

Mary Ellen Driscoll And Rita Lohnes Enter Finals

Mary Ellen Driscoll, St. John's and Rita Lohnes, Lunenburg, fought their way in the finals of the Maritime Women's Open Golf Championships at Belleville yesterday afternoon and will meet today to decide the 1956 champion.

The 18-year-old New Brunswicker had a pretty easy time of it defeating Sally Roper of Ashburn, N.S. but the other match between Miss Lohnes and Blanche Hogg of Summerside wasn't decided until Miss Lohnes sank a 16-foot putt on the 18th hole and Miss Hogg narrowly missed an 8-footer.

In addition the defending champion was forced to come from behind when after 5 holes were played two ended in a tie and Miss Hogg won the other three. After that Lohnes rallied to cop the next two and tie the 8th and 9th to go into the 10th trailing 3-2.

Miss Lohnes then took command by winning the 10th, 12th and 13th while holding her opponent to a tie in the 11th.

After the 14th ended in a tie Miss Hogg was behind 5-3 in the 15th and a par 5 on the 16th while Lohnes took a 6 on each. Both golfers parred the 17th to set the stage for the dramatic 18th.

Both were on the 18th green in 4 on the par 4 hole and Lohnes, the first to shoot, one-putted it to win 1 up and enter the finals.

EASY WINNER
There wasn't nearly as much excitement in the Driscoll-Roper match. Miss Driscoll took full advantage of her longer game to continually outdrive her Nova Scotian opponent and she was deadly on the greens.

The 1955 Nova Scotia and New Brunswick champion took the

match 6 and 5 losing only two of the holes played while tying three. After the first two holes ended in a tie Miss Driscoll shot two pars and a lower-par to take the next three. The 5th was tied but the New Brunswick girl won the 7th and 9th while dropping the 8th to take a commanding 5-1 lead in holes into the 10th. She won the tenth and went on to cop the 12th and 13th after losing the 11th with a 7 to Miss Roper's 8 for a par 4 hole.

After the 13th the Nova Scotian was forced to concede defeat.

FIRST DIVISION
In first division play Mrs. M. Bagnall of Riverside made the finals by defeating Mrs. J. W. MacKenzie of Charlottetown 3 and 2. Mrs. S. Weir made the final round by default.

In the championship consolation division Mrs. W. E. Cotton, Charlottetown, and Mrs. H. L. Roper, Ashburn, entered the finals. Mrs. Cotton defeated Mrs. R. Parker, Charlottetown, 2 and 1 while Mrs. Roper downed Mrs. W. R. MacNeil, Charlottetown 6 and 5.

Mary Ellen Driscoll's mother, Mrs. T. Driscoll, Riverside, made the finals of the 1st division consolation class, defeating Mrs. S. MacDonald, Charlottetown, 7 and 6 while Marion Howatt, Charlottetown, qualified as her opponent by defeating Mrs. J. Molloy of Charlottetown 3 and 1.

FINALISTS TODAY
Final rounds in all divisions will be played today. This morning the first 18 holes of the championship round will be played starting at 9:30. Additional holes will be played in the afternoon until a winner is decided.

The first division final gets off the tee at 10 a.m. The champion-

ship consolation division starts at 10:05 and the first division consolation at 10:10.

While total scores do not count in match play it is a point of in-

terest in the Lohnes-Hogg match. Miss Hogg, whose handicap is 17, fired a hot 88 while Miss Lohnes, with a handicap of 8 shot an 86.

Annual Provincial Rifle Meet This Morning At Squaw Point

At eight o'clock this morning marksmen from throughout the Province will fire the opening shots of the 1956 annual prize meet staged by the P. E. J. Rifle Association at Squaw Point Range. During the past few days they have been carrying out extensive practice and have kept the armourer, Bill Kerdy, Halifax, steadily employed in overhauling and adjusting weapons.

The first match, the DeBlois Bros. will be fired from the 200 yard mound and the winner will receive the 5 Signals Regt. trophy. The Prowse Bros. match will be fired from 300 yards for the Navy trophy. Starting in again at one p.m. the firing will move to the five hundred yard point for the Moore and McLeod match the sil-

verware in this case being the P. E. J. Regt. (17 RECC) trophy. To complete the first days shooting the Senator Barbour match will be shot off at six hundred yards with the 2 militia Group trophy going to the winner. To the top man for the first day will go the Village Restaurant prize.

Mr. A. F. Gormley and his two assistants, Mrs. Gormley and Chief Bowles will be on hand soon after seven o'clock this morning to hand out the firing tickets and ammunition to the competitors. In charge of operations at the firing point will be Lieut. J. S. Moore. Any complaints or disputes will be dealt with by a match committee which will be appointed prior to the opening of the first match this morning.
