The mails arrived in this city at four o'clock this morning, and were ready for delivery at eight.

The residence of Mr. James McKinnon Rocky Point, was destroyed by fire on Thursday last.

Messrs. Angus Gordon and James F. Brown, C. E., passed through Ottawa last week, en route for Winnipeg.

The mail carriers were obliged to return to Cape Tormentine to-day, on account of strong tide and heavy ice. They will not cross until to-morrow.

DURING February 28,247 emigrants arrived in the United States. For the eight months the arrivals were 375,000, and for the same period last year 308,000.

The unfortunate girl Stewart, who was, a short time ago, arrested for concealment of birth, was remanded to jail to await trial at the coming session of the Supreme Court.

A case of assault—Hughes vs. Patrick McCloskey—arising out of the melee on Dorchester street, on the 17th instant, came up before the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon, and was postponed.

The father of the King of Ashantee gives an indignant denial to the statement that 200 girls of that country were massacred for the purpose of using their blood in mixing mortar to repair the state building.

BANK AMALGAMATION.—A movement is on foot to amalgamate the Union Bank with the Merchants' Bank. The directors of the two Banks have had a conference on the subject, and it is thought that the amalgamation will be effected.—Halifax Chronicle.

One of the oldest inhabitants of Westmoreland Co., N. B., died on the 13th inst., aged 90 years and 9 months. She was the mother of Thomas, William H., and Penelope Allen, and came to this country from England in the year 1800.

SALMON seem to strike the coasts of the Maritime Provinces in the spring earliest, between Halifax and Shelburne, the Lahave river carrying off first honors as a rule. Two salmon were caught in that river a fortnight ago, one of which weighed 18 lbs.

THE Rev. Mr. McKeown (Methodist), of St. John, has received and accepted a unanimous call to the Methodist Church of Sussex, N. B., and will enter upon his duties in June next. A most cordial welcome awaits him. Mr. Betts goes to P. E. Island.—Sun.

A boy named Higgins was, yesterday, caught in the act of robbing a till in the store of Mr. Alex. McLeod, corner of Pownall and Grafton streets. He was handed over to the police, and to-day the Magistrate sentenced him to three months imprisonment, with hard labor.

THREE sheep belonging to Mr. Joseph Fellows, of Granville, N. S., which have been missing all winter, were discovered a few days ago on North Mountain, where they have existed all winter on such herbage as they could pick up from beneath the snow, and were in fair condition when found.

A DESTRUCTIVE tornado passed over the State of California, commencing on the 12th. A despatch says:—"During the last four days rain has fallen throughout the State, and except in the upper portions of the San Joaquin valley the rainfall has been quite large. Crop prospects are greatly improved, and the harvest is now almost assured except in the upper San Joaquin Valley. On the 15th an unusual thunderstorm visited this city and the neighboring counties, and at the village of Mateo a tornado unroofed the Episcopal Church, damaged a number of dwellings, tore up trees and prostrated outbuildings and fences.

The Dominion Government, in view of the greatly increased extent and population of Manitoba, are about to revise the terms of that Province. The terms consented to, and which will be considered by Parliament, are: For the support of the Government and Legislature, \$50,000; on an estimated population of 150,000, at 80 cents per head, \$120,000; as an indemnity for the want of public lands, \$45,000. The said sums to form the yearly subsidy to be paid by the Dominion to the said Province during the ten years next after 1881, in lieu of the subsidy allowed by the said Act, 23 Victoria, chap. 3.
