TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Supreme Court—Prince Co.

The Grand Jury—A Small Docket Decision in the Scott Act.

SUMMERSIDE, Oct. 4. The Supreme Court opened here at eleven o'clock, Judge Hensley presiding.

The following are the names of the Grand Jury: John R. Calhoun, foraman; Lewis Muttart, James A. Sharp, John O'Connor, William Burrows, Wilson Howatt, Hugh A. Lowther, George Price, John J. Arsenault, Alexander Anderson.

They have to consider only one criminal case.

There are twenty-three civil cases, half of which are remands.

The Scott Act has been declared in force in Summerside and Prince County.

There is general rejoicing in consequence.

The Judge severely condemned the violators of the Scott Act, who, he said, should have waited till the Court had decided.

UNITED STATES.

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 1.

A special form Wantonia, Wis., says a terrible tornado swept the valley a short distance west of that town on Thursday, devastating a space eighty rods wide and five or six miles in length. Many houses, barns and outbuildings and one grist mill were demolished. About a dozen persons were seriously injured. The damage to property will exceed \$50,000.

A tornado, early on Thursday morning, nearly demolished Madison, a town of one thousand inhabitants, in this State. The railway buildings were wrecked. Most of the private residences are believed to be levelled, and two persons are known to have been killed. Telegraph wires are down. The Union Pacific Railway sent out a train for the homeless people and for its officers.

HOPKINS, Ark., Oct. 1.

The examination of the train robbers of the Iron Mountain Road took place on Friday. Their identity was established by fourteen witnesses. They were bound over in \$3,000 each.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 1.

The Linseed Oil Works of Grove & Brother, at Greenwich Point, were burned this morning; loss \$150,000.

BRISTOL, Pa., Oct. 1.

Thomas Hughes & Co., manufacturers of hosiery, have suspended. Liabilities \$164,000.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 1.

The whaling schooner R. B. Handy, Capt Winans, arrived yesterday from the Arctic Sea. She brought Capt. Gifford and the crew of the whaler Daniel Webster, which was crushed by ice near Point Barrow. Capt Gifford confirms the cablegram published in the New York "Herald" of the 21st ult., that the natives had seen the wrecked ship far to the eastward and four white men among the natives; in conversation between Capt Gifford and the natives, conducted mostly by signs, it was difficult to understand from the signs whether these four men were either dead or sick, as the natives indicated their condition as being one of sleep. There is a similarity in the statement of the Esquimaux concerning the wreck and that relative to the location of the wreck of the Vigilant. Capt. Winans advances the theory that the Jennette has sought the northeast passage around North America and mentions as the thread of evidence leading that way that the Indians who reported to Capt. Gifford the wreck to the eastward produced a new brass kettle which came from the wreck. The kettle was new and bright and just from the store, having the name and place of the manufacturer, which the captain thinks was Waterbury, Mass., but lost the record he made of it at the time. No ship has been in that vicinity during the last two years, and it would seem that there were articles from the ship before that time; they would have been made use of, for soon after a native brought it to Point Barrow and it was immediately utilized.

IRELAND.

LONDON, Oct. 1.

Father Conway, parish priest of Clonfert, has been sentenced to two months' imprisonment, at hard labor, for assaulting a bailiff who served him with a writ at the suit of Lord Ardilawn. Notice of appeal was given.

The News Dublin despatch says the Land League has selected about four hundred test cases. In all these the tenants have been evicted for non-payment of rent since Feb. 22nd.

DUBLIN, Oct. 1.

Serious incendiary fires occurred about Kildare last night. Considerable excitement was caused by the report that the hay yard of Daniel Cleary, just outside the town, was ablaze. While people were extinguishing this, another hay yard, near town, was fired; and this was immediately followed by the firing of a hay yard belonging to Samuel Chaplin, J. P. Two other fires followed, and further reports are coming in. Timely discovery prevented serious losses.

CORK, Oct. 1.

Parnell, T. P. O'Connor, T. M. Healy and Father Sheehy participated in a large mass meeting at the Park to-day. Parnell in supporting a resolution calling for the national independence of Ireland, said if, as the result of the Land Act, it should happen that the tenants receive any benefit they must recollect it is their duty to refuse that benefit unless it could be shared by laborers and artisans of all classes in the country. Father Sheehy supported the resolution.

Parnell, speaking at a banquet held subsequently, said during the past two years the national cause had advanced in proportion of 20 to 1.
