## Souris Play Applauded But SDU Takes Award

The Dominion Drama Festival adjudicator, Walter Massey, in describing his reaction to the dramatic Society's production of "The Tempest," presented at the Regional Drama Festival in Montague. The play, written and directed by Edward Clinton of Souris, was declared not to be of sufficient length to be entered in the competition and so was not eligible for an award. In spite of this Mr. Massey said that he had a enjoyable afternoon and was "thrilled" to have seen an original Canadian play and described Mr. Clinton, who also acted the role in the production as "charming." Plays in order to be eligible for the final Dominion Festival must be at least an hour and 30 minutes in length. The final play presented was "That Man For Murder," this was the effort of the Charlottetown Little Theatre Guild. In his criticism Mr. Massey said that there was not enough "flow" to the play and that there were too many local lines in the production. Costumes were adequate, he said, but color could have been more effectively and makeup was a little good.

## S' side Fires Off Strong Protest to Legislature

Following the passage by the legislature on second reading of amendments to the Summerside Incorporation Act, restoring a section of land to Sherbrooke and Heron's Island to the Levesque School district, the Summerside Town Council in a special meeting Friday night passed two strongly worded resolutions protesting the amendments. The Crest Lanes Bowling Alley and the Dairy Bar, but not the Hillcrest housing development were included in the section to be returned to Sherbrooke, the council said. Mayor Jenkins and Councilor Alex MacDonald were the only two members of the council not in attendance at the meeting, both being out of town. The acting mayor, Leo Wood, presided. Telegrams of protest were sent to Premier Walter R. Shaw and Opposition Leader Alex Matheson. The resolutions which were passed at the special meeting asked that the legislature not pass the amendments on third reading, which they have to do.

## FOOD PROCESSORS MEETING HERE

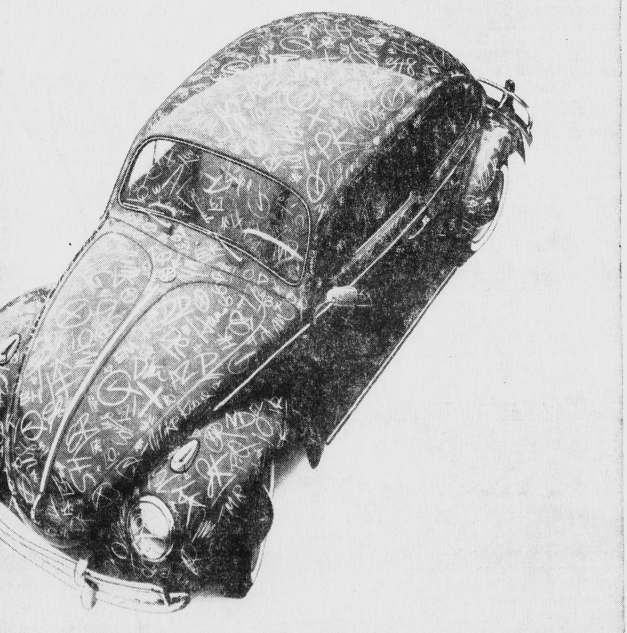
Last night saw advance registration for the one-day Maritime Food Processors Association conference being held today at the Charlottetown Hotel.
