I am told that efforts are being made to stop the circulation of your paper around St. Peter's Bay, by some parties who should know better. You should see to this. I am Sir, yours truly,

We were aware, some time ago, that the "Sanctified Press" had not proved a very profitable speculation—that whether the unknown editors considered that the root of all evil should be carefully excluded from the purlieus of the sanctum whence issued the pious pages, they at all events carefully removed the temptation from the sight and touch of those who were employed in the mechanical duties of giving their lucubrations to that portion of the public who are not over nice in their literary diet, and regard a knowledge of grammar and the possession of intellect as quite immaterial to the successful conduct of a newspaper. We were aware of the fact that what money might from time to time be received by the managers, but little was disbursed to the employees; but, really, we were not prepared for this desperate attempt, on the part of the *Synod*, to prop the tottering *Protector* by the eminently Christian course of lying and slandering. We had, in our ignorance, fondly imagined that a paper should and would rise or fall by its own merits, and that its success depended on the ability with which it might be conducted; and we had been under the delusion that clergymen of a Christian profession should discountenance calumnies affecting the characters or interests of their neighbours. Surely we were in a happy state of ignorance, for we find a conglomeration of persons not ashamed to make assertions which we defy them to substantiate. Let them show, if they can, a single instance of our advocacy of immorality or infidelity; and if there be among the holy conclave any theological casuist, we should feel obliged by his informing us whether wilful lying may not be classed under the head of "immorality."

If the *Protector* cannot be sustained without such disreputable efforts, the sooner it and its incapable hydra-headed corps of Editors vanish from the public gaze, the better for the character of the *Island Press*—for the characters of the conductors as Christian ministers and literary men—and immeasurably better for the Free Church *Synod*, who will, under the stupid sheet has ceased to exist, be under less inducement to expose themselves to the charges we have made against them. Sincerely hoping that the *Synod* may have sufficient influence to collect cash enough to enable the pious backbiters to pay the Printer, we dismiss their gratuitous impudence from our thoughts.

By Telegraph to the *Pictou Eastern Chronicle*. ARRIVAL OF STEAMER "JURA" AT ST. JOHN, N. B. IMPORTANT FROM INDIA.

DELHI NOT FALLEN—GREAT SLAUGHTER AT DELHI—AGRA REPORTED IN THE POSSESSION OF THE REBELS—ARRIVAL OF SIR COLIN CAMPBELL.

HALIFAX, Tuesday, Sept. 29. The *Cunard* steamship "Jura," which left Cork on Thursday, 17th, arrived at St. John, N. B., on Monday, 28th, for the purpose of embarking the 76th regiment. She will sail again for Cork about Wednesday.

The *Bombay* mail to the 15th of August had arrived. No China mail had been received. Latest dates from Delhi are to the 27th July. Sorties of the rebels within the town had been repulsed on the 14th, 18th and 22d of that month, with great loss to the rebels, and 500 killed on our side. Since the 23d there had been no fighting. The *Nizam* mutineers had arrived at Delhi.

General Nicholson was expected to arrive at Delhi by the 15th August from the Punjab with reinforcements for the British army. General Reid has relinquished his command to Gen. Wilson in consequence of ill health.

General Havelock's forces, after re-occupying Cawnpore, finding Bithoor evacuated, burned it to the ground. On the 28th and 30th, they found the rebels at Bithoor Gunge, about eight miles from Cawnpore, ten thousand strong, whom they defeated with loss of fifteen guns. They expected to reach Lucknow next day.

Nona Sahib, who perpetrated the fearful massacre at Cawnpore, in which nearly all the Europeans perished, after destroying his own family, committed suicide. Sir Colin Campbell has arrived, and assumed the command of the Indian army.

Tranquillity has been restored in Central India. The 40th, 70th and 76th Regiments which mutinied at Dinapore, on the 23d July, had been dispersed by the 10th Regiment. Calcutta and Hyderabad were quiet on the 14th August. It is reported that Agra had fallen into the hands of the rebels.

The mutineers at Seelate were destroyed by General Nicholson, on the 16th July. The panic which had existed a fortnight ago had subsided. London, Wednesday 16th.—Consols 90 1/2 Breadstuffs quiet. European news unimportant.

FIRST FALL SHIP FROM ENGLAND.—The fine ship *Majestic*, owned by Messrs. W. W. Lord & Co., arrived this morning (Monday) from Liverpool, G. B., after a good run of thirty days. She has brought a general cargo of merchandise.

HORTICULTURAL EXHIBITION.—The Semi-Annual Exhibition of the Charlottetown Horticultural Society came off on Wednesday last, and afforded considerable gratification to those who take an interest in the advancement of the resources of the Island in this particular department. Notwithstanding the shortness of the notice, there was great variety, as well as abundance of articles exhibited, which were, for the greater part, of superior quality. The Vegetables did credit to the growers. The Celery was particularly good, as were the specimens of Beet root, Carrots and Parsnips. We also observed some fine heads of Cabbage, and several Pumpkins and Squashes of immense size. The show of Fruit was such as to convince even the most sceptical that nothing but care and attention are wanting, to enable the Farmers of the Island to supply the home market, at least with better Fruit than we are generally in the habit of importing. The season is rather too far advanced to ensure the splendid show of Flowers that would have met the eye a month since. There were enough, however, to prove that there is a growing and increasing taste for the cultivation of Flowers, both house and garden. On the whole, the result of the Exhibition was highly gratifying to the public, as well as to the members of the Society.—Mon.
