

Dodgers Not Concerned About Series Opponent

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Brooklyn Dodgers, 1955 National League champions, picked their way carefully through television cables and cameramen into their dressing rooms Thursday after clinching the pennant—their minds already on new business.

"It doesn't make much difference to the boys who they meet in the world series," manager Walt Alton said as his charges munched cheese and crackers, then squinted into the bright lights of television and movie cameras.

"They'd like to play Cleveland because of the big crowds they could draw there or the Yankees because they've beaten us before," Alton said. "Jackie Robinson put in 'I'd like to get back at those Yankees, too. But this is a business with us.'"

Asked if the Dodgers' sensational early season winning streak of 10 and 11 games was the deciding factor, Grimm replied:

"No, that didn't make much difference.

Jack Brandt Is Named Rookie Of The Year

MONTREAL (CP)—Jack Brandt, fleet young Rochester outfielder, has been named the International League's rookie of the year it was announced Friday.

Brandt, 23-year-old native of Omaha, Neb., received 14 of 36 votes to win over Jim Williams, Toronto-born outfielder with Montreal Royals, who received 10.

The announcement, by Dink Carroll of the Montreal Gazette, president of the league's Baseball Writers' Association, said five other league novices figured in the balloting of 36 writers.

The others are: Yoyo Davajillo, Cuban second baseman, four votes; Don Drysdale, 19-year-old Montreal pitcher, three; Steve Demeter, Buffalo third-baseman and Asdrubal Baro, Cuban outfielder, two each; and Clyde Parriss, Montreal third-baseman, one.

BATTED 304

Brandt, a ball hawk with a rifle arm, hit 304 this season. His 176 safeties included 37 doubles, 12 triples and 12 home runs. He batted in 68 runs, despite a second-place spot in the lineup and stole 22 bases.

Williams, 28 years old and getting his first triple-A test this season, was second in league batting with .333. He has been in the Brooklyn Dodgers' farm system since he broke into pro ball in 1947.

Meanwhile, down the hall, Milwaukee Braves, who now have to fight to hold their second place position, acted as if the inevitable had happened.

"The best team won," said manager Charlie Grimm. "I'll be pulling for the Dodgers in the world series."
