PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Tariff Discussion in the House of Commons.

Solicitor General Fitzpatrick's Bill Relating to the Cabinet.

OTTAWA, June 9.—The House went into committee yesterday. Taking up the iron schedule in the tariff, Sir Hibbert Tupper addressed the committee in a strong speech of two hours on the iron and steel question. He pointed out that the whole policy of the Government in respect to these interests was changed after Hon. Mr. Fielding brought down his tariff. When the Finance Minister introduced his tariff he stated that the reductions of the duty on iron and steel were balanced by an increase in bounties. But one month later an entirely new schedule on the iron tariff was introduced reducing some duties to one-half of what Hon. Mr. Fielding first made them, while some duties are only one-third what was provided in the first tariff. He asked Hon. Mr. Fielding if it was proposed to balance these latter reductions by additional bounties over these first proposed, and was answered in the negative.

Sir Chas. Tupper then showed that Hon. Mr. Fielding might have entirely changed his policy after the budget speech. He went on to show what influences from Ontario and what power Sir Richard Cartwright used to drive Hon. Mr. Fielding from his original position. Sir Charles spoke an hour and a half.

In reply Hon. Mr. Fielding made not one word of explanation of the changes in the iron tariff.

Mr. Bell, of Pictou, remarked that Hon. Mr. Fielding would not be well received by his strongest party friends in Pictou if he made the speech there that he made today. He followed this up by reading circulars issued by Mr. Fielding's party in the Pictou campaign and Laurier's telegram promising continued protection. Mr. Bell stated that he had just returned from Nova Scotia and regretted to state that iron and steel manufacturers had notified their employees that a reduction of ten per cent. would have to be made in wages or else the works must close down by reason of the changes in the iron and steel duties.

After a lengthy discussion relating to wire and nails, Mr. Davin moved that they be free. The motion was lost.

Sir Charles Tupper will not go to British Columbia after the session; but will go at once to England.

John A. Kirk has been appointed immigration agent for Nova Scotia with headquarters at Halifax.

Solicitor General Fitzpatrick introduced a bill respecting the Cabinet. There were at present twelve Cabinet ministers and the object of the bill was to make Controllers members of the Cabinet without any increase of salaries. It was not, Mr. Fitzpatrick said in reply to a question, the intention to abolish the portfolio of trade and commerce. The motion carried.

Cricket in England.

OXFORD, Eng. June 9.—At the close of the second day's cricket match, Philadelphia against Oxford University, the Americans had scored 163 with seven wickets. Oxford's score in the first innings was 363.
