

IN MEMORIAM

R. ALLAN CAMPBELL

News of the passing of Mr. R. Allan Campbell at his home at Long River on March 11th, 1952, brought sorrow and regret to relatives and friends both there and in other communities.

The late Mr. Campbell was born in Long River, a son of Mr. and Mrs. John Campbell, but lived and worked for a time in Montague before returning to settle on the homestead. He was in his 74th year, and although in uncertain health for several years, he had been seriously ill for only a short time prior to his death.

He is survived by his wife, the former Lucy MacLeod, one daughter, Hazel, in Hollister, California, and one son, Stanford, in Morgan Hills, California. Of seven brothers, Gordon, John and Grafton live in Hollister, California, George in Susanville, California, Elwood in Summerside, P. E. I., and Donald and Heath in Long River, P. E. I.

Following a short service at his late home, the funeral was held from Long River Presbyterian Church, and was conducted by the minister, the Rev. D.A. Campbell, who was assisted by the Rev. S. H. Haslam of the United Church, who led in prayer.

The hymns chosen were: "The Lord's My Shepherd", "Abide With Me", and "Sleep on Beloved Sleep, And Take Thy Rest". Messrs. Ernest Dunning and Andrew Johnstone sang "Nearer To Heaven" as a duet.

Taking for his text, Jeremiah 31-3, "Yea, I have loved thee with an everlasting love, therefore with loving kindness have I drawn thee," Mr. Campbell brought a comforting and inspiring message to the mourners, and paid warm tribute to the life of the deceased. He especially noted his loyalty to his church and his faithfulness in the choir, and recalled as well the hospitality of his home and his interest and help in any work in the community.

The pallbearers were four nephews, Messrs. Elmer MacLeod, Archie Campbell, Eric Campbell, Edwin Campbell, William Campbell and Arthur Johnstone.

There were a great many floral tributes from friends and relatives near and far away. Burial was at the Geddie Memorial Cemetery, New London.

Time was when we used to get at least a couple of those championships, and sometimes more than that, but the going has been tough of late. Last year Lippy Gaudet's bantams saved us from a white-washing by beating the Charlottetown bantams 5 to 0 in the final game to annex the Island bantam title.

This year, the Mercurys were eliminated from the intermediate picture by Alberton who in turn were beaten by those old perennial champs, the Borden Nationals. We didn't have any juniors, and our juveniles were beaten two games to one by the Charlottetown juvenile Abbies. By the way, Lippy ended the hockey season with a bit of a deficit, which could be expected when you consider that all Summerside teams have to travel now to play hockey. But J. K. Curran, who rarely fails a sports aggregation in a pinch, came through with a donation to take Lippy and his girls out of the red.
