A Temperance Victory.

NO LIQUOR WANTED—EARNEST PETITIONERS WIN THE DAY.

St. Remaud d'Etchemin is the name of a populous parish on the south shore, joining the town of Levis, Quebec. It contains a number of saw mills and factories, and has a large working population. At the meeting of its municipal council, held on the evening of the 16th inst., there appears to have been unusual excitement manifested over the liquor question. Over three hundred and fifty residents of the parish, including the cure, were present. A petition, signed by the cure and a large majority of the ratepayers, was presented to the Council, asking that no tavern licenses be granted any more within the limits of the parish, in order to put an end to the disgraceful scenes of drunkenness, of which it is frequently the theatre. The petition, among other things, represented that the facility with which intoxicating drinks have been hitherto procured in the place was a source of public disorder, of distress and dishonor in many families, and of bad example for children, and that all that was respectable in the local population desired to see an end put to this deplorable state of things. To prove their sincerity, the petitioners also stated that they had subscribed the sum of \$150 to indemnify the Council for the loss of revenue it would sustain by the total suppression of tavern licenses, and that they held this money at the Council's disposal the moment it complied with their prayer. Father Godbout, the parish priest, eloquently supported the petition before the meeting, and, with the intimate knowledge he possessed of his parishioners, he painted in striking colors the evil done by strong drink and its consequences, and the good that would result from the abolition of licenses. Among other things, he said that the suppression of taverns in his parish would save \$25,000 a year to its inhabitants, which would go far toward improving their condition; while, if the Council refused to suppress the taverns, respectable citizens, who had a right to protection, were fully determined to demand the establishment of a police force, the cost of which would far exceed the revenue derived from tavern licenses. A long and heated discussion followed, the liquor interest making a hard fight. When every other argument failed, they thought to corner the prohibitionists by pointing out that the subscription tendered to the Council to indemnify it for the loss of the revenue from its tavern licenses fell short of covering that loss by \$50, whereas the Rev. Mr. Godbout drew \$50 from his pocket and laid the money on the table. Ultimately the vote was taken, resulting in the granting of the prayer of the petition by four to three, the Mayor voting with the majority.
