## University Students Touring Maritimes

A group of overseas and Canadian university students arrived in the city yesterday afternoon on a tour of the Maritimes and were guests of the Department of Education at a lobster banquet in Montgomery Hall last night.

The tour is a travel and educational seminar under the sponsorship of World University Services, the Canadian Centennial Commission and the External Aid Office of the citizenship branch of the Canadian government. It began May 27 and ends June 13. The students, 13 Canadians and 24 overseas students, are travelling by chartered bus.

While on the Island they will visit the Confederation Centre, Cavendish National Park, and if time permits, Summerside. They leave P.E.I. on the Wood Is-

lands ferry early Sunday morning.

The student tour is the only Centennial preparatory project created especially for the purpose of providing an opportunity for tomorrow's leaders to undertake an intensive study of a region of Canada today.

It is a pilot project with a tour of the country by foreign students and professors with their Canadian colleagues with 1967 being the end in mind.

Rev. Dr. F.W.P. Bolger addressed the students at the banquet last night on the subject of P.E.I.'s history. Premier W.R. Shaw and Education Minister Dr. L.G. Dewar attended the banquet.

### COST IS HEAVY

WASHINGTON (AP) - The U.S. Navy will bill the U.S. Air Force for about \$6,000,000 to cover its costs of recovering the air force's hydrogen bomb from deep waters off Spain. The defence department said Friday the exact amount has not been determined yet. The navy used 18 ships and 3,200 men in an 80-day search for the H-bomb after the weapon was lost in the collision of a B-52 bomber and a tanker plane Jan. 17.

GEORGETOWN - A meeting of the Georgetown Centennial Committee was held in the Royal Canadian Legion Hall on Thursday night, with the chairman, Alec Arsenault presiding.

The finances of the Committee are indeed encouraging with a balance being reported of \$878. All present felt that this amount, raised over a relatively short period of time, showed that the public were solidly behind the fund raising efforts of the committee in their drive to proceed with the centennial project of beautifying Kent Square.

It was reported to the meeting that donations from eighteen former Georgetownians had been received to date and amounted to \$211. It is confidently expected that a great many more former residents will forward donations or give them during the period of their stay in Georgetown on their summer holidays.
