JOHN, Aug. 29. There is ample reason to believe that gangs of skilled burglars are located in this city. On Friday morning last at an early hour the residence of Sineora Jones was broken into. On Saturday morning the burglars—no doubt the same ones—entered Wm Gievan's house on Hazen Street and stole therefrom a number of silver spoons, some napkin rings and six dollars in cash. On Sunday morning they operated on the Carleton side of the harbor, selecting the residence of Joseph Scammell as a place most likely to afford booty. They secured quite a lot of silverware and about \$200 in money. The police are at their wits end and don't know what to do. March of the Cholera. LONDON, Aug. 29. The person afflicted with Cholera, brought to Gravesend in the steamer Guraia from Hamburg, is dead. There are no signs of the disease spreading in Great Britain. Cholera continues to spread in central Russia, though the mortality is not so alarming. A number of new cases are reported in Paris. In Hamburg, 416 new cases were reported on Friday and 150 deaths up to noon; on Saturday 728 new cases were reported and 55 deaths. Yesterday there were 71 new cases and 25 deaths in Havre. Big Ship in Jeopardy. NEW YORK, Aug. 29. The big N. v. Scotia ship Jane Burrill is at sea in a disabled condition, and grave fears are felt for her safety on account of bad weather experienced by vessels that have arrived within the past week. The Jane Burrill is commanded by Capt. Wm. Robertson, and sailed from Copenhagen for this port on July 17th. She registered 1735 tons, and was built in 1889 by J. E. Burrill at Little Brook. She is owned by Wm. Burrill of Yarmouth, and carried a crew of twenty-two men. A Crazy Woman. HALIFAX, Aug. 29. An old school fellow of the late Sir John Inglis, read an item published in the papers last week about a woman applying at the police station for shelter, who claimed to be a relative of that distinguished soldier. The gentleman called at the P. o. s. and saw the woman. He ascertained (1) she never saw or knew Sir John Inglis; (2) did not even know the name of Lady Inglis; (3) knew nothing whatever about his family; and (4) is crazy. Immigration Scheme. OTTAWA, Aug. 29. Mayor Blake, who is prominent by his connection with the commercial phase of the Crofter Immigration Scheme, is here on route to England for the purpose of organizing a syndicate. As soon as the company is formed it will be under an agreement with the British Columbia Government. They must deposit with the treasurer \$100,000 as an evidence of good faith. Seizures in Behring Sea. PORT TOWNSEND, Aug. 29. Advice from Sitka, Alaska, state that the whaling bark Lydia was seized in Behring Sea while transferring sealkins to the bark Northern Light, and was fined \$100 and released. Captain Hansen, of the schr. Winnifred, was also seized for illegal sealing. He waived examination and was released on a \$500 bond. A Large Operator. LONDON, Aug. 29. Scott Sanders, an ex-captain of the Fusiliers, has been arrested in Liverpool, charged with forging a cheque of £3,700 (Sterling) in the name of Lord Londesborough.
