Small Consolation.

It at last becomes necessary to predict the near approach of the end of the Macdonald Government in Canada.

The editor of the Patriot, in his last issue, heads an article against the Dominion Government, with the extracts above from the American press.

Another Grit Invention-Nailed.

Saturday's Patriot contains an article, copied, of course, from a paper of equal fairness, headed "Bishop Cleary repudiates Toryism."

Bishop Cleary is one of the most influential Roman Catholic prelates in Ontario. He favored the Mowat government in the local contest of a few weeks ago; and the Grits have been trying hard to get him to favor their party in the Dominion elections.

In his reply to the address, the bishop soundly repudiated the insult offered by the Tories here in saying that he was a supporter of Sir John Macdonald.

In reply to this, Father E. J. Walsh, the parish priest at Trenton, wrote to the Globe:

I should have no reason to complain of your correspondent's meagre summary of the profound principles and noble sentiments spoken with such weight of authority to my people, but for your correspondent's introduction of one short sentence, which seems to have been intended, as everyone here understands it to be, as a key for a selfish and partisan interpretation of His Lordship's most unselfish and unpolitical remarks.

(Here follows the short paragraph above.) Your correspondent will excuse me for declaring this to be a wholly unwarranted and distinctly untruthful interpretation.

Not one word did the bishop say in the church of Trenton about "Tories," or the "Tory party," or "Sir John Macdonald," or "his supporters," or about "insult" offered by them to His Lordship.

The Globe, not satisfied with Father Walsh's denial, sent a reporter to interview Bishop Cleary, but did not meet with any success. In reply to the reporter, the Bishop said:

The letter which you produce to me, as addressed, to the Globe by the pastor of Trenton, clearly expresses the grounds of disapproval well on my part as on his. He calls particular attention to one short sentence. I regard that sentence as not only untrue, but a very improper interference by the correspondent of the Globe, whoever he is, with the sacred rights of a bishop addressing his own congregation from the altar on a solemn occasion.

While Edward Blake is preaching Protection in Ontario, avowing himself a strong supporter of the National Policy, his satellite in this Province, Mr. L. H. Davies, is striving to dupe the people into the belief that the party he represents is in favor of Free Trade.

Liberal Superannuation.

The Grits claim that Sir John has abused the superannuation of members of the Civil Service. By a return made to Parliament we find that, on an average, each man superannuated by Mr. McKenzie has drawn out of the Government \$5,083, and paid in \$137, being \$37 to \$100; whilst in Sir John's administration the average drawn out was \$2,124, and paid in \$168, or a fraction over \$12 out, to \$100 paid in!

Remember.

Let the people remember that when Sir John came into power in 1878, Canada had only 6,484 miles of railway, while now we have nearly 12,000 miles, and the burden of the debt per head has not increased, and the credit of the country has increased from 6 below par on 4 per cent. bonds to 7 above par on the same bonds.

THE NATIONAL POLICY VS. THE CARTWRIGHT TARIFF—THE TWO POLICIES CONTRASTED.

UNDER REVENUE TARIFF. UNDER NATIONAL POLICY.

PERIOD 1875 TO 1878. PERIOD 1880 TO 1886. No Canadian Pacific railway. Canadian Pacific railway finished.

Only 6,484 miles of railway in Canada. Nearly 12,000 miles of railway in Canada.

Railway receipts weekly diminishing. Railway receipts weekly increasing, through rates much lower.

Four per cent. bonds of Canada quoted at 6 below par. Four per cent. bonds quoted at 7 above par.

Cartwright could only get \$91 for each \$100 bonds. Sir Leonard gets a premium of \$1.50 for each \$100 bond.

Cartwright had to pay four and a half million dollars in shaves to the money brokers for his loans. He secured his last loan at a gain in premiums of \$122,000.

Credit of the country down and going down rapidly. Credit of the country up and rising rapidly.

Net interest on public debt, \$1.9 per head in 1878. Net interest per head (in 1885) \$1.59, though fifty-three and a half million dollars has been added to the public debt for public improvements.

Decrease of net interest every year of period except 1885-6, when to complete the Canadian Pacific railway five years before contract time the whole of the subsidy was paid.
