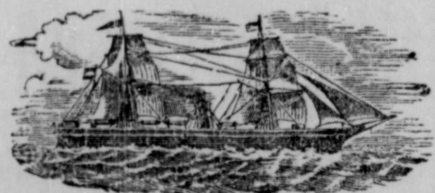

GREECE AND TURKEY.

Fighting in Macedonia—Successes on Both Sides.

LARISSA, April 17.—Severe fighting has occurred at Macedonia between the Greek irregulars and the Turkish forces, with success and reverses on both sides.

ATHENS, April 17.—A force of Greek insurgents is reported to have entered Epirus, but this statement must be accepted with reserve.

LARISSA, April 15.—Trustworthy reports received here Tuesday confirm the statements that the Greek irregulars have captured Baltino, in Macedonia. The Turks lost forty men killed.

CANEA, April 14.—While fifty Turkish soldiers were landing to reinforce the forts at Missamo, the Greeks fired on the boat. Several shots struck the Austrian boat, which was assisting, whereupon the Austrian gunboats and one Turkish bombarded the Greeks and repulsed them. It is said that the Cretans recently impaled outside the forts Turkish non-commissioned officer whom they had captured.

LONDON, April 15.—The Athens correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says that advices from Epirus represent the situation there as a reign of terror. The Turks are laying the country waste with fire and sword. The Vall of Jenina has ordered every Christian to give the Turkish army ten sheep and a bullock.

LONDON, April 15.—A despatch to the Daily News from Constantinople says that the Turkish version of the fighting at Baltino has been published in the newspaper Ikdam, which states that 5,000 Greek troops were allowed to attack the place. Their retreat was cut off and the Greeks were finally worsted, leaving 2,000 dead and dying upon the field. The Ikdam adds: "Out of pure magnanimity the Turks took no prisoners."

NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL

SPECULATION ON THE TARIFF

Not Much of a Cut, and No Free Trade.

OTTAWA, April 17.—As the time for the budget approaches, all sorts of rumors go about concerning the prospective tariff. The business opinion seems to accept the idea that agricultural implements will be averaged at a rate somewhat lower than the present highest and higher than the lowest, perhaps 25 per cent; that the woolen and cotton schedule will be simplified, but not greatly reduced. The oil men do not expect a cut of more than 1 cent per gallon, and the western men still look for free coal.

The Spanish to Withdraw.

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Advices received here say that part of the Spanish army will be withdrawn from Cuba at the beginning of the rainy season.
