(Continued from page one) uation, practice of brotherhood, "although we all have preferences and we have predilections, we must have new efforts to ward international co-operation.

"Finally," he said, "we can face the challenge of change if we reaffirm the importance of faith, as despite the changes which have produced, there has been no change in the nature of man, or his relations." In fact in training, partnership, we can look for guidance to the basic principles of religion.

Senator Kennedy said that "the education you have received can help in making a contribution to society. We have learned to broaden our horizons, to be tolerant of what is different, to let facts eliminate prejudice and to live with change. You must be prepared not only to adjust to our society, but to improve it."

In closing he urged the graduates "to assume the responsibilities of educated men and women and to do more than fulfill your obligations in yourself and family, but also participate in public life. Your education is a trust which must be used to modernize its cities, creating jobs, and improving culture and economic opportunities for government. But above all it needs you in the everyday practice of brotherhood which is the principle of our faith, the heritage of our history, and our warrant to the world."

Liberal Gov't Policies Said "Weakening" Confederation

HEALTH MAQUARIE, MP for Queens on a one-day visit to his constituency Tuesday described policies of the Pearson government as disturbing and serious and leading clearly and inevitably to a weakening of Confederation.

He said Premier Shaw's recent comment on Public Works Minister Deschamps' statement regarding no further increase in Federal contributions to highway construction serves to illustrate the point.

"If the Dominion government surrenders revenue and initiative to the provinces it will not be in a position to assist in providing an equality of services for Canadians in the smaller provinces," he contended.

Nikita Gives New Blast At British

CAIRO (Reuters) — Soviet Premier Khrushchev has repeated his support for Egypt by declaring a new blast against British bases in the Middle East while urging the Egyptians for their role in the 1956 Suez crisis.

Khrushchev's latest avowal of support for Egyptian foreign policy was made in a radio-cast speech Tuesday during a visit to a factory near Cairo.

The Soviet leader, who arrived here on Saturday on a 16-day state visit, said Russia was the first to challenge the capitalist world at a time when the "imperialist countries" were strong and the Soviet Union weak.

"But we were victorious," he said.

"The picture now is different," he declared. "You defeated three imperialist countries (a reference to the Suez campaign by Britain, France and Israel) and you tripped the British lion by its tail."

The Soviet leader said Russia wanted to live in friendship with the British people on the basis of equality and on the basis of trade.

"But we shall never support Britain's imperialist policy in the remaining colonies she has in various parts of the world like Aden and other areas. We are definitely against this policy."

The premier said Russia was trying to bring about complete and full disarmament of all weapons.

"We shall repeat our efforts until the various peoples of the whole world believe in the necessity of banning all weapons of destruction or extermination of man so that all efforts could be devoted to the service of man," he promised.

Defence Minister Hellyer said in closing the debate that the Liberal government is increasing Canada's defence capability not reducing it as the Conservatives had claimed.

Let members and interlopers carrying out a weapons would become operational later this year both in Canada and West Germany, increasing the West's deterrent to war.

The two RCAP stations in France, forbidden by the French government from using American nuclear warheads, would switch from bombing to reconnaissance roles, the minister said.

The M-115 armoured personnel carrier ordered recently to the army would go into regular production early in 1965 and the first models would be available later this year. These carriers would "dramatically" boost the army's mobility and effectiveness.

Hercules and Caribou transport aircraft for the air force would be ordered about the same time, he said.

The goal was to develop a unified, flexible and highly mobile force.
