Let's Talk It Over

In the good old days, if anyone asked you what value there was in a certain subject taught at school, and you weren't quite sure yourself, you could always fall back on the time-honored answer that it provided mental gymnastics which exercised the brain, and made it more able to cope with other situations. But those nifty psychologists, who, it seems, won't take anything for granted, conducted some experiments, and found out that this old concept was false. After a great deal of experimentation and thorough research, they discovered that people who can reason effectively in mathematics are just as likely to be unreasonable in dealing with social and personal problems as anyone else.

This is not to say that mathematics has no value. Quite the contrary. It is essential in many operations, such as keeping your accounts straight, making out your income tax, and building a cantilever bridge. But if you want people to understand social problems, teach them social problems. Latin will help in the derivation of certain English words, but will not help much in matters outside its own sphere.

The old concept that difficult and distasteful learning material was especially good for students also received a severe jolt. A lot of study on the subject revealed that pupils learned little that was good from performing tasks in which they had no interest. It was clearly demonstrated that interest was absolutely necessary if the student was to continue working industriously along the lines indicated. You could force him to swallow the bitter pills of distasteful work, but he would discontinue it the moment the compulsion was withdrawn, if there was no strong motivation holding the effort up.

Just as "all work and no play" makes Jack a dull boy, a large percentage of distasteful labor makes him a thoroughly disinterested boy. True, nothing worth while in life is obtained without effort, but the goal must be clear and promising, and the means understood before the effort will be voluntarily made.

Coronation Plans For Kensington

A representative meeting of the various service clubs in Kensington was held on Friday night, May 8th to make plans for the Coronation celebration. A second meeting was held on Monday, May 11th and a program finalized.

Worship Mayor W. H. Darragh, Athletic Association, Boy Scouts and Girl Guides, and the Community Club. Each club was assigned a part of the program for which they will be responsible. The program will begin at 2 p.m. with a children's parade in which the adjoining schools will be invited to participate. Loud-speakers will furnish band music for the parade and also broadcast the Queen's address at the Athletics field at 4 o'clock. A program of sports for the children will be run off and canteens will supply refreshments so that children from out-of-town may remain for the fireworks at 9 p.m. A 4 o'clock Boy Scouts and Girl Guides bonfire, camp meeting and sing-song will take place.

A loud-speaker system will make the orchestra music available for dances on several streets which will give everyone a chance to rejoice and celebrate the crowning of Her Majesty. Money for the festivities was voted at the Town Council meeting on Monday evening. A flag will be presented to each school child and the town will be decorated as lavishly as possible. Citizens are urged to co-operate by decorating their homes and places of business, to make June 2, 1953, a day to be long remembered.

With twenty-five adjoining school districts taking part in the huge parade headed by the Legion members of Kensington and surrounding districts it is expected to be one of the largest and most colorful parades in the Province on that day. A prize is being offered by the Legion for the school having the most gaily decorated group in the parade. Each school should be headed by a banner showing the district they represent.
