Mossadegh Threatens To Kill Himself - TEHRAN, (Reuters) - Ex-Premier Mohammed Mossadegh told a military tribunal Monday that he will kill himself if the government doesn't do it for him.

In a thin, excited voice, he told the five judges on the second day of his trial for trying to overthrow the constitutional monarchy that he will refuse to attend further sessions "even if you cut off my head." Despite the threats, the court decided to continue the trial today.

Pleading illness through Monday's session, the pajama-clad Moslem whose regime was ousted after he overthrew a table with his fist and challenged the court's competence to try him. He engaged in several noisy exchanges with court chairman Gen. Nasrollah Moghbelli.

At the start of the session, the ex-premier stumbled and staggered into the prison courtroom outside Tehran, nodding his head as he went. Court officials helped him to his seat.

Canada Sends Russia Greetings - OTTAWA, (CP) - Canada has sent Russia a formal message of greetings and congratulations on the Soviet observance of the 36th anniversary of the Great October Revolution.

The "national day" message was passed to Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov by Canada's charge d'affaires in Moscow, Robert A. D. Ford.

Meanwhile, in Ottawa, Russia's new ambassador, Dmitri S. Chuvahin, donned his blue and gold-braided diplomatic uniform to preside at a lavish entertainment Saturday night for officials and diplomats in this capital.

The Russian embassy, in Ottawa's Sandy Hill residential district, was packed.

Some Western representatives said they had seldom seen such lavish entertainment at the embassy. Four buffet tables were set up in various parts of the residence.

They were loaded with a wide assortment of meats and fowl, western wines and vodka—the great-national drink of Russia.

S' side Town Council Debates Building Permits

The Summerside Town Council in its first division of opinion within the council at an open meeting in more than two years, last evening split three to two in defeating a resolution which would have required that all applications for building permits would have to be submitted to the Council for approval, until such time as the building by-laws could be considered and reviewed by the Council.

This proposed resolution was moved by Councillor James MacDougall and supported by Councillor Dr. Hillard Clark. It was opposed by Councillors Donald Lidstone, Andrew Perry and Clarence Steele. Councillor William Jenkins was the only Council member absent from the meeting, which was presided over by Mayor Henry Wedge.

The defeated resolution, which produced the fireworks, would have required inspection and approval by the Council of all building permits until the building by-laws can be reviewed by the Council. Certain amendments to the building by-laws have been proposed by the Community Planning Association and recommended to the Council.

Councillors MacDougall and Clark favored a study of these recommendations together with the extension of the lines in these areas. Councillor Clark stated that a similar survey is also being carried out in the Hamilton-Malpeque areas, and it was hoped to have these surveys carried out this week if weather permitted.

The Town Clerk, Mr. John Cameron, reported that 91 per cent of the assessments on real estate and personal property and 66 per cent of the poll taxes have been collected to date.

Councillor MacDougall reported that the Provincial Fire Marshal had visited Summerside last month and as a result of an inspection tour had issued orders for the destruction or renovation of some buildings for reasons of health or fire hazards.

In the police report submitted by Councillor Steele, Chief of Police Peter R. White requested the Council to purchase more street signs. Already these signs have been placed on Central and Summer Streets, and it was suggested that Spring and Granville Streets be the next to be marked.

They cited an instance of a house having been recently located in the center of a proposed new street and they deplored the way in which houses were being constructed in the back yards of existing homes and expressed concern regarding the location and construction of some of the houses being built.

Councillors Lidstone, Perry, and Steele were strongly opposed to the resolution which they later defeated. Councillor Lidstone said there were "lots of poor people to look after without fixing the place up to look beautiful."

Councillor Perry thought that some of the recommendations in the Community Planning Association proposals could be met by the wealthy but would create hardship on the poorer people who might wish to build homes. Councillor Steele said that if Council approval was required as suggested, building operations in some cases would be delayed almost a month.

The discussion was finally terminated by Mayor Wedge who suggested that the Council would try to hold a special meeting to consider the changes in the by-laws, which had been recommended by the Community Planning Association.

Letter From Traffic Board - A letter was read from the Summerside Board of Trade which commented on a number of breaks and thefts in Summerside. The letter stated that the Board believed the police force generally was doing a good job, and suggested that the officers on the force should take a special course to aid them in their work. Councillor Steele in commenting on this letter said that the breaks have now been solved and the offenders were now doing time in penitentiary or Queen's County Jail for other offences.

He said that warrants will be issued for their re-arrest as soon as they are released from Queen's County Jail. He said that in order to send a policeman away on a course he was required to have five years service on the force. He said that it is planned to send one of the officers away this winter to attend a course at Halifax.

Another letter from the Board of Trade commended the Town Council and the Summerside Trotting Association for their initiative and co-operation in efforts towards the proposed agricultural exhibition that may be held at Summerside next year in the new area now under construction.

The Council approved an application of the Water and Sewerage Commission for \$7,000.00 to be used for water and sewerage extensions from Town Lane up Ottawa Street to the corner of Ottawa and Russell Streets.

They also granted permission to the Catholic Women's League to hold tag days on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, November 19th, 20th and 21st.

Referring to newspaper reports on a survey being carried out in the districts of Bayside, Arlington, Birch Hill, Port Hill and Cross Rivers, by the Summerside Electric Light Department with a view to extending the lines in these areas, Councillor Clark stated that a similar survey is also being carried out in the Hamilton-Malpeque areas, and it was hoped to have these surveys carried out this week if weather permitted.

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Alberton Town Council Meeting

Mayor H. K. Barbour presided and Councillors Mathews, Proffitt, Nicholson, Atkinson and Burke were present at the regular meeting of Alberton Town Council last night.

Bills amounting to \$381.92 were approved and ordered paid. Following a discussion of taxes, the finance committee was instructed to make a special effort to collect all taxes due.

Councillor Burke reported that construction of a dam across a brook in the town was proceeding satisfactorily.

Councillor Nicholson said a survey of street lights is to be undertaken right away in co-operation with Maritime Electric Company as to best locations for installing new lights. It was also decided that the town dumping ground would be open on Wednesday afternoons only from 2 to 5 p.m. and that the policeman be on hand during those hours.

It was moved and seconded that cars would not be allowed to park in front of the Princess Patricia after six p.m.
