**Well-Known Capt. Retires At 88**

Capt. William G. Dicks, Ross' Ferry, N.S., retired on March 31st at the age of 88 years, after 16 years service with the Highway Department of Nova Scotia as Captain at Ross' Ferry.

Born in Newfoundland he moved to Georgetown, P.E.I., while he was just a boy is still known by many residents of this province. Prior to his position at Ross' Ferry he sailed many of his own vessels. He first went to sea when he was 15 years old and has been connected with the sea and seafaring men ever since that time. He has seen the great change in sailing ships from the sweeping full-rigged ships of olden days to the trim power craft of today.

Captain Dicks made his last trip on the ferry on Saturday, March 31st. When he went in the Department of Highway's Office at Ross' Ferry after completing his final run, he was surprised to find Captain Smith, superintendent of the Ferry officers and members, gathered to express their good wishes. Captain Dicks said that it was with regret that the ties of friendship and good co-operation had to be broken after all the years of working together.

He stated that during his many years of going to sea he had never been shipmates with a finer group of men, from officers down. He was presented with many gifts, one of them being an electric clock representing a ship's wheel.

Captain and Mrs. Dicks will leave Cape Breton very shortly to reside with their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. C.P. Brown of Halifax. Although he's 88 years old now, Captain Dicks explains: "I'm just a kitten yet. I had a grandmother who lived to be 104 and at 100 she was working in her garden planting flowers". The retired Captain has two brothers residing in Georgetown, Captain John Dicks and Captain Nelson Dicks.

**Purpose Of Film Council Is Explained**

Mr. Stan McInnis, director of the Provincial Film Board, presided at a general meeting of representatives of organizations at Montague last night for the purpose of forming a film council in the community.

Mr. McInnis gave a detailed explanation of the purpose and use of a film council in a community, stating that it was not another organization, but rather a central agency to provide a service to all organizations. He said that several organizations at least, but more preferably all the organizations of the community should become members of the film council, and that the only matter which they were required to provide was a film projector. In this matter, he said, the department would come to their assistance, by granting \$200.00 if the projector cost \$500.00 or over, and if less than \$500.00 then a sum proportionately less. The remainder would be contributed by the member organizations. All films, of which the library has approximately 1,600, are provided to the film council free of any cost whatsoever.

Mr. McInnis explained that there are films stocked for every age group, and films on almost every field of interest. A community the size of Montague, he felt, could easily form a council considering the number of organizations which he considered would be interested in showing films at their meetings.

At the present time, he went on, there are twenty-six such film councils operating in the province, and he was also established, particularly in rural school districts, each having a one-room school, would unite to form a council. **Site Selected Near Kingston For New Federal Penitentiary**

OTTAWA (CP)—A 670-acre tract of land near Joyceville, Ont., 10 miles northeast of Kingston, has been selected as the site for a new federal penitentiary, Justice Minister Garson announced Thursday.

The institution will incorporate the latest innovations in prison construction and will house between 500 and 600 prisoners. Its main job will be to rehabilitate offenders not classified as hardened criminals.

Decision to build the Joyceville prison represents the second step in a three-point federal plan to improve the penitentiary system and relieve overcrowding in existing institutions.

Early last year Mr. Garson announced that a new women's prison will be built at Collins Bay near Kingston.

At the same time, Mr. Garson announced that two new institutions will be built for male prisoners, one in Ontario or Quebec and the other in Alberta or British Columbia. No decision has been reached as yet on the location of the western institution.

Maj.-Gen. R. B. Gibson, commissioner of penitentiaries, said leaders have been called for the new women's prison at Collins Bay. He expected construction would start this year.

Mr. Garson said steps now are being taken to acquire the Joyceville site. However, justice department officials declined to disclose immediately the cost of the land or of buildings to be erected.

"The prison at Joyceville will not be a maximum security institution," Gen. Gibson said.

After the new institution was built maximum security prisoners in eastern Canada would be confined only at the Kingston penitentiary. A maximum security prison is used for prisoners who require the greatest degree of supervision and confinement.

Gen. Gibson said the penitentiary expansion program is necessary because of the growing population in Canadian prisons, now more than 5,500. This has been caused largely by the sharp rise in Canada's population in the last 10 years.

MONTREAL (CP)—Hebert H. Lank, president of Du Pont of Canada Securities, Ltd., said Thursday there is a "compelling need" for industrial research in Canada to keep pace with the country's growing economy.
