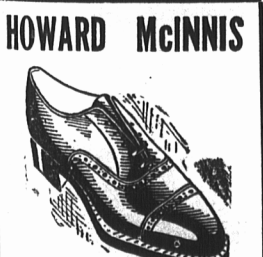

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Baseball club owners and league presidents may come and go, but the old man of the mountain goes on forever.
