Court Cases At Georgetown

Before Stipendiary Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet at Georgetown yesterday, a resident of Fortune was fined \$5.00 for having defective equipment on a motor vehicle. A Bay Fortune resident charged with having liquor in a place other than his residence previously entered a plea of not guilty and the Crown evidence was taken a week ago at Souris. The defendant gave evidence in Georgetown and the case was dismissed. Mr. L.P. O'Donnell represented the accused. A resident of Montague, and one of Seven Mile Road, both pleaded guilty to creating a disturbance by fighting, contrary to a town of Montague by-law and were fined \$20.00 and \$10.00 respectively.
