Hershey Bears Are Surprise Of The A. H. L. This Season

Hershey Bears appear to be the surprise team of the young American Hockey League season. The Bears, who finished fourth in 1956-57, took over first place, turning back Providence Reds 5-1 Sunday night to break a tie for the lead with Providence.

Other games Sunday night, Rochester Americans took over third place with a 3-1 victory over Cleveland Barons, who dropped into the cellar, and Springfield Indians moved out of last place with a 2-1 triumph over Buffalo Bisons.

Hershey snapped a 1-1 tie in the second period on Bob Soling-

er's goal and solidified the verdict when Les Duff scored. Third-period goals by Lorne Davis and Obie O'Brien put the game out of Providence's reach.

Rochester jumped to a 2-0 first-period lead over Cleveland and made it stand up. Gary Aldcorn produced the insurance goal for the Americans late in the third period.

Buddy Boone's goal with less than three minutes remaining gave Springfield its victory over fourth-place Buffalo. Ken Wharmham had tied the game for the Bisons midway in the final period.

Possibility Of A New League

BATHURST, N.B. (CP) — The possibility of a five-team North Shore, N.B. intermediate hockey league being formed loomed Monday following the folding of the Maritime senior amateur circuit.

Patterson Still Leading Race

TORONTO (CP) — Hal Patterson, one of the greatest players eastern Canada has seen in years, is making a runaway of the Big Four football scoring race.

The 25-year-old import from the University of Kansas scored one touchdown and passed for another Saturday as his Montreal Alouettes lost 18-15 to Hamilton but he was able to increase his margin over Ottawa's G. A. P. Schreider, in second place.

Statistics compiled by The Canadian Press show Patterson with 12 touchdowns in 11 games for a 72-point total. Schreider picked up five points — five converts and a field goal — to bring his total to 55. Riders lost 31-23 to Toronto Argonauts.

Cookie Gilchrist scored both of Hamilton's touchdowns to bring his total in the last two weeks to five and his total for the season to 34 and hopped into third place with 54 points, just one short of Schreider's total.

Rocket Thinking Of Dick Irvin

MONTREAL (CP) — Maurice (Rocket) Richard was thinking about a man who isn't in the National Hockey League and a more after he scored his 500th league-play goal Saturday night.

Somebody asked him what he was going to do with the 500-goal puck that was given him.

"If Dick Irvin had been alive I'd have given the puck to him," replied the Rocket. "The last time I saw him he said he wanted to see me score my 500th goal."

"I haven't figured it all out yet but I've been thinking of making some use of it as a Dick Irvin memorial trophy."

Irvin, who died earlier this year, was the Rocket's first NHL coach when the latter broke in in 1942. Irvin coached Montreal Canadiens until the end of the 1954-55 season, then took over Chicago Black Hawks until his retirement before the 1956-57 season.

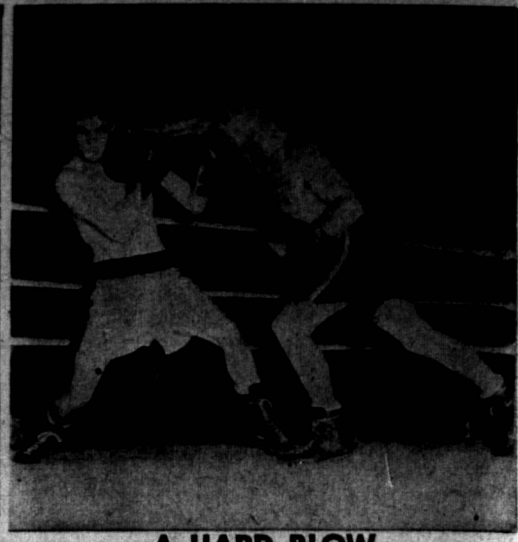

Argos May Have A Good Quarterback In Doucette

TORONTO (CP) — A month ago Gerry Doucette, discouraged and depressed, was ready to quit big-league football at the prime athletic age of 24. He was sick of being a second-stringer.

But things are looking up. He may land the No. 1 quarterback job with Toronto Argonauts of the Big Four Football Union. Arzo coach Hamp Pool thinks Doucette has the ability to make a top professional quarterback.

"Gerry will be all right from now on," Hamp said.

Doucette, a 190-pounder, has rarely got into the spotlight since joining Argos. In 1953 Nobby Wirkowski had the quarterback job and Doucette was sent to Toronto Beavers of the Ontario Rugby UDERSTUDY ROLE.

He came back to Argonauts the following season as an understudy to Wirkowski. Argonauts imported Tom Dublinski from Detroit Lions of the National Football League in 1956.

Ramsay Ready To Fight

Sir. — "I'm ready to fight any Welterweight in the Maritimes" was the dressing room comment of Bud Ramsay after he had punched out a 10 round decision over tough Walter Arsenault at the Civic Stadium in Summerside last Friday night.

"I'll fight anybody that wants to fight me, it doesn't make any difference who it is. Arsenault, sure, I'll fight him again if he wants," said the young man from Alberton as admirers swarmed around him. Informed that plans are under way to match Ramsay with Norm Gaultreau of Moncton the Welterweight champ.

Ramsay said "Good. Gaultreau, Keith Paris, Doug Turnbull, if doesn't make any difference who it is I'll meet any welterweight in the Maritimes."

In going the ten championship distance for the first time in his career, Arsenault displayed some fine ring generalship, time and again he forced the wild swinging Ramsay, to change his tactics and come into him.

Despite the margin of victory in Ramsay's favor, it was anything but an easy fight for the former Alberton midgetweight now fighting out of Summerside. He was forced to absorb some vicious shots thrown by Arsenault until the final bell.

Arsenault showed the fans he had the finesse to go the distance and then some. Ramsay fought a heady cagey fight in the early rounds, when Arsenault was trying to pile up points by jabbing and throwing an occasional right hand, finally in the seventh round, Arsenault got cute, he refused to come in to Ramsay he moved away and made Ramsay come in and when he did he used his own right hand to complete perfection. When they came out for the tenth round there is no question that Arsenault realized that he had to knock out the champion if he wanted to win. He charged at Ramsay throwing savage rights to Ramsay's body, and hooking with the left to the jaw. Ramsay absorbed some real bombs, a few of which slowed him down just a little, and then he amazed the crowd by fighting right back.
