Severe Battle.

Improvement of Turkish Position.

The Danube Soon to be Crossed.

LONDON, June 16.

An Erzeroum de-patch says the Russians captured Toprak Kaleh after a severe battle. This town lies 75 miles E. S. E. of Erzeroum.

An Erzeroum despatch confirms the report that Mukhtar Pasha is at Zewin, where he has received reinforcements of 24 battalions and two batteries of artillery. He intends sending succor to Kars from along the whole line. The Turkish right wing, which is at Dehbaba, has been ordered to march to Toprak Kaleh. The Musulman population of Erzeroum is being called to arms. Various telegrams from the Turkish side claim that the Turks, by the superiority of their artillery fire, prevented the Russians from erecting works to attack Kars.

Intelligence received at Constantinople represents that the position of the Turkish army in Asia has improved, and that the Turks are preparing to assume the offensive. The Russians have suffered heavy losses before Kars. Artillery engagements between the besiegers and the garrison continue.

LONDON, June 16.

All accounts point to an early attempt by the Russians to cross the Danube. A despatch from Lom, a town of Bulgaria, on the Danube, 22 miles southeast of Whiddin, says the passage of the river will be made not far from Turnu, at which point the Russians are accumulating enormous quantities of stores.

The "Daily News" publishes extracts from several private letters received from points along the Danube, which state that the Russians are extremely busy constructing bridges and roads, so as to secure the utmost facility of movement when the decisive moment arrives for action. A field telegraph now connects the headquarters of all the Russian corps with that of the Grand Duke Nicholas. The Vienna "Press" states that the staff of various Russian corps are now located at Bucharest, Kalarash, Simniza, Turou, Reni, Guirgevo and Oitenta. A Galatz correspondent states that the rats which the Russians have been constructing below that city are quite ready for bridging purposes, and large numbers of them are being towed up to Ibraia. This quite supports the general opinion that the crossing will take place just below Ibraia. The same correspondent, referring to the arrival of a number of Sisters of Mercy, says: "They are constantly visiting the camps and various hospitals, from which I am inclined to think there is a large number of soldiers sick, though the Russians do their utmost to prevent all outsiders from obtaining any accurate information of the number in hospital."

OTTAWA.

Political--The Revenue Increasing.

OTTAWA, June 16.

The recent changes in the Cabinet was gazetted to day.

At the meeting of the Lincoln Conservative Association, held on Thursday, it was deemed advisable to enter no protest against the return of Capt. Norris.

The statement of the imports of the Dominion for the last four months shows an increase of one million, six hundred and sixty-three thousand nine hundred and twenty-six dollars over that of the corresponding period last year.

The Indians Peaceful.

OTTAWA, June 16.

The Governor General leaves on a fishing excursion to Tadouac on June 20th, and will leave in August for Manitoba. Before returning to the old country he will suggest to the Government the desirability of increasing the Governor General's salary to \$75,000 and an addition of a new wing to the Government house.

No further trouble occurred at Oka.

THE MACDONNELL CASE.

HALIFAX, June 17.

Much speculation and anxiety exists as to the future of this case. Mr. McEavish and his Ontario friends favor immediate suspension. The Maritime men are more moderate, and take purely constitutional grounds for accepting his answer. A middle course may be decided on.

His Honor, the Governor, gave a brilliant reception at Government House, on Saturday, to members of the General Assembly and other leading citizens.

The Presbyterian Clergy, to-day, filled the Baptist and Methodist pulpits, as well as the Pre-byterian. The attendance in the churches was very large. There were four services in some churches.

MEXICO.

NEW YORK, June 16.

Advices by the steamer China confirm the report of the capture of Acapulco by Alvarez, who has installed the officers of the Lerdo Government. The date of the Alvarez entry is not stated. Very little resistance was offered by the followers of Diaz.

FRANCE.

Paris, June 16.—The situation in France is becoming more interesting as the con-

clusion of the crisis draws nigh. The quiet demeanor of the Republican masses in the great cities is not indifference, but rather evidence of the consciousness of their strength.

The responsible editor of the *Marseillaise* has again been summoned to answer a charge of violating the press laws.

PORTUGAL.

LONDON, June 16.—The Royal proclamation declaring the neutrality of Portugal in the Russia-Turkish war was promulgated to-day.

Germany will not issue a special proclamation of neutrality.

SUPREME COURT—SUMMERSIDE.

MONDAY, June 18.

Pope v. Gladney and others. In this suit the Chief Justice delivered, and stayed further proceedings against the defendant upon their paying all the costs.

The Queen on the prosecution of Connick v. Henry Monaghan. This was a prosecution for stabbing. The evidence was that the prisoner had met Connick at Kensington, and, without any provocation, had stabbed him in the arm. The knife was produced, a butcher's knife of enormous dimensions, and on seeing it one could better understand how dreadful the wound must have been which was inflicted upon Connick. The Jury have not yet returned a verdict. The Hon. J. Longworth and Mr. Duncan McLeod for the Crown. Mr. Peters for the prisoner.

The Queen at the prosecution of Abraham Buote v. William Callaghan.—Indictment for stealing a horse. This case has just commenced. Mr. Longworth and Mr. Sutherland for the Crown. Mr. Peter for the prisoner.
