PASSENGERS AND MAILS

On and after Monday next, Prince Edward Island will be given, for the summer months, connection with the railway systems of Canada and the United States equal in promptness and efficiency with those of any country in the world.

People in Charlottetown and Tignish and all intervening points can leave their homes in the morning, go to Moncton, spend two or three hours there, and return the same day. This could never be done before.

The evening daily newspapers will be delivered at all points east of Summerside on the evening of issue. This was never done before.

All points east of Charlottetown will be reached by Upper Canadian and United States passengers and mails twenty-four hours earlier than ever before.

As an illustration of the perfect revolution in travelling which the new arrangement will produce, it may be mentioned that our representatives in Parliament from the West, Messrs. Perry, Yeo and Arsenault, can now leave Ottawa on Fridays at 4:40, standard, and reach their homes on Saturday night.

These remarks apply to all the mails formerly coming by Point de Chene or the Capes, except about three bags made up along the line of the I. C. R. between Montreal and Moncton.

The only drawback to these excellent arrangements is that they will involve longer and later hours of work for some of our postal and railway officials.

Notices have been received at the headquarters of the Cotton States and International Exposition from the Secretary of Promotion of the Mexican Government that the plans for the Mexican exhibit at Atlanta had been completed.

LETTER FROM HON. MR. FERGUSON.

Sir,—The following letter was handed to the Guardian yesterday. For reasons best known to the Editor of that extremely independent and intelligent organ, space was not found for it in the issue of this morning.

To the Editor of the Guardian: Sir,—In your issue of the 16th inst., replying to my letter from Ottawa, you accuse me of making "mere assertions, without wholly supporting by facts."

I answer that I did and still do ignore the existence of a 4:30 afternoon train as a part of your position. The table suggested by the Guardian of the 11th inst., and to which my criticism referred:

Table with 3 columns: Stations, Exps to Side, and Acc'n to Side. Rows for Tignish, Summerside, and Charlottetown.

An examination of this time table will show that a 4:30 train from Charlottetown was no part of your proposition. But while a late afternoon train from Charlottetown was no part of your time-table, it forms a prominent feature of the new time table which comes into force on Monday next.

The war indemnity to be paid by China to Japan is two hundred millions imperial treasury taels, equivalent to 288,000,000 silver American dollars.

The Newfoundland loan bungle, it is said, has been straightened. The English bank which has been developing all power in the matter of signing the bonds and seeing that they are properly issued.

PRESBYTERIAN GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

At the close of the discussion of Thursday last, Dr. Campbell, of Montreal, moved that the General Assembly should make no pronouncement in the matter of the Manitoba school question.

The General Assembly having had its attention called to the difficulties which have arisen in the province of Manitoba in connection with the matter of public education, resolves:

First, That it belongs to the state to see that the people receive such a measure of education as shall qualify them for ordinary duties in determining the principles of Christianity, and should give a distinct place to the reading of the Scriptures and prayer.

Fourth, The General Assembly hopes that this view will prevail with the authorities in Manitoba in determining and regulating its own educational affairs. Such a course, in the judgment of the assembly, could result only in evil, and is not, we believe, demanded by any supposed compact between the province and the Dominion, or between different classes of people in the province of Manitoba.

The conference opened at 9 a. m. on the 19th inst., President Clarke in the chair. The committee on conference relations was appointed, consisting of John Read, Dr. Stewart, G. H. Lister, Dr. Sprague, J. Sheaton, F. S. Allen, and G. M. Campbell.

The increase in membership is 373. Mr. J. B. Howard was granted letters of standing, he having retired on account of ill health. D. B. Bailey and L. J. Mason for ordination, also Harry Harrison and George A. Seller.

A crisis has been reached in Great Britain. It is evident that the Rosebery Government cannot hold out much longer. The incoming of the Unionists is confidently anticipated.
