

LIEUT. R. MCCABE WINS OTTAWA AGGREGATE IN SHOOT

Young Marksman 'Chaired' In Triumph At Conclusion Of Keen Two-day Meet

Capturing three medals and one trophy Lt. Roy McCabe of the P. E. I. H. yesterday climaxed two days of brilliant shooting in the Provincial Rifle Association Meet by carrying off the Ottawa Aggregate, and being second in the Grand Aggregate.

With shoot-offs being necessary to decide Cup and medal winners in the two matches fired, the Lieut.-Governor's Match and the Ladies Challenge Match, the two-day meet closed yesterday on the Kensington Rifle Range after the riflemen had provided some of the most stirring competition ever to take place in this annual event.

With conditions for firing excellent and with a much better light than on the previous day scores ran somewhat higher and result of the matches and the Aggregate were always in doubt right up to the firing of the last shot in the match.

Governor's Match

The Lieutenant Governor's Match fired a 200, 500 and 600 yards with a possible of 105 was the first on the program yesterday and resulted in a tie between Lieutenants Roy Stewart and Lt. Allan McCabe. Roy Stewart won the match when his score on the last range was better than McCabe's 32, the latter firing an inner on his seventh shot, but the tie in points necessitated a shoot-off to decide the winner of the P. R. A. Gold Medal. McCabe proved the winner as he sank three bulls and two heads in the shoot-off's score. Sgt. Stewart in addition to receiving first prize money also received the P. R. A. Silver Medal.

Excitement Keen

But excitement was less keen than in the first match. Lt. Allan McCabe, Col. F. Conrad and W. Dennis all came back from the 200 yards with 34's just one shot off possible. Coming away from the 500 McCabe had added another 34 while the others were dropping to 31. R. Andrews of the P. E. I. H. shot the only possible bull at this range. Lt. McCabe put him two points behind Lt. McCabe. However it was a different story at the 600. Lt. McCabe run into a streak of bad luck dropped away down and when firing on the long range had ceased. Sgt. J. C. Stewart and Lt. Roy McCabe had put together scores of 31, 34, 32, and 32, 33, 32 to lead all others with a total of 97.

But the deciding of the Lieut.-Governor's match also saw the closest race ever staged in the shoot for the Grand Aggregate and beautiful Snyder Trophy and Governor General's silver Medal, away from the 600 but four points separated the first five men in the aggregate. Here's how they ran: P. E. I. H. Coles had a total of 97, Lt. Allan McCabe 95, Lt. Roy McCabe had 285 and Sgt. J. C. Stewart and Capt. Jas. Coles 84 and 283. Anything could happen but Pte. Coles kept his place in the lead by shooting him 318 and the Governor General's Silver Medal. Lt. Roy McCabe with a 32 had 317 for the Governor General's Bronze Medal while Sgt. Stewart and Capt. Jas. Coles and Lt. Allan McCabe finished in that order for the first five.

Immediately after the posting of the 30 men each representing a unit was to the 500 yard range to decide the Ladies Challenge trophy. The shooting was not disappointed. Displaying the best shooting of the meet four of the 30 finished with 49's just one shot off a possible 50. Lt. Conrad was the best and with Col. Conrad's win Mrs. C. H. Black who he represented became the possessor of the magnificent silver challenge trophy. The D. C. M. A. won. However the four still had to go to the ranges to decide the holder of the Army and Navy Cup and the prize presented by the Lieut. & Ferguson. Lt. Allan McCabe, plunking five straight bulls' eyes into the target, captured the trophy. Signaller was Dennis took second as he scored a bull's eye and Signaller A. M. Jones with Lt. A. won the popular trophy and the young marksman was "chaired" in triumph and carried on the shoulders of the competitors to the big marquee where the presentation of trophies and prizes took place.

The third shoot-off took place in the Nicholson's Tyro Aggregate when Signaller A. M. Jones and Lt. W. G. Hogg of the P. E. I. H. ended up in a tie. Jones won the shoot-off and with it the Gaddy Cup of tobacco donated by Hickory Nicholson Tobacco Co. Ltd., as his final shot went straight to the bull with Hogg clipping the target for an inner just outside the circle. A. M. Jones chalked up his second win of the day as his 90 led all others in the Judson Tyro fired in conjunction with the Lieut. Governor's match.

The Rack Rifle Class also shot in conjunction with the Lieut.-Governor's was won by Constable H. Ade of the R. C. M. P. who won a total of 228. Lt. Conrad was the best and with Col. Peter Astra, owned by a country doctor, L. M. Gullinger of Andover, O., was none too well favored in the draw for the post positions for the first heat at 3 p. m. EDT. The dice rolled seven for De H. N. Parshall, trainer and driver of the colt which has not bowed in a single heat this season after topping the two-year-olds in money earned last year. However he is expected to start at the short odds of one to three.
