AMONG THE FARMERS

Federation of Agriculture Newsletter

This year's farm forum season which gets underway on November 2 will feature a series on marketing, one on adjustments in agriculture and a variety of topics related to such matters as Unemployment Insurance, the hazards of farming and education in Agricultural colleges related to farm organizations. The January series dealing with adjustments takes up such questions as the number of farms—Who should stay? Who should leave? Who should decide? Next, price supports will be gone into, are the hindering or helping adjustments. What about credit? What can be done to ease the situation?

These are only a sample of the timely and important matters which farm forum members will be studying during the coming year. There probably never were more to learn about than at the present time and the need for learning is urgent if farmers are going to adjust to the modern revolution in agriculture.

PLOUGHING
Ploughing has long been considered the basic farm operation. Even though there are those who advocate substitute methods, good ploughing will likely continue for some time to indicate the attitude of the farmer to his work. While there may not be a great deal of difference under modern methods of cultivation between the results obtained from rough ploughing and good ploughing, yet good ploughing justifies itself as an advertisement and from the standpoint of satisfaction in a job well done.

THREE WAY MILK
Something new has appeared in the dairy world, a product known as "Three Way Milk". It is a concentrated milk, 12% butterfat and containing 36% solids. The new product when mixed with two parts water is used for drinking purposes, with one part water for cereal use and straight from the container for cream. In Ontario, the raw milk going into this product can be purchased at a condenser milk price. So far no selling price has been announced but it is understood that plants are to make the new product available at stores through that province. The fluid milk people will of course be watching with every considerable interest the impact of the newcomer.

SKIM FLOOR
As of October 1 there is no longer a support price on skim milk powder. During the summer months the Government was buying surplus powder at 10 cts. a pound, from now on plants producing this product would be under the necessity of finding their own markets. Powder in the hands of the Government will be offered for sale at 10½ cts. per pound, basis in store Montreal or Toronto and this price will be in effect until December 31 when the price will be raised to 11c.

BUTTER PRODUCTION
In spite of excellent and abundant pasture butter production for the month of September is down in the province as compared with last year. Grazing was also excellent last year but we are still puzzled as to why the production should fall below that of the same period in 1958.

RELIGION AND LIFE

HE HAD SEEN THE RISEN LORD
Alexander Pope once wrote—"Vice is a monster of such hideous mien
That, to be hated, needs but to be seen;
Yet, seen too oft, familiar with her face,
We first endure, then pity, then embrace."
This moral peril was illustrated in Harold Begbie's story of a journalist in the Far East, Begbie met this man in London, England. When some religious issue came up in their conversation, the stranger expressed amazement that in a Christian land, men could think of religion in any other terms than that of just following Christ.

This led to the story of his conversion.
He had been living in a city somewhere "east of Suez where there ain't no ten" commandments."
All round him he saw corrupt practices which he loathed. The very thought of descending to that level was abhorrent to him. But one day he found himself on the average of doing something detestable to him in other days. The sudden realization of this effect on himself of familiarity with other men's doings so shocked him that he decided that a revolution in his own inner life was necessary.

STAR HIS SYMBOL
Night after night he fixed his thought on a certain star as symbol of the "unknown helper" whom he appealed. He was sleeping on the part of persons from outside the province in the purchase of land. For the most part purchases which have been made or are rumored appear to involve larger farms. Certainly there are few if any places in North America where good desirable land can be bought for less money. To those people to whom 10, 20 or 30 thousand dollars is not a great amount, their money will probably buy more in the way of desirable property here than in any other part of the continent.

TRANSPORTATION
A Royal Commission is now getting underway in its examination of transportation problems in Canada. On September 17 and 18, the Commission held its first organizational meeting and established some of the areas in which it would operate. Over the objection of the western provinces the Commission has decided to examine the statutory freight rates which of course include the much discussed Crow's Nest Pass rates. Further the Commission decided that it would not hear evidence with respect to labor practices, agreements and utilization. First formal hearings are scheduled for the week of October 19 in the city of Toronto followed by Montreal and if necessary Quebec. Hearings in the Maritimes will start in November.
