And when I sent to the Georgia county seat where I married the second time, to get a copy of the marriage certificate, I was informed that permanent records of vital statistics weren't kept prior to 1958. And we had a house fire in 1950 which destroyed our personal papers, including our marriage certificate.

As I've said, I desperately need the pension for personal health reasons (as I have a heart ailment, though I am still wage-earning), and because I want to help my daughter through college. She hopes to become a missionary teacher.

Dear L.P.: It occurs to me that several hopeful approaches are still unexplored, as regards the necessity of establishing your bona fide widow's status.

Dear Mary Haworth: I married a widower two years ago, who owns a house bought during his first marriage, which means that the deed is still in the name of his late wife and him.

He is a good man, but very sensitive and I don't like to press the matter. When I ask why he doesn't update the deed to include my name, he says it's not necessary, that the wife gets all the property when her husband dies.

Is this true? Or can her family claim the house?—V.A.

Dear V.A.: Even if I knew the whole answer from the legal view, based on professional assessment of all relevant factors, the legal fraternity would have a fit if I published it here for your benefit.

Speaking woman-to-woman, however, I think your husband's reaction to your foresighted question is improperly evasive and inaccurate. In general, a widow's inherent dower right to her husband's estate is only fragmentary, say about one-third, if he fails to legally specify her as the sole beneficiary, against other natural claimants.—M.H.
