The steamer will leave for Summerside at 3 o'clock with a crowd of passengers, and will return to Charlottetown at daylight to-morrow and sail for Halifax at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

LUMBER ADRIPT.—Mr. Malcolm McLeod, of Point Pelee, informs us that the shore about that place has been strewn the last few days with lumber which came in with the tide. The lumber is evidently part of a large raft which became broken up on the mainland side of the gulf and drifted across. There were seven hundred pieces altogether, about the dimensions of ordinary plank.

THE ST. JOHN'S HOLOCAUST.—Our readers may form a faint idea of the destruction at St. John's, N.B., by the fact that all the provision stores but one, all the grocery stores except two, all the dry goods stores but five, and all the hardware stores except two are swept away. One thing must be greatly needed, that is food for horses, of which there are a large number. In sending supplies the dumb animals should be remembered.

THE ENGLISH ELECTIONS.

Result up to Date

LONDON, July 13. Up to last evening the Conservatives had elected 210 members, Liberals, 179, Anti-Parnellites, 35, Parnellites, 5, Unionists, 31. The net Liberal gain is 37. Fifteen elections took place in Scotland yesterday and the majority of them are expected to go for Gladstone. The election in which the greatest interest is felt is that in the Midlothian District of Edinburgh, where Gladstone is opposed by Colonel Wanshope, Liberal-Unionist. Party feeling in this district is raised to fever heat and the polling was never before known to be so heavy. The contest in South Longford takes place to-morrow. Blake's election is considered sure.

THE GLORIOUS TWELFTH.

The Orange Celebrations.

LONDON, July 13. Two thousand Orangemen celebrated the Battle of the Boyne at Springhill, N. S., yesterday. They paraded the town and laid the foundation stone of the Orange hall.

HALIFAX, July 13.

The Carleton County Orangemen met at Florenceville, where the demonstration was the largest ever known in the county. Over 750 vehicles followed the marching body.

MONCTON, July 13.

The Orange demonstration here was an immense success. Fifteen hundred Orangemen marched in procession.

HUNTINGTON, July 13.

The Orange demonstrations were a splendid success here. Twelve hundred men were in line, counting 350 from Montreal. Speeches were delivered by George W. Stevens, N. L. A. Scriver, M. P., and others.

TERRIBLE LAND-SLIDE

On Mount Blanc.

Great Loss of Life.

PARIS, July 13. A fearful land slide occurred at St. Gervais Lesbains, in Savoy, yesterday, when nearly all the inhabitants of the place were asleep. The Bionnassay glaciers became detached and swept down the side of Mount Blanc carrying the baths and hamlets of Eckoyet into the torrent. The loss of life is appalling. There was no possible chance of people getting out of the way of the tremendous mass of earth, rocks and ice which came down the mountain. Over 150 bodies have been recovered from the river, and 30 have been taken from the ruins of the houses.

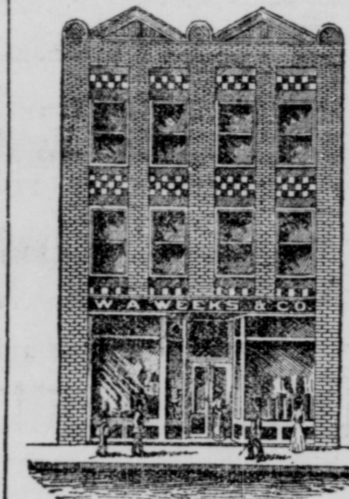
