

Local and Other Items.

The market to-day was small. Prices higher than on Tuesday.

The subscriptions to the fund for Mrs. Garfield now amount to \$640,000.

REV. THOMAS DUNCAN, of St. Andrew's Church, Halifax, is in town.

PATRICK BLAKE, Esq., C. C., was a passenger to England per Prince Edward which sailed yesterday.

THE REV. KENNETH MACLELLAN, of St. James' Church, has returned home, after an absence of a few weeks, somewhat improved in health.

JOHN MURDOCH, Esq., Editor of The Highlander, has consented to deliver a lecture on the Irish Land Question, in Market Hall, on Wednesday evening next.

THERE is quite a boom in the Kingston, Ont., locomotive factory; and the company expects to disburse \$12,000 per month presently for wages.

THOS. FOLLY, of the Dominion Audit Office and Savings Bank, who has been suffering for some days with an affection of the eyes, is, we are glad to hear, nearly convalescent.

SIX cases of drunkenness at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon. Four were fined \$10 each, one \$20, and one escaped with a short lecture from the magistrate.

THE schooner "Lettie May," commanded by Capt. Howlet, is lying at the Market Wharf with a cargo of P. E. Island potatoes—the first of the season. They are selling at 55 cents per bushel.—Herald.

ELDER D. CRAWFORD will (D. V.) preach in Christian Meeting House, Upper Great George Street, Sunday evening, 16th inst., at 6:30 o'clock; subject: "In life and death we are the Lord's," illustrated in the case of the late President Garfield.

IT was remarked at the close of Rev. E. A. Telfer's lecture on Tuesday evening: "If Mr. Telfer had lived in Charlottetown twenty years, he could not have described its people better—especially the critics in the Methodist congregation."

MR. E. W. DAWSON, of the firm of W. E. Dawson & Co., left on Thursday, on a business tour through the Upper Provinces and the United States. While absent Mr. Dawson will select a first-class stock of hardware, etc., for their new store.

THE Moncton driving park opened to-day with a programme of unusual interest to turfmen. Moncton is, undoubtedly, the best place in the Maritime Provinces for a race course. It is easily accessible from all parts of the provinces, and we have no doubt that the park will yield handsome dividends to the stockholders.

JAMES A. CARMAN, of Rose Bank, lost a fine horse on Sunday morning by a rare accident. Straying from the pasture to newly-plowed ground adjoining, the animal cast himself in the open furrow, between two ridges and, being unable to roll out of it again, exhausted himself in the efforts, swelled rapidly, and died just as the owner reached him.—A heavy loss, especially at this season.

CRUELTY TO SHEEP.—The St. John Globe reports that about four hundred sheep arrived there by rail on Wednesday morning from P. E. Island, via Shediac, on their way to Bangor. Some of them were injured so that they had to be carried; two were killed by being trampled on by the others in the cars. The mouths of the whole flock were wide open, and their tongues, swollen and parched, seemed to be dropping out of their heads for want of water. The man in charge said they got water at Shediac. They certainly got none at St. John, and started out to walk to Fairville in a condition that would move any human being to pity.

HANLAN has received an offer from St. Louis, Mo., to row his race with Ross there, and he is disposed to accept it, but he has not yet definitely decided to do so. He has also received a telegram from the same place notifying him that Trickett can find backers there for a match against him for two thousand dollars a side, and the championship of the world, and asking him if he will row the match at Creve Coeur Lake before December first. Hanlan has replied that he will row Trickett on the same terms as they offer him to pull the Ross race there.

FINE HORSES.—Mr. D. Connell, on Wednesday morning, shipped fifteen very fine horses to the States, in the morning train. They were P. E. Island horses. Mr. Thomas Furlong, on Wednesday, shipped four fine road horses to his brother-in-law who lives in Dublin, Ireland, from this place. The horses are in charge of Mr. Daniel McEvoy, proprietor of the Three Mile House, and will go across in the "Winnipeg" of the Beaver Line. One of the horses sent was purchased of Messrs. Magee Bros.; another of Mr. S. S. DeForest; one was a P. E. Island horse, and the fourth was one of Mr. Furlong's own stock.—St. John Globe.

DROWNED.—Mr. John McLean, of the P. E. Island Railway, received a letter a few days ago from the captain of the barque "Reindeer," of New Bedford, informing him that his brother, Mr. Cowan D. R. McLean, was drowned on the 29th of August, while whaling. The captain briefly states the circumstances as follows: While the deceased and crew were fastened to a large sperm whale, the line got caught in the boat, and the whale took the boat and crew down. Before assistance arrived poor McLean sank and was washed overboard. The rest of the crew were saved. The captain writes that in young McLean he has lost not only a good friend, but a splendid officer and a thorough gentleman. He had endeared himself to all of the crew, who who heartily sympathize with the deceased's friends on P. E. Island in their bereavement.

FROM a carefully prepared list it appears that during the last ten years the Dominion Rifle Association have sent over to Wimbledon 139 different competitors. Of these ninety-seven crossed the ocean but once; twenty-five have gone twice; fifteen three times, and only two—Sergt. Pallan and Sergt. Thos. Mitchell—have been over four times. The provinces were represented in the following proportions: Ontario, fifty-six; Quebec, thirty-two; New Brunswick, twenty; British Columbia, four; Manitoba, four; P. E. Island, two. The rule which was adopted for next year's team prevents any man from competing who had been on twice in the previous five years, and the following who are on the list will therefore be prevented from representing the Association in 1882: Capt. Thomas, 54th battalion; Sergt. Thomas Mitchell, 10th Royal Grenadiers, and Sergt. David Mitchell, 13th battalion.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

New York, Oct. 12.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Western Union Telegraph Co. was held to-day. Norvin Green was re-elected president, and Thos. T. Eckert general manager, with the full board of directors. Over \$60,000,000 in stock was represented.

WHEATON, Ills., Oct. 12.

Masked burglars, this morning, entered the home of Allan Fairbanks, gagged himself, wife and two domestics, and then robbed him of \$10,000 in Government bonds and a large amount of silver.

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 11.

The travelling salesman for a St. Louis jewelry house has been robbed of a trunk containing \$6,000 worth of jewelry; his trunk being thrown off the train.

IRELAND.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.

A telegram from the Dublin correspondent of the London Telegraph is as follows: "I am informed that the Fenian element in Cork and the Land Leagues are arranging to attack one of the military columns on eviction duty at the first favorable opportunity. It is intended to give the soldiers three or four volleys from an ambuscade some winter evening, when the party are returning home, then throw away their arms and scatter. The amount which the League leaders expect O'Connell, now on his way to America, to raise, is £20,000."

DUBLIN, Oct. 12.

A Waterford correspondent telegraphs that the Marquis of Waterford, on resigning the mastership of the Curraghmore hounds, said he did so because a league had been organized to prevent hunting throughout Ireland. When he was out hunting last Thursday, the bells rang, horns were blowing, and large multitudes of people gathered and stoned him and his friends. They also pelted the dogs, stabbed several of them with pitchforks, and hooted and yelled till they obliged the party to go. The Curraghmore are the finest pack of hounds in Ireland, and the Empress of Austria was to have hunted with them this season. Between £5,000 and £10,000 will be lost to the neighborhood by the break up of the pack.

From Tipperary a case is reported where 109 cases of needles were sprinkled in the hay to feed cattle.

The police return of agrarian outrages for September shows there has been one murder in Bism; one manslaughter in Cork; 4 cases of attempted murder; 15 cases of aggravated assault, two of which endangered life; 2 of cutting and maiming the person; 24 incendiary cases; 4 of burglary and robbery; 7 of taking and holding forcible possession; 11 of cutting, killing and maiming cattle; 1 of robbery of arms; 5 of riots and affrays; 2 of administering unlawful oaths; 233 cases intimidation, 189 by threatening letters and 44 miscellaneous; 1 case of attacking a house; 48 of injury to property; 7 of firing into dwellings, and 1 of obstruction of railway traffic. Total number of offences, 387.

DANGERS OF THE SEA.

LONDON, Oct. 12.

There is a heavy gale at the mouth of the Mersey this morning. A schooner, name unknown, foundered with all hands.

LIVERPOOL, Oct. 12.

The British steamer Corsica, from London for Bombay, foundered off Cape Rosa. Part of the crew were drowned.
