## No Voting On Sable Island

HALIFAX (CP)—There was no voting in Tuesday's Nova Scotia election on lonely Sable Island, a spit of sand 10 miles off the province's south coast.

In federal elections, the island is recognized as part of Halifax riding. In the April 15 federal election 12 persons voted on the island.

The government denied this, saying industry was brought to Sable Island by the industry itself. A fish plant would be built at Canso, far to the east of Truro, and \$60,000,000 of public money had helped establish the pulp mill at the Strait of Canso.

The Liberals said "the little man" and the financiers needed the help and promised a \$10,000,000 fund to provide "business" in an area west of Truro. Much of the money had been neglected, they said.

## More Industry, Farming Aid Proposed At Tignish

TIGNISH — A total of 14 briefs were presented at Tignish last evening as the economic survey of West Prince County continued. The briefs for the most part outlined the economic problems of the community and suggested possible remedies.

Harwell Daley, research director for the department of industry and natural resources, presided at the public meeting in the regional high school auditorium. Assisting in the questioning of those who presented briefs were John O'Connor and Claude Smith.

Briefs were presented by the Village Commissioners, E. C. Gaudette, chairman; Tignish Co-operative Association, manager, Gerald Handman; Royal Canadian Fish Farmers Institute, by Ray Handman; Tignish Sports Recreation Association by president, John Gavin; St. Thomas Aquinas Society, president, Auban Gahlan; Tignish parish council, CWL, by Mrs. Joseph Dorsey; Tignish Fisheries Co-operative, by Terence Gavin; Royal Canadian Legion, by Mrs. Adele Hardman; by Hector Boster, Palmer Beach council, CWL, Mrs. Anthony Doucette; Tignish Regional High School, chairman, Everett Broderick; Tignish Elementary School Board, Mrs. E. C. Perry; Tignish Home and School Association, Russell J. Perry, president; Ebbsfleet Women's Institute, Mrs. Rosemary Gledhill; and by the Fisheries Co-operative of Ebbsfleet.

The briefs from the farmers' group called for the economic decline of the area, on unutilized marketing, little incentive for youth to risk their futures in agriculture, poor facilities for farm products, in connection with the high cost of production.

Most of the briefs stated that the establishment of industry and a sincere effort to help farmers, are necessary for the survival of this part of the province.

MOSS PROCESSING The briefs strongly recommended construction of a moss processing plant and a canning plant for fruit and vegetables, further development of the tourist trade by establishing a national park and an Acadian Village, and the construction of a recreation centre and a rink for the youth of the area.

Education briefs suggested the consolidation of rural schools, the construction of a vocational school and the raising of the age limit for family allowances to 18, improvement of road conditions for school buses, establishment of a manual training department, and the lodging of well-qualified classes.
