WE regret to learn that William Evans, the young man referred to in a previous issue of THE EXAMINER as being afflicted with the lock-jaw, died about half-past two o'clock this afternoon. The unfortunate young fellow was seventeen years of age, a great favorite with all who knew him and a son of Mr. John Evans, Sexton of St. Paul's Church.

SOME heavy porkers are being brought to town. On Friday, Mr. C. Gregor, of Brackley Point Road, brought in eleven pigs, the aggregate weight of which was 3540 pounds. On the same day Mr. Neil Shaw, of the same place, brought in seven, which aggregated 2832 pounds, while Mrs. John Darke, of Malpeque Road, brought in another which tipped the scales at 600 pounds. They were all purchased by A. L. Bridges & Co.
ON the night of Thursday last, the end and the centre foundations of the Blinshank Bridge were carried away by a freshet. The bridge was temporarily fixed and trains crossed on Friday. The water rose again on Friday evening and swept out the blocking. It is being repaired, and will require some days work to make it thoroughly secure. There have been no other washouts of any consequence on the line.

THE Summerside woman referred to in Saturday's issue has been found by the police. She was wandering about the northeastern portion of the city, making a house-to-house canvass, selling some little trinkets. When asked why she did not go home she said "her husband 'kicked' her and she had to leave him; the little girl and watch were her son's, not her husband's, and she would not give them up." The little girl confirmed the woman's statements concerning the "kicking," and added that "herself came in for a share of it also." The husband will have to wear "mourning" a while longer.

THE plans and specifications and forms of tender for the Government pier at Cape Tormentine may be seen at the railway office. The pier for 1,300 feet from the shore is to be a stone embankment, 20 feet wide on top, with slopes of two to one. The outer end of this embankment gradually widens till it attains a width of 30 feet on top, and the style of construction then changes to wooden crib-work 30 feet wide on top, which extends outward 1,200 further. It then turns to the eastward and runs 400 feet at nearly a right angle with the main structure, then turns again and runs 400 feet towards the shore, forming an excellent harbor, with never less than 15 feet of water. The side and ends of the crib-work are to be close timbered with plenty of cross ties, the pockets to be filled with stone, and the outer sides built sloping.
THE Island steamers are being renovated and put in good working order for the season's campaign. A new steel boiler—the first ever built in the Province—has been manufactured for the Elfin by Messrs. McKinnon & McLean, from plans furnished by Mr. Smith, late inspector of boilers. It is somewhat larger than the old boiler, and has fifty-six tubes, the old one having but thirty-six. It is now, we learn all ready for the test which must be made by the Inspector, and which, it is hoped, will be made shortly, so that the season's work will not be interfered with. The Heather Belle is having a new smokestack—built by A. White & Sons—placed in position to-day. Mr. J. Griffith has a number of painters at work, and some other necessary repairs are being effected. The Princess of Wales and St. Lawrence are also being painted and fitted up, and everything made ready for the season's work. Mr. J. Alfred Rowe, lately of Eisdale Foundry, has been appointed one of the engineers of the Princess, and the fast sailing record will doubtless be often broken during the season.

BRITISH NEWS

Gladstone's Cabinet Among the Breakers.

LONDON, April 4.
The breaking up of the Cabinet is imminent. Lord Kimberley, Sir William Harcourt and Hon. H. E. C. Childers refuse to assent to any Home Measures giving Ireland control of the Customs, and they threaten to resign if such a measure be insisted upon by Gladstone.
Mr. Morley demands a modification of the plans for buying out the landlords. Gladstone, however, remains inflexible, and will maintain his full scheme intact.
Cabinet councils are to be held on Monday and Tuesday, and the climax will be reached on Tuesday. The Ministers themselves admit that an agreement seems improbable.
Gladstone may make his statement on Thursday without the approval of the Ministry.
Gladstone's voice is again causing him some anxiety, and he has gone to the country to spend a few days for the purpose of recuperating.

The New Tariff.

TORONTO, April 4.
A Washington special says: Before the New Tariff bill is reported to the House of Representatives on the ways and means committee, the clause placing fish on free list will probably be qualified with a proviso, excepting Canadian fish so long as Canada refuses to accord the fishermen of this country the right to enter and clear from Canadian ports.

Writs for Elections

MONCTON, April 4.
The issue of writs for the Provincial elections created considerable excitement and indignation in Westmoreland, as the time in which to get the electoral lists and proclamations ready is so limited. It is rumored that the Government ticket for Westmoreland will be Killam and Robinson of Moncton, Anderson of Sackville, and Gallant of Shediac.

A Fearful Fight.

FORT WORTH, Texas, April 4.
A fight occurred last night between a Sheriff's posse who were attempting to take out a train on the Missouri Pacific Road, and the strikers. Fifteen shots were fired. Of the officers, two were killed and two injured, while several strikers were seriously wounded.

Fire! Fire!

BATHURST, April 3.
Last evening fire destroyed the store occupied by Henry Bishop and Charles Bass. The building occupied as a printing office by the Courier des Maritimes, and several offices were also consumed. The printing plant was all lost.

R. R. Burned.

DORCHESTER, April 3.
Between three and four o'clock Saturday afternoon, the railway station here was burned down. All freight and furniture had been got out. Fire caught from a defective flue.

The Dacoits Again.

LONDON, April 3.
Advices from Burma state that marauding bands of Dacoits burned 600 houses in the suburbs of Mandalay.

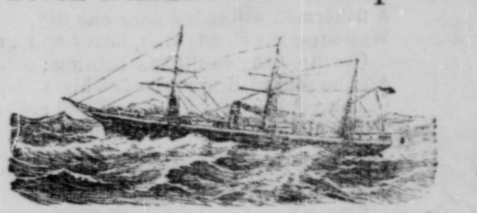
