part in a grinding eight-day military endurance march in the Swedish mountains and kept on through the summer and autumn with daily roadwork, shadowboxing and ring sessions with tough sparring mates.

He now scales 200 pounds and says he is in top shape.

Experts, who have followed Ingo from his amateur days to the last world title fight against Floyd Patterson, say they have hardly ever seen him so trim.

DOWN THREE

Since Ingemar started his preparations for the forthcoming match at the "Maesshallen" indoor arena here, he has knocked down three sparring mates, among them a former member of the Patterson stable, John Henry, who is now living in Sweden and married to a Swedish girl.

Henry recently left his sparring job with Johansson saying that Ingo was too tough, while Johansson commented: "I cannot have a sparring mate who is dancing backwards all the time."

Bygraves gave Johansson one of the Swede's toughest fights in their previous meeting.

Ingo finally defeated him over 10 rounds in their Feb. 24, 1956 match.

Bygraves seemed knocked out of the boxing scene by a car crash in August last year. But he came back with a flourish and knocked out Herhard Eech. He is a mauling, spoiling fighter and has won 38 fights, lost 15 and drawn one.

Ingemar, who has won 22 of his 24 professional matches—14 of them in KO—has been knocked out twice, both times by Patterson.

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
