ing action before withdrawing.

Enemy resistance was cracked by the Australians' capture of Hill 614 Tuesday.

Won 50-Cent Bet

OSM. H. O. Larsen of Calgary won 50 cents from Sgt. H. D. Jones of Victoria on a bet that the Chinese would consider the position untenable and the attack revealed that they had pulled out.

Lt.-Col. J. R. Stone, the Canadian's commander, called in air support to rout enemy troops denying Hill 500 to a platoon led by Lieut. Harry Inglis of Halifax.

Inglis is attached to the company of Maj. George Flint of Montreal. Jack George's men were firmly atop Hill 419 to clear Hill 500, last of a series holding up the advance in that sector of the front.

Col. Stone had the 5th Air Force liaison officer, Lieut. R. H. Laler of Cozak, Neb., call in jets which soon had napalm streaming down the hill from the exact enemy position.

Descending from the command post after the battle, Col. Stone went straight to Lieut. Laler.

"Congratulations on the most perfect air strike ever," he said. "You couldn't have done better."

Speaking of the operation in general, he said: "This is the sort of operation I like. It was completely bloodless. But if they had decided to hold, it would have taken almost a division to capture it."

"I'm glad they decided to make this only a delaying line and didn't try to hold. They'd had just too much the last few days."

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New Section Of School Parade Opens Friday

Friday, March 2nd, is a date the school children of Prince Edward Island will be looking forward to.

This date will mark the opening of the second section of Schurman's School Parade, which will be presented by the M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd. every Friday night over station C.J.R.W. at 7.30 P.M. during the months of March, April and May.

The first half hour of this hour programme will continue to be taken up by entries from any of the schools on the island in reading, public speaking, piano solo's, vocal solo's and group singing.

These students may present any selection they may so desire so long as it is approved by the teacher in charge and is limited from 3 to 3½ minutes in length.

An interscholastic spelling contest will be held to replace the quiz contest which formed the second half of the programme during the first section. A school spelling team will consist of one student from each of the following grades, 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10. If in the case of the 1 to 3 classroom division all of these grades are not represented, the teacher may choose a student from a grade lower than the one not represented to fill this spot.

To the playoff winners of the first and second section in vocal solo, reading, public speaking and piano solo, will go beautifully styled individual silver and French bronze medals for first and second place prizes. Silver and French bronze shields will go to the schools that win the group singing and spelling competition. These awards will be made in May.

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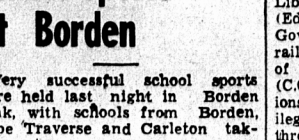
