ALBERTON TRUSTEES REPORT.—The report of the trustees of the Alberton High School presented at the rate payers meeting on June 26th stated that a total of 133 pupils attended the school during the past term. Before the start of the term and during the year general repairs were made to all four rooms, including plastering, puttycoating, painting and repairs to all windows. Also new seats and two new doors were installed, the heating system was completely renovated and is now working satisfactorily. A fourth room was opened; for this twenty five new seats were purchased as well as a teacher's desk and display boards. For the next school year the trustees are asking for the same amount for general improvements, etc., as was voted last year.

Mr. J. Frank Arnett was elected president of the Board of Trustees of the Prince County Hospital last night at a board meeting immediately following the annual meeting of the hospital. Hon. W. E. Darby, who presided at the meeting, announced that he would not accept this position again. Other officers elected were, first vice-president J. E. Dalton, second vice president, Donald Baker, third vice president Judge L. G. Lewis.

The following members of the board were elected for a three-year term: W. E. Darby, Donald Baker, J. F. Arnett, J. L. Gorrill, all of Summerside, P. L. Morris, Kinkora, E. S. Burleigh, Ellerslie. The following new members were appointed for a three-year term, James MacGregor, Summerside, Roy Lockerby, Mr. T. E. Hickey, C. A., was appointed auditor.

A letter was read from the secretary of the medical staff advising that Dr. E. T. Tanton was appointed the medical representative on the hospital board.

New Superintendent
In his opening remarks Dr. Darby said he was pleased to see so many present as it had often been discouraging in the past that so few people attended the annual meeting. He said: "We are pleased to announce at this time the appointment of a new superintendent, Miss Helen Schurman. During the time that she has been with us she has given every indication of exceptional interest and manifest capability."

As an indication of the scope of the work carried on by the hospital in the past year, Mr. Darby reported that there were 3618 patients treated, 708 babies delivered, 3477 X-rays, 343 major operations and 1104 minor operations. He said: "A survey of the institution itself reveals a very satisfactory state of affairs, and the general condition of the hospital has been well maintained." In reviewing the financial report he gave the revenue for the year as \$187,980.05 and expenditures as \$165,045.17 with a surplus for the year of \$22,934.88.

Mr. Darby said that the hospital is now a large business and the present method of holding monthly meetings of the board is becoming obsolete and the holding of bi-monthly meetings should be considered. As an alternative he suggested the appointing of an executive committee of the board which could carry on business in the intervening periods. With regard to the new hospital, Mr. Darby said that it is about completed and he suggested that the board should consider moving in about the first of September. He thought that it might be possible to get in sooner but he recommended that it would be preferable to wait till all furniture and equipment has been installed.

A Fine Institution
He said, "I think it is one of the finest institutions anywhere. The workmanship is a credit to the contractor and the architect and it will be a monument to the town and the county and to the interest of the people whose funds made it possible." He continued "The cost of construction will be approximately the amount estimated by our building committee and except for the furnishing of the rooms, funds available should be sufficient to complete it provided that the balance of subscriptions are substantially received."

The financial report of the new hospital shows that the amount spent so far on construction is \$797,964.73. Mr. Darby referred to the passing in the past year of the late C. R. Rogers, a former president of the board, and he expressed the sympathy of the board to his family. Dr. J. R. McNeill and Mr. J. E. Dalton both urged Mr. Darby to continue in the office of president. Mr. Darby thanked them but said that if he were to continue it would not be fair to the hospital or to himself. He said that he would be willing to act on the board if re-elected but would not accept an office.

Mrs. Heath Strong read the report of the Ladies' Aid and also

of the report of the Kensington Ladies' Aid. Mr. George MacQuarrie, secretary, read the report of the Okto Club. All reports showed splendid work done during the year for the hospital and Mr. Darby complimented the members of the three organizations.

A report was also given by the superintendent, Miss Helen Schurman, in which she said that consideration will have to be given to facilities for the better education and housing of the student nurses.—S.
