Mrs. Fred Cannon of Charlottetown scored a stunning upset as she ousted second-seeded Mary Ellen Driscoll from the ladies golf championship which continued Tuesday over a rain-drenched course at Sackville.

Mrs. Cannon, a former Island champion, fired a par four on the 315-yard 17th hole to push her young Saint John Riverdale partner to the sidelines, defeating her by a score of two and one.

Bob Kidd Tops Qualifiers In Can. Amateur Tourney

VANCOUVER (CP)—Ensigning Bob Kidd fired his second straight 80 over his home course of Marine Drive Tuesday to take medalist honors in the two-day, 36-hole qualifying round of the 55th Canadian Amateur Golf Championship.

Kidd, a member of Canada's 1958 World and Americas Cup teams and British Columbia Willingdon Cup player the last six years, carded rounds of 36-34 Monday and 37-32 Tuesday.

He was the only player among the 146 starters to break par both days and he will lead 64 qual-

fiers into match play competition today.

Best round of the day was scored by Richard Giddings, 46-year-old realtor from Modesto, Calif., who fired a three-under-par 35-36-66 over the tight 6,432-yard par 36-35-71 layout.

His sub-par performance gave him second place among the medalist scores with an even par 74-68-142.

A return to sunny weather resulted in a general lowering of scores, especially among the late starters. In all, five players broke par and four others equalled it. **TWO EQUAL KIDD**

George Holland of Medina, Wash., and Leonard Morgan of Vancouver each equalled Kidd's 69 round. Joe Jeroski, alternate player on B.C.'s 1959 Willingdon

Cup team, carded a one-under 70.

Carding par 74 were John Johnston, a member of the 1958 Americas Cup team, Bert Theoharist, medalist in the interprovincial team golf championships last Saturday here, and Doug Bagnall, 1958 B.C. Willingdon copper—all from Vancouver—and Blake Cramb, 21-year-old Powell River, B.C., mill worker.

Johnston's round gave him third place with 143.

Jeroski, Bobby Panasiuk, 17-year-old Windsor, Ont., junior, and little Phil Brownlee of Toronto Scarborough followed with 144.

Seventeen players carding 155 were forced to play off after the end of the second round Tuesday evening for the last eight qualifying positions.

Blair Richardson Stops Mercer

HALIFAX (CP)—Blair Richardson, 18-year-old South Bar, N.S., schoolboy, stopped tonight Hank Mercer of Val Dosta, Ga., at 1:47 of the fifth round in their scheduled 10-round middleweight boxing bout here Tuesday before 4,500 paid fans.

Richardson weighed 156, Mercer 163.

Richardson, the Maritime middleweight champion, knocked his opponent to the canvas three times in the second round before ending it in the fifth with a vicious right to the head. The mandatory three knockdown rule was waived. It was his ninth straight knockout and his 14th in 16 fights. Richardson now boasts a 15-1-0 record.

 won a special free-for-all trot, purse \$25,000, at Roosevelt Raceway last week. The distance was a mile and a quarter, and one of the starters was the Italian champion Icare IV. The footing was very heavy, but Trainer Horn managed to get through it nicely, with the four-year-old Silver Song, second, and Icare coming in very fast in the last eighth to place third. The time was 2:40 2/5.

No doubt the time would have been several seconds faster had the conditions been better.

On the same night a junior free-for-all, purse \$15,000, was raced and won by Darn Safe in 2:44 4/5 for the mile and a quarter.

The winner of the International Trot, Jamin, is now located at the Springfield, Illinois, track, where he will be kept in shape for a September 18 Invitational American Trotting Championship trot at one and a quarter miles. It will be raced at Sportsman's Park, Chicago. It is expected that Jamin will give exhibition miles over two of Ohio's half-mile ovals.

Negotiations are underway for the purchase of Jamin by American interests; everyone is curious as to the amount of money his American admirers will pay for him, and some believe that it will be a record price for a harness horse.

His trainer stated that Jamin would not need the extra weight of steel shoes when he went against the watch at Springfield's mile oval. Ingo Is Dubious Of Return Match

NEW YORK (AP) Ingemar Johansson, world heavyweight champion, writing under his by-line in Life magazine, Monday declared:

"I can't fight Patterson and the fight mob too."

He said he would be ready Sept. 22 for a rematch with Floyd Patterson, the American from whom he took the title June 19, "but there probably will be no fight."

Johansson did not identify the "mob."

At the conclusion of his article he stated:

"The man I am going to fight is Floyd Patterson. I have given my word to fight him and I keep my word. But three things have to happen first:

"1. I must have my money in the bank under my own name before I come to America to fight.

"2. I must have a good explanation of who is promoting the next fight, who owns whom, and who has lied to whom. Where does (Gus) d'Amato come in and where does his backer (Vincent) Veielis get his money? Don't worry about money? Veielis told my friend Eddie (Ah-quist), 'There's no limit.' That is a funny statement and it should be cleared up.

"3. I must wait until the investigations are over."

"I do not think I am asking too much after what the fight mob has done to me."

Johansson's references were to d'Amato, who is manager of Patterson; Veielis, who has a controlling interest in Rosensohn Enterprises which promoted the fight under the direction of Bill Rosensohn; and Ahquist, Johansson's Swedish advisor.
