The Charlottetown Driving Park will hold the spotlight on the Island sports scene for this week. Practically all organized activity with the exception of the Old Home Week harness racing programs comes to a stand-still in the Garden of The Gulf this week.

Activity got underway at the local racing oval yesterday afternoon with a "first" in that yesterday's program was the first Monday afternoon racing program in the history of the Charlottetown Driving Park.

Officials of the local racing association have two top notch cards set to leave the wire today with the first program scheduled to get underway at 2:30 p.m. and the evening card slated for 8:30.

Chief's Gal looms up as a popular choice with the patrons of the pari-mutuel and Mr. McElwyn Key going away on the rail in the fourth dash will be tough to head.

Dashes three and seven on tonight's program will have five top notch trotters competing for top money. Merry Note, The Sheik, Mary Leah, Audrey's Pride and Borderview Rocket.

Today's action has two top notch cards and there will be two cards each day for the remainder of the week with everything scheduled to be climaxed with the annual Gold Cup and Saucer race and parade on Friday.

Andy's Son Wins Twice In Patriot Invitational

With streaks of lightning lighting up the sky and thunder rolling in the background the cream of the Maritimes racing crop took to the oval at the Charlottetown Driving Park last evening to do battle in the \$2,500 Evening Patriot Invitational Pace. The mud splattered Andy's Son, owned by Eric and Harry Whobby of Dartmouth, N.S., and teamed by J. Moore proved again that he is the hottest pacer in the Atlantic provinces with wins in both ends of the Invitational. A light drizzle did nothing to decrease the excitement of the capacity crowd as the free-for-allers took to the track in the fourth dash for the first heat of the Invitational. Although the track had been somewhat damped by the rain, it was still firm as the starters left the gate and as expected Dee's Boy on the rail went to the top of the pack followed by Eloise Wick, starting from the number six position and Andy's Son. At the quarter the field was fairly well together but at the half Eloise Wick had dropped out of contention and as the field paced by the stands it was Dee's Boy, Andy's Son, Borderview Roy, Huckster, Hurrah and Eloise Wick. As they started down the backstretch for the second time Andy's Son pulled out and went to the top followed by Borderview Roy. In an amazing second last quarter on the wet track Andy's Son beat off the challenge in the stretch by Borderview Roy to take the first heat in a time of 2:06.2. By the time the eighth dash rolled around track conditions had deteriorated severely as a result of the continuing rain but after a meeting of the drivers and owners concerned it was decided to finish the classic. The field got off to a false start on the first attempt but the second attempt was successful as Eloise Wick went to the top on a track made treacherous by the rain followed by Huckster and Andy's Son tucked in the three hole. 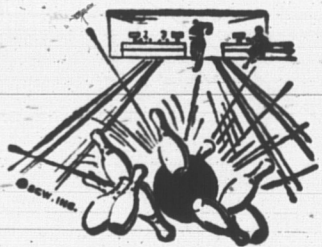
