New Library Building Opened At Alberton

The new public library at Alberton was officially opened yesterday afternoon. The large number of school children and adults in attendance was symbolic of the widespread interest in this valuable addition to the town and surrounding communities. The program was in the Women's Institute Hall, beginning at 3 p.m. with Rev. J. R. McMahon as chairman. Following the singing of "O Canada" a group of eight children under direction of Mrs. J. M. Smythe presented an old English singing dance "When I Was A Young Girl." The chairman then invited to the platform Rev. W. E. Monaghan, Rev. P. A. Fitzpatrick, Mr. Douglas Nicholson of the Alberton School Board, Mr. J. W. D. Campbell, M.L.A., Mr. H. B. Chandler, superintendent of public libraries, and Dr. L. W. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Education. Premier J. Walter Jones sent a message of regret that he was unable to be present because of another engagement. Rev. J. R. McMahon expressed thanks to all who have given time and donations to support the building of the library. There is a debt of \$1,900, which the committee proposes to liquidate by various local events and for these he asked the continued support of the public. He also expressed appreciation to six citizens, Mrs. Herbert Champion, Dr. W. A. Shaw, Messrs. J. W. Waugh, Herbert Matthews, Heber Corbett and Cyril Leard, who have underwritten security for money owed. Mr. Nicholson made reference to how the library had been missed during the months it had been closed. He said "We will never know the profits which will come out of the library." He expressed appreciation to Mr. Chandler and all who had made this library possible. Rev. W. E. Monaghan reminded his hearers that in some countries there are no libraries because minds have drifted from what should be the thoughts of Christian people. He spoke of the value of good literature and of what a fine thing it is to begin reading in youth. The majority of people cannot travel but all can imbibe from the fountain of knowledge by reading. The reading and absorbing of good books is an education. Referring to the great collection of books in the library, Rev. J. A. Fitzpatrick said if properly used they will be for the betterment of the community. It has been said that a reading people will be a thinking people and a thinking people will be a great people. A tap dance by Denise Thibault, accompanied by Mrs. E. E. Larter, made an interlude between speakers. Asset To Town Mr. Campbell congratulated all who were responsible for the new library building which is an asset to the town. Mr. Chandler expressed his pleasure at seeing the library ready to open. Last June it was necessary for the library to vacate its rented premises and there did not seem to be any suitable building available. For the construction of a library to donate one of the best sites in town. The committee members rallied round and a permanent building has been put up. Alberton now has one of the best library collections in the Province and there is sufficient room for the books, which are arranged in groups. A library is a source of knowledge which can make a great contribution to the community and can help it to become self-sustained. In this Province "we have many things which are the result of mechanical skills not common here. People learn how to invent through books. If we want to contribute to life we can

educate ourselves and acquire skills through use of the library." Dr. L. W. Shaw expressed his pleasure at being present to represent the Department of Education and congratulated all who had any part in making the library a reality. He congratulated the boys and girls who will be able to use it longer than any others. Dr. Shaw said there are many people who are afraid to be alone because they do not know what to do with themselves, but a good reader can have beside him the very best friend in the world, a good book. He reminded boys and girls that books must be treated well for they are good friends and they cost money. He demonstrated proper way to open a book. Books, he said, give us a great deal of information and a great deal of entertainment. We need to know so many more things than people a few years ago that the library is coming to be the very heart of the community and a great agency for the national anthem. Following the national anthem, the assembly proceeded to the library where Mr. J. E. Waugh opened the door and proclaimed the library officially opened. Afternoon tea was served at a nominal charge in aid of the library fund and a pleasant social hour was spent. The tea was in charge of Mrs. J. H. Myrick, who was capably assisted by Mrs. Gordon Bert Champion and Mrs. Gordon Coffin. Mr. Martin Bandler had charge of the soft drinks which were available for the children. Early in the afternoon a group of school children from the low grades assembled in the library where they enjoyed a number of recordings of children's stories, through the kindness of Mr. Chandler and Miss Frances McMillan of Charlottetown. The library building twenty-two by thirty-six feet. The exterior walls are finished with cedar shingles which have been treated with oil. The roof has green asphalt twin-but shingles. The trim is in white. The interior walls are of a soft shade of green, with the children's silk screen colour prints from the National Gallery adorn the walls. There are scenes by such well known Canadian artists as J. W. Jackson, Emily Carr, A. J. Casson and others. 2,000 Volumes The books, about 2,000 volumes, are arranged in groups. Adjoining the children's section is one for teen agers. Other books are grouped as philosophy, religion, social science, science, arts, literature, travel, biography and fiction. There is also a fine collection of periodicals. The library is so designed that it may be used for film programs, small meetings. It is equipped with electric lights and outlets, and a Coleman furnace provides the heat. Work has all been done by local carpenters, painters, electricians and labourers. The sign is the work of Mr. James Broderick. Donations of material have been made by J. H. Myrick and Co., and by Don Campbell. Mr. Hilton Barbour donated three barrels of oil for the furnace. A grant has been received from the Provincial Government and the town of Alberton contributed two hundred dollars. Numerous other donations have been received, among them an unsolicited one of five dollars from St. Louis School. In aid of the fund, a variety concert was presented under direction of Mr. Gordon Coffin. Saturday afternoon a group of children led by Dona Hagen, presented a concert in the barn of the R. C. M. P. barracks donated proceeds of two dollars and twenty cents to the fund. The outstanding donation was that of the building lot by Mr. J. W. Waugh. Much credit is due the finance committee, Rev. J. R. McMahon, Rev. G. B. Cunningham, and Mr. Gordon

At the final graduating class exercises of the present Prince County Hospital, held last night in the Summerside High School auditorium, six nurses received their diplomas at the hands of the Hon. Arnett, vice-president of the Board of Trustees, who presented a short and concise report on the activities of the hospital during the past year. In his report Mr. Arnett said: "Tonight marks the final graduation class of the present Prince County Hospital, an institution founded in 1910 through the generosity of a Summerside citizen, the late Mr. Thomas Ramsay. The six young ladies of tonight's class have finished their three years of training and instruction and will later this evening receive their diplomas which will qualify them to carry on their life work in this high and noble profession. "During the past year our Board suffered the loss of the passing of two of its members, I may say its most valued members, and I refer to the late Mr. H. T. Holman and the late Mr. Charles B. Rogers. The late Mr. Holman was the chairman of our board for many years and gave freely of his time and ability in the interests of the institution.
