

Hall Decisions McCluskey; Ace, Ryan Fight To Draw

Relentless Dick Hall, 148 pounds of Boston, Mass., who fires punches like a well oiled piston, scored an unanimous ten round decision over classy Cobey McCluskey in a gruelling fight at the Sports Arena last night. McCluskey weighed 153 pounds.

The youthful Hall, on his way up the fistic ladder, piled up points in the middle rounds, withstood a terrific McCluskey attack in the eighth round and fought on even terms for the last two sessions. In early rounds the officials in a close fight.

Judge Danny McCormack scored four rounds for Hall, three for McCluskey and three even. Judge Earl Smith called it 5-4-1 and Referee Bud Lund 4-3-3. There were no knockdowns.

"Ace" McCluskey, called on his old time punching power to batter Mickey Ryan in the sixth round and send his comeback hopes soaring as he fought to a draw with the smooth working Ryan from Brockton, Mass. McCluskey weighed 168 pounds and Ryan 170.

Fighting "Bud" Ramsay, 150 pounds of Summerside, displayed the best form of his career to stop Jimmy O'Malley of South Boston at 1:52 of the fifth round after he had loomed his opponent three times. O'Malley weighed 150 pounds.

In the curtain raiser Leo "Whisper" Steele, 134 pounds a Charlestown fought to a draw with "Peanuts" Arsenault, 141 pounds of Summerside.

The Hall-McCluskey main bout was a rematch from a July 4th fight here which ended in a draw. Last night's battle was every bit as savage and almost as close as the two battlers displayed to the crowd the sciences of offensive and defensive boxing.

The two battlers spent the opening round at long range, warming up and feeling each other out. They started to work in earnest in the second round which Hall had taken away from him on ac-

count of low blows. In the third round they went to town in vicious fashion ripping one another in close. Hall started to score hard in the fourth round and from there on the battlers had the fans on the ends of their seats.

Hall pressed hard during the middle rounds and McCluskey fought brilliantly to stop the Boston boy. In the sixth round Hall measured his man in McCluskey's own corner but Cobey fought his way out of a tough situation.

The seventh round was one of the best of the fight. Hall was clearly looking for the knockout but again McCluskey fought back to take the play away from the visitor.

The eighth round was clearly the best of the night for McCluskey. He caught Hall with a good left-right combo early in the round and dominated matters for the next three minutes. He outpunch-

ed Hall who seemed to be tiring. The Charlestown boxer also had an edge in the ninth round and in the tenth round the boys traded blows on fairly even terms.

Brother "Ace" McCluskey showed the fans that he still has what it takes to make a boxer as he staged a terrific sixth round comeback to punch Mickey Ryan around the ring and earn a draw in what might be termed the "Battle of the split trunks." Both fighters had trouble with their trunks and twice the fight had to be stopped while new garments were secured.

Ryan, a big smooth working boxer, outboxed the game "Ace" during the early rounds but late in the fight round McCluskey began scoring with his powerful left and almost hooked himself a victory.

Both fighters were bloody sight at the end of the fight, as they bled freely from their re-

spective noses. Ryan scored hard to the head during the early rounds but took punishment to his mid-section in return. "Ace" was given a big hand from the crowd at the end of the fight.

"Bud" Ramsay showed himself to be a veritable tiger as he man-handled Jimmy O'Malley. The Bostonian looked like a winner the first round but Ramsay's hard punches cut him down. Ramsay dropped his man twice in the third round and once more in the fourth round and again in the fifth when referee Wulf McCluskey wisely stopped the bout.

There were no knockdowns in the curtain raiser as Steele and Arsenault fought to a draw. Both boys got in their kicks and the decision was a good one.

A large crowd of fans attended the fight promoted by Ivan Doherty who once again brought boxing fans a top notch card.

Losing Is New Experience For A's Billy Martin

NEW YORK (AP)—Losing is a new experience for Billy Martin and he doesn't like it although he says he's trying just as hard since he's traded from New York Yankees to the Kansas City Athletics.

"It gets so you don't want to go anywhere or do anything," Martin said Thursday. "You just want to sit around and pout."

"I was with the Yankees eight years and used to lose once in a while. Now we lose a lot. Then you go home and think about it. About what you can do personally to help. And all you can do is try."

Martin, pepper-pot second baseman who used to scrap if necessary to help the Yankees win, has been named to the Kansas City roster for 45 games since he was obtained by the Athletics from New York on the June 15 trading deadline.

Of the 45 games, the Athletics have won 13 and lost 32, including 12 losses in 13 tries against New York. The 32 defeats, in six weeks, are only two less than the Yan-

kees have suffered all season. "YOU GET SO MAD?" Martin has tried his best, hitting at a better than .300 pace in a Kansas City uniform to raise his average 30 points to .271.

Ever a fierce competitor, Martin pestered his ex-mates all afternoon Wednesday, collecting three hits off Bob Turley in the first game and getting on base twice by walks in the second game.

But it wasn't enough, the Yanks sweeping the doubleheader 2-0 and 5-4 to make it 16 of 17 over the Athletics this season.

"You get so mad," Martin said, "that it starts to hurt your baseball. You do things you wouldn't do."

"Like let's say the score is tied and you go up there and try to hit a home run. You're not a home run hitter but you try to do it all by yourself. Can't tell you how much you try."

"And it's not a real bad club," he added. "We just lose those darn one-run games."

Bob Bragan Told To Stop Clowning On Ball Field

CINCINNATI (AP)—Bobby Bragan, manager of Pittsburgh Pirates, was told bluntly Thursday to quit clowning on the baseball field or face indefinite suspension.

W.C. Giles, president of the National League, advised the Pirates leader just where he stood, and fined him \$100 for sauntering onto the field Wednesday night in Milwaukee, sipping from a bottle of soda, after he had been thrown out of the game. Bobby offered each of the umpires a drink from his bottle.

But the brash young man, when reached in Chicago after Giles had his say, came right back with a crack that his clowning was "well worth the money." Then, in serious vein, he added:

"I'm very cognizant of the danger of any repetition." Giles declined comment on Bragan's Chicago statement.

Bragan, who came out of the minor leagues with a reputation for unusual managerial tactics, was ordered out of Wednesday night's game by umpire Stan Landes for holding his nose to show how he felt about a decision. The soda episode followed.

"SERIOUS BUSINESS?" "Your repeated farcical acts on the field indicate it is not your nature to take the game on the field seriously," Giles said in a telegram to Bragan. "We and others consider it a serious business and to be conducted as such. I will not tolerate antics such as you have engaged in."

Giles ordered Bragan to pay a \$100 fine by game time Aug. 5, and then added this warning:

"Any future offense of this nature will subject you to indefinite suspension."

Only Wednesday he had rejected a request by Bragan that the umpire team of Frank Dascoll, Bill Baker, Frank Secory and Landes be broken up, declaring they had thrown 30 players, coaches or managers out of games this year.

Giles said Bragan's figures were very wrong and plainly stated his office would continue to handle the umpire situation without managerial help.

Mantle Ahead Of Ruth's Pass Record

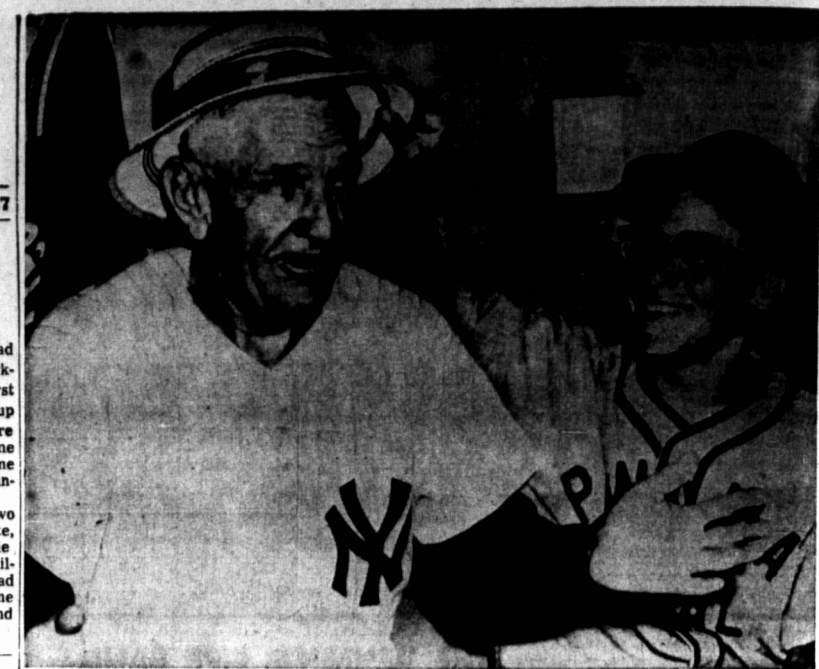
NEW YORK (AP)—The Yankees' Mickey Mantle, who challenged but fell short of Babe Ruth's home run record last season, now is running ahead of another of the Babe's all-time achievements.

In 59 games, Mantle has received 14 walks. If he continues the pace, he will finish with 178 compared to Ruth's major league record of 170 in 1923.

Mantle already has surpassed his own personal high for walks in a season when he drew 113 in 1955.

Dodgers Defeat Chicago White Sox & Red Sox Lose

Brooklyn Dodgers warmed up for tonight's opener in a three-games show to win at Milwaukee with a 12-3 romp over Chicago's last-place Cubs Thursday as Gil Hodges set a National League record with his 13th career grand-slam home run.

It was the only day game scheduled in the National League, where St. Louis Cardinals could slip past Milwaukee into first place with a night game victory over the New York Giants. Philadelphia and Cincinnati also met in a night game.

In the American League, the first-place New York Yankees were idle, but took a four-game lead at last-place Washington behind the second-place Chicago White Sox 5-4. Detroit stood off a ninth-inning Boston rally to beat the Red Sox 7-5 and gain 4 share of fourth place with Cleveland in the only other game scheduled.

BOYS HORNSBY, KINER Hodges, Brooklyn's 33-year-old first baseman and handyman, broke a tie with Rogers Hornsby and Ralph Kiner for the league record with a rap into the center-field bleachers against rookie eighthorder Bob Anderson as the Dodgers bagged it with five runs in the fifth inning. Hodges also had a sacrifice fly for a total of five RBIs.

Yankee Lou Gehrig set the major league record for bases-loaded homers with 21. Ted Williams of Boston Red Sox leads active players with 14.

Sandy Amoros and Roy Campanella, who drove in three runs, each had three hits as the Dodgers edged Los Angeles 3-2. Hodges and three relievers for 18 hits and made the most of six Cub errors. Sandy Koufax won his fifth, third from the Cubs, with a four-hitter, giving up a three-run homer to Ernie Banks in the fourth inning.

He fanned 11, hiking his season total to 94—with 3 of the strikeouts against the Cubs. HOMER NOT ENOUGH Larry Doby, playing in his 11th season, hit his 27th career home run, but first bases-loaded job, for a 4-0 White Sox lead in the fourth inning at Washington. The Senators scored one in their fourth on Roy Sievers' sacrifice fly, then nailed it with three in the sixth as Sievers hit his 28th home run, with a RBI double. Chuck Stobbs, 14, won it with relief help. Bill Fischer lost it in relief.

Sievers', matching Yankee Mickey Mantle for the No. 2 spot behind Williams (29) in the American League home run derby, has hit 111 against Chicago. He has five more games against the White Sox and a chance to beat the major league record for most home runs against one club in one season set by Gehrig with 14 against Cleveland in 1936.
