Set World Mark That Still Stands

In the fall of 1900 I was asked by H. R. Large, Captain of the Charlottetown Salvage Corps, to get together a team that would represent the Corps in the Fireman's Tournament which was to take place at Halifax the next August. I was told the particulars. The Salvage Corps wagon with a rope lead would be drawn by ten young men and the distance was to be a quarter of a mile. There was quite a number of good athletes around at the time and I interested the best of them and had them join up. Two were already members of the Corps. They are shown in the accompanying picture. Back row from left to right — H. L. Bethune, Frank Creamer, Arthur Cameron, J. A. Webster, J. Walter Jones, D. A. MacKinnon. Front row — L. B. MacMillan, Charles Mitchell, Les Adams, Phil Duffy, J. A. MacMillan.
Arthur Cameron had won the Maritime championship for the quarter mile the previous year and was also an excellent half-mile runner. James MacMillan had competed in the Maritime championships and while not a Maritime champion runner then, he was shortly afterwards. The team combined the necessary elements to make it a record-breaking one. Jones and Webster were placed at the back of the wagon, Arthur Cameron and Frank Creamer at the front. The team was led by the other athletes placed at intervals along the rope. The two leaders were at the starting point when the starter's pistol was fired. Jones and Webster used all their strength to give the wagon its initial push. The time was carefully taken by official timers and when the team finished it was announced to be 1.04 3/5 — a world's record which we believe still stands.

Wings Aim At Player Trade

DETROIT (CP) — Jack Adams, general manager of the Detroit Red Wings, said Saturday the Wings may organize another National Hockey League trade before next September.
The Wings have just completed big trades with both Chicago Black Hawks and Boston Bruins. Adams said the Wings are in a "strong position" in player talent, but are faced with the problem of protecting the players before the National Hockey League player draft in September.
NHL teams can protect 18 players and two goalies against draft by other teams. The Wings now have 17 regulars and four juniors coming up, three more than can be put on the protected list.

TORONTO (CP)—Peter Firstbrook, young Canadian skating star and former partner of Barbara Ann Scott, Friday night was beaten and robbed by four youths who forced him to drive around the city and cash some traveller's cheques he had with him, police said.
Hamilton youth, Andrew Brady, 22, was arrested Saturday on a charge of armed robbery.
The 23-year-old skater told police he was driving home around midnight when the four, in an old-model car, stopped him and asked if he would drive an injured companion because their car wouldn't go.
Firstbrook said he drove them to a mid-town house and then was forced to accompany them to several hotels in the city and cash the cheques, they found in his car.
He said they roughed him up a bit to make him comply. He displayed a battered nose to prove it.
Firstbrook said one of the youths had a knife and the other had a screwdriver with which they threatened him.
He said they took \$5 he had in his wallet and forced him to cash \$50 in traveller's cheques. Firstbrook managed to break away at a hotel after his attempts to cash a cheque there failed. He asked the clerk to summon police.
Brady was arrested when he called at a west-end police station to report his car stolen. The number he gave was the same number Firstbrook reported belonged to the car in which the four youths were riding when he first encountered them.

Quebec PC's Plan Election
QUEBEC (CP) — Progressive Conservative delegates from 27 Quebec ridings began making plans Saturday for the next federal election, but turned down a suggestion that the party unite with the CCF and Social Credit to overthrow the Liberals.
Some 500 representatives from ridings east of Trois-Rivieres attended the meeting, the first by the party to prepare for the next election expected in 1957.
The suggestion for amalgamation with other opposition parties came from Raymond Maher, Conservative candidate who opposed Prime Minister St. Laurent in Quebec East in the last federal election. Maher withdrew the recommendation, however, after being told it was against party policy as outlined recently by leader George Drew.

SAVE CONSTITUTION
Mr. Drew, speaking at the evening banquet, said "the next election may be the last chance to save our constitution."
"Step by step, in the last 10 years, the Canadian government has moved farther and farther toward complete centralization," Mr. Drew said. "If this trend continues, we will have unitary government in Canada."

General Motors Retain Position Top Advertiser
NEW YORK (AP) — General Motors Corp., which spent \$37,391,415 on newspaper advertising in 1954, topped the list of 100 leading national newspaper advertisers for the eighth consecutive year, it was announced Saturday by the bureau of advertising of the American Newspaper Publishers Association.
GM's 1954 expenditure, an all-time high, was 13.5 per cent more than its 1953 expenditure of \$32,944,248.
The top five national newspaper advertisers including GM were, in order of rank: Ford Motor Co., \$17,929,652; Chrysler Corp., \$11,787,567; Colgate-Palmolive Co., \$10,990,682; and Distillers Corp.-Seagram's Ltd., \$9,815,375.
The bureau announced that for all national newspaper advertisers investing \$25,000 or more in the medium, it was the second best year on record. National advertisers paper advertising a drop of 1.2 per cent from the 1953 all-time high of \$601,224,000.
