

British Going Ahead With Plans To Explode H-Bomb

LONDON (CP) — Britain, unflinchingly but with considerable soul-searching, is going ahead with plans to explode her first hydrogen bomb next spring.

Government spokesmen say there is no change in Britain's long-standing policy that elimination of such tests can only come through international agreement backed by a fool-proof checking system.

However, the government is willing to discuss the question outside a disarmament agreement if such discussions appear to offer prospects of success.

In the House of Commons Wed-

nesday, in answer to a question from the Opposition, Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd said: "We are working on possible ways in which limitation of nuclear tests might be achieved. The study of complex technical questions is continuing."

"BEASTLY THINGS"
"While the government would prefer to treat this subject in the context of a disarmament convention, they remain ready to discuss it separately if this meets with the approval of the other powers concerned and appears to offer better prospects of agreement."

Laborite Richard Stokes pointed out that only three nations—the United States, Russia and Britain—now are concerned in the making of atomic and nuclear weapons and said in a few years "there might be five or six nations in Europe making these beastly things."

He asked if this did not "make it an urgent matter that agreement should be reached quickly."

"I agree entirely," Lloyd replied.

The government's general policy on H-bomb test limitation was stated last July by Anthony Nutting, minister of state in the foreign office, at a United Nations meeting. He said:

"In the absence of agreements to eliminate or limit nuclear weapons under proper safeguards, continuation of testing is essential for our national defence and the security of the free world."

But there is a growing opinion in the country that each new nuclear test is increasing the envelope of deadly radioactive dust encircling the atmosphere.

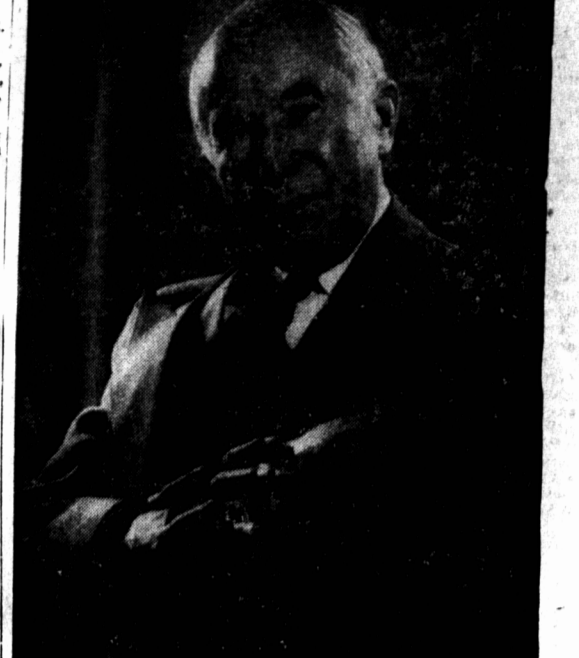
