LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

A Voice From Morell.

SIR,—There is quite a stir in the political camp. The leaders, battle day being near, are busy enlisting recruits and are particularly anxious about the various strongholds. As this generally happens but once in four or five years the time appears opportune for the electors in each district to meet and bring to the notice of the Government their grievances or such public improvements as may be required in their midst. We notice that Peake's have already moved in this matter asking for a booking station. They are entitled to it and we hope they will be successful. Improvements are needed at Lot 40 Station. Although we labor under such disadvantages the freight and passenger traffic here is greater than that of many booking stations, and if an agent was in charge, it would, on account of its position, become one of the most important stations on this branch. We hope ere long to have a freight house and better means of loading cars, as well as the approaches improved. We think we are reasonable in asking for these improvements and we trust our obliging and efficient Superintendent will see his way clear to grant them for the spring trade.

We expect the Local Government to grant a bonus to the Telephone Company to enable them to extend their line from Mount Stewart to St. Peter's Bay, thence to connect with the other line at Souris. They have bonused other lines and we think we are entitled to as many favors from them as any other district. It would only be a matter of about \$50, and we trust our member will take this in hand this session.

But the most urgent necessity of all is the improvement of St. Peter's Harbor. A sum of money (600 I think) was granted some few years ago for this purpose, and but about \$1600 was expended or thrown away, the contractor having failed to perform his contract; and notwithstanding the fact that the Minister promised on Parliament floor at Ottawa that the work would be "proceeded with in the spring" nothing has since been done. St. Peter's Harbor is a great boon to people for ten miles round, as well as to hundreds of fishermen from the neighboring Province, and by improvement by a wharf and extended breakwater would become an important shipping port. The several wharfs around this beautiful bay, encircled by fine farms for nearly twenty miles, are rapidly "returning to the dust," all on account of the lack of improvements at the mouth of the harbor. In fact, I know of no public improvement which would affect such a large territory, and which could be done at a very moderate cost. We beg to call the attention of our Dominion representatives, and ex-ditto, to the fact that our petition, asking for a grant for this purpose, is now in the Department at Ottawa.

We get the small share of almost everything at the disposal of the Government. In the host of employes in the civil service departments of the Dominion and local Governments, how many are from King's County? Can you answer, and blush not? We claim our share in such appointment. We claim that while millions are spent in other parts of Canada, we see not the thousands. That we are, of all the provinces, the least benefited by our present fiscal policy, and therefore should receive the greater attention. That the rate of freight on farm produce is far too high on our railway, inasmuch as Ontario is this year taking our oat market. We say our, because we are the nearer, but on account of freight are driven out. Think of paying a freight of twenty-five per cent on the cost of potatoes from Morell to the nearest shipping port; think of charging us seven cents per 100 lbs. more freight from Montreal to Morell or Lot 40 than to Souris, and then tell us we get fair play. Think of Germany sending potatoes to Boston or New York cheaper by far than we can to Halifax, and then tell us that we obtain our share of benefits in this age of progress.

This is an age of progress, and if we are to succeed as a farming country—if we are to be able to compete with our brother-farmers of the great new West—we must get out of the old, last century rut. This we cannot do while the present high rate of freight is continued on our railway, while our harbors and public works are neglected and improvements unattended to.

Come, gentlemen, we expect you to wake up. We elect you to Ottawa, not as ornaments, nor as specimens of the genus homo, not to tell us what our Great Dominion is destined to become, but to attend to these things, our home affairs. Country first, party second; and if you find you have not influence or talent enough to procure them, step down and out and give place to men who have.

Protection and Free Trade are weighty questions; but the good to be derived from either are hardly equal, as far as we are concerned, to the benefits to be derived from attention to our local affairs.

Pure-Bred Stock.

VALUABLE IMPORTATION FOR KING'S COUNTY.

A valuable lot of horses, cattle, sheep, and poultry arrived at Cardigan station on Monday, 30th December, ultimo, in charge of Mr. Leslie E. Poole, of Lower Montague, who, along with Hon. James Clow, had been away in Ontario for the purpose of selecting the animals referred to.

The importation consists of the bay Clydesdale stallion General Burnette, four years old, imported in 1888 from Scotland by Messrs. Robert Beith & Co., Bowmanville, Ontario, one of the largest firms of horse dealers in Canada. This horse is very compactly made, and although not so heavy as some of our draft horses, yet has many other points that will commend him to stock-raisers. He weighs 1830 pounds, and, as "Joe" says, "is all there, and don't you forget it."

The English Hackney stallion Gem, 9 years old, is a magnificent animal, weighing 1400 pounds, of solid color (bay), and is just the horse to cross with ordinary farm mares, combining as he does large size, splendid bone and muscle, grand form and spirited action. His get should sell for cavalry horses, and will likely add another attractive feature to the many that the Island has already for the horse buyer. Gem was imported from England in 1888, and was also bought from Messrs. Robt. Beith & Co. Too much praise cannot be given Messrs. Clow and Poole for their enterprise in bringing such fine animals to King's County.

The cattle include the yearling Ayrshire Bull Rifleman and the two-year-old heifer Model 2nd, from the celebrated herd of Thomas Guy, of Oshawa, Ontario. Both of these animals took first prize at the Toronto and London Exhibitions for 1889, and are beautiful specimens of that most valuable breed—the Ayrshire—that has always proved itself the farmer's friend. The sheep include a first prize yearling ram and two ewes of the Leicester breed, and they certainly do credit to the judgment of their purchasers. Some of the Queen's County exhibitors will have to look to their laurels at the Exhibition next fall, for this importation will be a formidable competitor. The poultry consists of a trio of Brown Leghorns and are very fine specimens of that breed. G. F. O.

Mr. MacVie, the chief blacksmith of this place, shed 18 horses on Monday last. He says that he shed no less than 40 horses the week before.

Mr. Gregory McDonald, while he was returning home from Captain Boudreau's on Sunday night was attacked by three men and got a bad beating. The offending men were not yet found. RESIDENTER.

Horse Notes.

Hermit, the most distinguished of English stallions, and that won the Derby of 1867, is alive and hearty at twenty-six.

Pistachio, the three-year-old brother of Nutwood, is described as an unusually fine looking colt, a chestnut in color, and as to gait a little inclined to pace.

Mocking Bird, that made a record of 2.17 1/2 last summer and was one of the ornaments of the Hamlin stable, was at one time in danger of going cheap under the auctioneer's hammer. A sale had been decided upon, the day fixed, and Mocking Bird, then a yearling, was among the lot to be disposed of. In driving a band of colts from one pasture to another, Mr. Hamlin noticed that Mocking Bird displayed considerable speed at the trot and ordered her to be kept out of the sale. She has rewarded the old gentleman's judgment in a marked manner, and he likes her well in consequence. The dam of Mocking Bird was an ordinary mare that cost Mr. Hamlin only \$125, and yet it is the current report that he refused \$30,000 for the old mare's 2.17 1/2 daughter not long ago.

News Notes.

A revolution is said to have broken out in San Salvador.

The Farmers' Alliance, of Lawrence, Kansas, have decided to boycott the dressed beef men.

At Huronton, Mich., on Tuesday last Theodore Gross, his wife and eight children and a visitor were burned to death in their dwelling.

News from Hayti is to the effect that there is an undercurrent of dissatisfaction in the island, which causes the Hyppolite Government to feel insecure.

The New Year honors dispensed by the Queen include the admission to the Privy Council of Sir John Lubbock, F. R. S., and Sir John Eldon Gorst, Q. C.

Eight negro prisoners were taken from jail by a mob at Barnwell Courthouse, S. C., on Saturday morning and shot. The negroes were charged with murder.

It is reported that the auditing officers of the United States treasury have discovered defalcations in the pay department of Marine Corps. The extent of the robbery, February is not yet known. Benjamin A. Justice, clerk of the paymaster, is the party named, at New York.
