Birt was remanded to this morning on a charge of escaping lawful custody.

\$100,000 Issue Floated

S.E. Green chairman of the Commissioners of Sewers and Water Supply said yesterday a new bond issue of \$100,000 recently floated by the commission brought an "extremely satisfactory price".

Mr. Green said the issue of 20-year bonds was sold in a Charlottetown syndicate which paid \$99 for the 5% per cent bonds and not the price paid reflected favourably on the bond offerings of the Commission.

It has been learned from Jack Johnson, manager of the P.E.I. Hospital and Charlottetown Hospital joint financial campaign that a donation in the amount of \$1,000 has been received from Central Creameries Limited for the two hospitals, and indications are, Mr. Johnson added, that a similar amount will be forthcoming next year.

The donation brings the total received thus far to \$72,000. The campaign objective originally was set at \$200,000.

Pictured above is the much-area with an all-time high prize and widely-sought Manning Trophy, designed, executed and donated to the Prince Edward Island Red Cross blood donor committee by Randolph Manning of Charlottetown who is noted for the excellence of his original wood carvings.
