CONSIDERABLE breakage of boats and small craft, resulting from the late storm, is reported from the North Side.

FISHERIES.—This morning, before the Inspector of Fisheries, a boat belonging to Bernard Murneghan was condemned and ordered to be sold, for having been used in fishing illegally in East River.

A SINGULAR drowning accident occurred at Tracadie yesterday. A boat containing three fishermen, whose names are at present unknown, split in two while sailing into the harbor. The men clung to the sides for a time, and a boat left the shore to rescue them, but before she arrived one of the men sank and drowned. The other men were rescued in an exhausted condition. The cause of the boat splitting is a mystery.

THE REGATTA.—Judging from the preparations which are being made for the Hillsborough Regatta in Halifax, St. John, Pictou and Charlottetown, the Hillsborough will, on Wednesday next, be the scene of one of the most exciting regattas ever held in this Province. The four-oared race, in working boats, will be contested by two crews from Halifax, one from St. John, one from Charlottetown, and probably one from Souris. The crews, we learn, are first class amateurs. All are eager to win, and a contest may be expected which will in itself be equal to a whole regatta. The double scull race will also be a good one. In it Halifax, Pictou and Charlottetown will be well represented. In the single scull race Halifax will have another representative. Pictou will also have one, Charlottetown three or four, and possibly St. John may send one or two. The sailing races cannot fail to be successful. We hear of many second class boats fitting up to take part in it. On the whole the regatta has every prospect of success, and the energetic committee who have it in hand will lose no opportunity to make it the best ever held on the Hillsborough.

AN ERRING BROTHER.—We seldom see meanness and dishonesty combined in one person in a more striking manner than that shown by the following circumstances:—During Dominion Exhibition week a horse was taken from the Island to Halifax by steamer and rail. Arrived at Halifax, the official demanded of the owner, the freight. But the owner assured him that the horse was to be shown with the rest of the island exhibit, and that the Government Commissioners would foot the bill. On this assurance he was permitted to pass. He then went to the stables on the exhibition grounds, and put up and fed his animal. Mr. Gardiner was not aware of his presence there till a demand was made for the unpaid freight. As the horse hadn't been consigned to him, and was not for exhibition purposes, he refused to pay the bill. The owner, having in the meantime sold the animal, smuggled him away; and so the freight had to be made up by the poor official who allowed him to pass. The perpetrator of this piece of small rascality is, we regret to say, an Islander. We know the man well. If the amount of the freight is not within one week sent to this office or to Mr. Gardiner, to be forwarded to the official who was taken in, we shall publish his name and the place of his residence in full, and have the same published in the rest of the Maritime Province papers. If our erring brother does not pay up we shall brand him with a black mark by which he will be known to the public as long as he lives.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 6.

At a late hour last night, Garfield's remains were transferred very quietly from the casket in which they came from Elberon to an air-tight casket made of sheet bronze especially for the purpose.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.

The indictment in the case of Charles J. Guiteau has been completed and is now in the hands of the printer. It will not be given to the Grand Jury to-day and it is possible that that body will not act upon it until next week.

DANVILLE, Va., Oct. 6.

There was a killing frost throughout this region last night. Great apprehensions are felt of extensive damage to growing tobacco in the fields near Danville. Plants are badly bitten.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Oct. 6.

A private despatch from London says that the workmen in the Staffordshire potteries have given notice of a demand for an advance of wages in November; that the masters passed a resolution resisting the demand and that a strike must ensue. Such a strike would involve 60,000 or 80,000 men.

BOSTON, Oct. 5.

Dr. A. K. W. Newton, of this city, who has been identified by Mr. Goodnow as the party who represented himself as the agent of Peppercorn Mills, of Biddeford, in the recent Western Sea swindle, was arrested to-night. He was formerly a forerunner of this city, but had his license revoked.

OSWEGO, N. Y., Oct. 6.

A fire broke out this morning in the business part of the village of Pulaski. Several buildings on both sides of the main street were burned. A steamer was sent from the city there.

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.

Fire broke out again in Tracey & Russell's Continental brewery, damaged yesterday to the extent of \$50,000, and the buildings were almost entirely destroyed. The loss to-day is estimated at \$80,000; insurance \$145,000.

The entire business portion of Pulaski, N. Y., was burned this morning. Loss \$200,000.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Oct. 5.

Mr. Bingham, a landlord, while riding near Erriis, County Mayo, was fired at. A girl riding with him was wounded. The assailant, who was disguised in female clothing, escaped.

The Dungarvon, County Waterford, branch of the Land League, which in spite of the instructions from Parnell, supported Thomas Dickson, Liberal, and successful candidate at Tyrone parliamentary election, is to be dissolved and reorganized with a new president by order of the executive of the Land League.

O'Donnell, speaking at a Land League meeting at Dungarvon, yesterday, said there were two Governments in Ireland—one Gladstone's, which nobody minded, and the other that of the League, which the people would obey.

LONDON, Oct. 6.

A private meeting of the directors of the Scottish Chamber of Agriculture, yesterday formally approved the draft of the Land Bill for Scotland providing for the adjustment of rents by arbitrators, a revaluation of farms and giving power to a tenant to sell his holding excepting a clause providing for revaluation by the sheriff. The meeting also approved the draft of a bill for the abolition of primogeniture and entail.

FRANCE AND TUNIS.

TRIPOLI, Oct. 6.

Regular communications are now established with Tunis in reference to the Kairwar, and are carried on by emissaries favored by Italian couriers. We are assured that the Porte does not countenance such intrigues, but should an outbreak of Mussulman fanaticism occur Turkey will be accused of being partly responsible.

THE sons of the late President Garfield have returned to Williams' College.

LOVELL the poet has been elected a member of the Nova Scotia Historical Society.

HON. CHARLES YOUNG L. L. D. has been elected a member of the Nova Scotia Historical Society.

THE King of Greece has entered Arta, in the ceded territory, and unbounded enthusiasm prevails.

MR. P. LESNER has applied to be reinstated as chief of the Money Order Branch of the Post Office Department, Ottawa, vacant by the death of Mr. Forsyth. Mr. Lesner was superannuated by the late Government.

THE ex-Empress Eugenie made a will recently in Paris, leaving all her property to Prince Victor, and designating him as the head of the Bonapartist party.

THE Emperor of Morocco is taking measures against the rebels on the Algerian frontier, so as to obviate the necessity of French troops occupying his territory.

THE erection of a memorial window in Dunfermline Abbey to the late Dean Stanley has been mooted in Scotland, and the proposal has received the support of Principal Falloch.

WALLACE ROSS will leave by steamer on Monday next for Portland, Me., where he will at once go into training under Kennedy's superintendence. Wallace announces his intention of challenging the winner of the coming race for the London Sportsman's cup.

HIS EXCELLENCY GENERAL SIR PATRICK MACDONOGALL has received a Cablegram from England announcing the serious illness of a member of his family, and will leave for England via Rimouski, to-morrow. Lady Macdonogall will follow on the 24th inst. General Macdonogall will return as soon as possible and will administer the government during Lord Lorne's absence in England, residing, as a matter of course, in Ottawa.
