MEANS AND ENDS

The great German philosopher Immanuel Kant taught that no one had the right to use another as a means to an end, or as we would say, make a convenience of him to serve our purpose.

We have various means such as the institutions of government, law, education and even religion which are really agencies for the good of men.

The far-off goal to which they look and are working is personality, or what we call life.

Doubtless there are many mistakes made, and the real issues are often very much confused. People are inclined to stay in half-way houses, and think that they are at home. In other words, means are mistaken for ends.

This is seen in religion. Surely the aim there is life — the betterment of the individual and the community. Some of the hottest battles in the history of religion have been fought about minor matters. The saying, "To obey is better than sacrifice" puts the matter in a nutshell, and we recall how that verse took a hold of such a man as Matthew Arnold.

This is seen also in labour, and here chiefly, and that in two ways. Is it not true that men are often exploited? Made to toil under inhuman conditions that others may be rich? What is the best thing for the toilers is lost sight of if we have a violation of the principle that man is an end in himself, and so must not be degraded.

Then, too, when men work for the one end to get wealth and lose sight of the fact that there is a good in work — a personal and a social good — they make a vicious mistake. Labour and money-making may coalesce and the worker suffers accordingly.

When we turn to government the same vice is apparent. If a man struggles to attain office simply to gratify his ambition and enrich himself at the public expense, and fails to see his position as a sphere of service, he is making it an end, and losing sight of the people who should be his prime concern. Any adequate theory of government must admit that the aim should be the good of the people and the office but a position of trust. All these mistakes men take in our confused thinking and lead to divisions in our society. A worthy object calls out the best that is in people. We recall how the war made people forget, in many cases, private interests for the good of the Empire.

That was the thing that united them in their great struggle. The profiteer was looked upon as a supremely selfish person, who saw not beyond the means. The end was too far off for him to see.

The patriot believes that his country has a place in history and so serves it. The real business men take into consideration those who work for him and believe that the "Golden Rule" — to do to others what you desire them to do to you — is not arbitrary, but in accordance with the scheme of things. He mistakes not means for ends.
