## Adult Education Classes Underway In City, S' side

A large number of adults, seeking to advance their education were on hand at Prince of Wales College and Summerside High School Thursday evening to register for night classes in various academic and commercial subjects.

The new courses, designed by Malcolm MacKenzie deputy minister of education, are intended to give adults the opportunity to pick up specially needed subjects leading to high school graduation.

Thursday evening a total of 34 adults registered at Prince of Wales College and 95 at Summerside High School. A breakdown of the Summerside figures reveal that 57 are enrolled in commerce; 14 in biology and algebra; 10 in French and 14 in first year mathematics.

Competent instructors, all from the staffs of the college and high school, have been assigned to the courses.

At Prince of Wales College the courses beginning last Thursday evening were English literature and composition with Alistair MacDonald and Miss Catherine Bethune as instructors; algebra, taught by F. J. MacMillan; and chemistry with Richard Matheson as instructor.

At Summerside the courses underway are algebra taught by George Lowe; biology with Gordon MacKenzie as instructor; French taught by John DeRoche and first year mathematics taught by Charles Reid.

The classes will continue throughout the academic year and will be held Monday, Tuesday and Thursday night at 7 p.m. at Charlottetown and Monday and Thursday evenings at 7 p.m. in Summerside.

Some of the pupils now taking the courses are teachers wishing to qualify for a higher license, while others are those wishing to brush up on English or some other subject.

Mr. MacKenzie noted that there have been inquiries about the courses from interested people in the outlying districts of the

province, but due to the small numbers in the areas it is not practical to organize classes elsewhere at present.

However, there is a strong possibility that classes will be organized later in grade 12 subjects in the Alberton-O'Leary area.

Although the courses began last night, Mr. MacKenzie said the opportunity still exists for others wishing to take them if they present themselves in the classes next week.

Charges for the courses are small with a fee of \$10 being charged for each course. This is believed to be a low figure in view of the cost of giving the course and especially when compared with similar fees for correspondence courses.

**IS ENTHUSIASTIC**

The deputy minister said today he has felt the need of these courses for some time past and is enthusiastic over the response from the public. Present students range from comparatively young people not too long out of school to those in the middle age who have been out of school for 20 or more years.

He said the courses required for high school graduation are English (literature and composition) algebra, geometry, history, French and two science subjects or one science and another language.

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## Mental Illness No 1 Crippler, Is Claim Of Can. Health Group

The Canadian Mental Health Association claims that Canada's No. 1crippler of persons is mental disease.

The association makes this claim because the chances are one in 20 or possibly one in 10 that a person in good mental health today will someday have to receive treatment for a mental or emotional disorder.

The association points to the fact that more than 70,000 persons are patients in hospital and occupy almost 1/4 of all hospital beds in Canada and their numbers are increasing by 20,000 every year. At this moment the association says at least 1,000,000 Canadians are suffering from mental or emotional disorders of some kind.

A spokesman for an earnest group of Islanders anxious to fight the inroads of mental illness said yesterday, "These hard facts point up the need for a vigorous and active division of the CMHA on this island. Figures for Prince Edward Island approximate those of the entire nation and an association to help in this important work here is an urgent need."

The first move toward the forming of an island division of the CMHA will be taken Monday night when an organizational meeting will be held at the Charlottetown Hotel at 8 p.m.

Dalhousie University's prominent professor of psychiatry Dr. R.O. Jones will be guest speaker along with Roy D. Cosmon executive director of the New Brunswick division.

The meeting will be open to all who are interested in the crusade against mental illness and the need for more public education to help remove the stigma which lingers after a mental patient has been treated and released from hospital.

"This is one of the most important aims of a mental health division," the group spokesman added. "The general public must realize that the mentally ill are nothing more than sick people. Mental illness is a sickness and

those afflicted with it need care and a great deal of understanding from friends, relatives and neighbors."

Mental health divisions also help in other ways. Funds raised through financial campaigns help in research as to the cause and prevention of such disorders. Also the various divisions give voluntary services and assistance to patients of mental institutions.

## Work Forecast Soon On Historic Park Site

Early development of the Fort Amherst area as the Island's first historic park is forecast following the announcement yesterday that a 207-acre site had been formally turned over to the federal government earlier this month.

R. Earle Taylor, provincial representative on the federal historic sites and monuments board said last night that a complete examination of the area by a competent archaeologist would likely be the first order of business.

Aerial photography with infrared cameras which proved so successful in the re-construction of Louisbourg would probably form part of this phase of the project, he added.

"I am confident that we can safely leave the development job in the hands of the federal experts," Mr. Taylor declared. A three-man federal team had already visited the site, he added.

Situated in the Rocky Point district on the west side of Charlottetown Harbor, the Fort Amherst-Port La Joie site was sold to the provincial government last fall by J.O. Hyndman for \$33,000 on condition that it would be used in the public interest.

In addition to Mr. Taylor, early promoters of the plan to develop the area as an historic site included F.A.S. Jones, T. Edgar MacNutt and Professor J.H. Blanchard.

## Sprinkler System Expected To Reduce Insurance Rates

A new sprinkler system which will pay for itself in a few years through greatly reduced insurance rates is being installed in Civic Stadium, Summerside.

The system is being installed by Scotia Sprinkler Ltd. of Halifax who commenced the work

about three weeks ago and now have about 60 per cent of the piping over the ice surface completed.

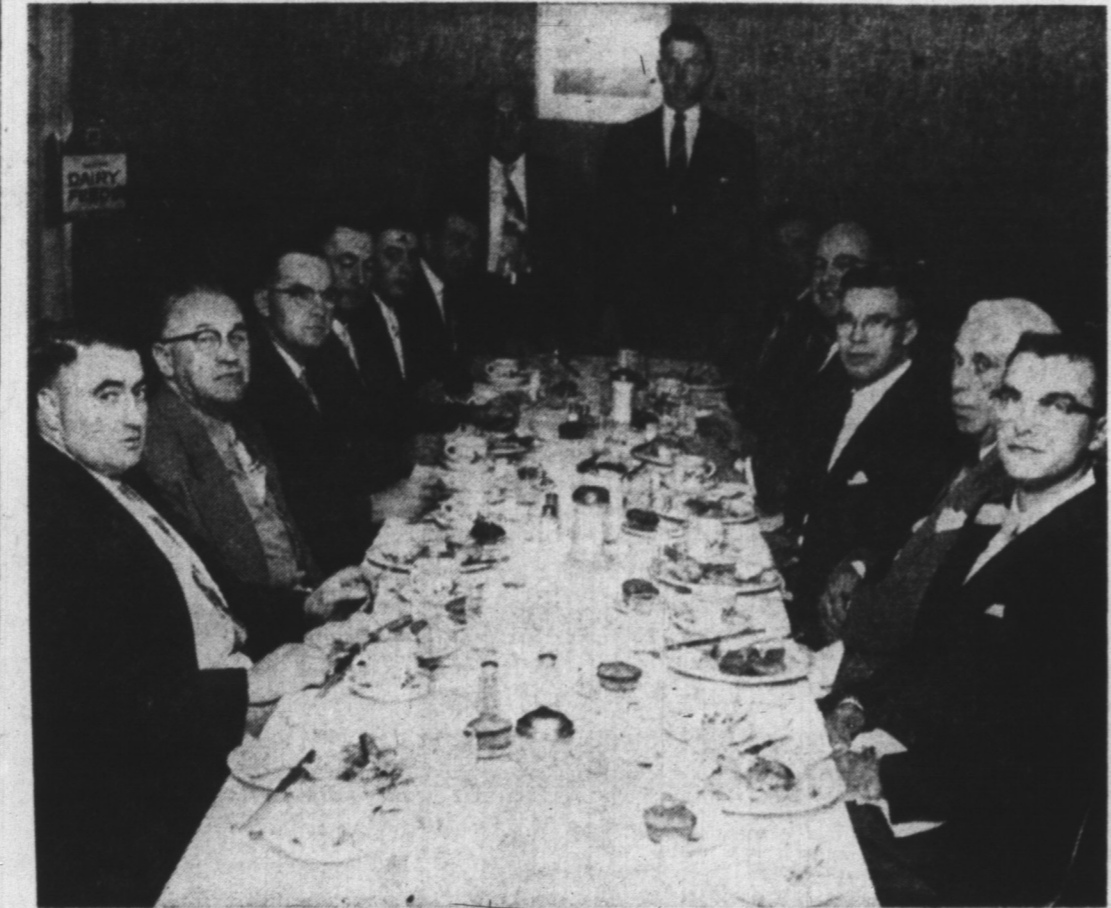
However it's expected it will take another month to complete the job in the seating area and other rooms, where when finished, a total of 750 sprinkler heads will have been installed.

With the installation of the sprinkler system insurance rates are slashed from \$2.15 per thousand to approximately 40 cents per thousand.

The stadium is being prepared for another heavy winter schedule with the painting of the promenade and a thorough housecleaning of dressing rooms and canteen, so that all will be in readiness for the opening date which will be announced shortly.

During the summer months, dances have been held each Wednesday and Saturday nights with good crowds in attendance such as the 569 patrons that turned out last Saturday night.
