THE MANITOBA QUESTION.

Mr. CLARKE WALLACE has announced that he does not differ from the Government in respect to its general policy. The only point upon which he is in issue with Sir McKenzie Bowell is the Manitoba difficulty. Sir McKenzie sees that it is his duty to enforce (if need be) the compact made concerning the minority in Manitoba and to carry into effect, in view of the refusal of the Manitoba authorities to do so, the order of the Queen based upon the judgment of the Privy Council. Mr. Wallace cannot see that the order and judgment given the Dominion Government and Parliament—and so he has resigned. This Manitoba question does not affect directly or materially the people of Canada as a whole. It may, indeed, happen that a similar question will at some future time arise in respect to the minority in Quebec or other Province. It may, indeed, be held that if the Dominion Government and Parliament shirk the plain duty imposed by the constitution, it may shirk other plain duties. In this view the Manitoba question is of some importance to all the Provinces, and particularly to the smaller and weaker ones. But in so far as education and the people are concerned, it is a question which affects Manitoba alone. Consequently it is not to be supposed that the electors of Canada will, to any great extent, change their party politics and thus necessitate a change of the policy of the Government in respect to Canada as a whole, on account of it. It is here-to-day; it will be gone to-morrow. The Toronto Globe received this morning says that "whatever may be the effect of the bye-elections upon the parties, we hope that we shall soon hear the last of the Manitoba school question in Federal affairs." It is a Provincial matter upon which the Provincial authorities have legislated contrary to the law, and so soon as the law is carried into effect in respect to it, it will cease to trouble. We have seen that the electors of North Ontario were not influenced by it to any great extent. Nor do we believe that the Dominion electors of other ridings and counties of Canada will permit it to divert them from their Party allegiance, even though the present Grand Master of the Orange Order has resigned his position under Sir Mackenzie Bowell. Orangemen are not the men to be led blindly by any Grand Master. They will use their own judgments, in view of the law as laid down by the highest authorities. Their reasons, not their passions, will sway. The comments published upon the resignation of Mr. Wallace may be taken in proof of this. Thus, Grand Master Hughes, of Ontario, is reported to have said a few days ago, in the course of an interview, that the Manitoba question "should be settled in a way that would be perfectly fair to a minority either Protestant or Roman Catholic. There is no need to re-establish separate schools as they existed before 1890 in Manitoba. I do not believe that the Dominion Government will propose to do so. I shall be greatly disappointed if the remedial bill introduced by the Government does not merit the approval of just men of all creeds and parties." "Do you think Mr. Wallace's course in resigning will meet the approval of the Orangemen of Ontario?" No. I do not believe their calm judgment will lead them to endorse his action. Honest Orangemen will want the Government to treat the Roman Catholics in Manitoba exactly as Protestants should be treated in case Roman Catholics were in the majority instead of in the minority. Moreover, I think many of them will resent his course in remaining in office for months and then resigning when his action is certain to do most injury to the men whom Mr. Wallace has up till the present most strongly condemned." These just and reasonable opinions of Grand Master Hughes will, we believe, be adopted by thousands of loyal Orangemen all over the country. We refuse to suppose that the lawful settlement of the Manitoba Question will be prejudicial to any material extent by the votes of Orangemen in Ontario, Prince Edward Island or any other Province.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Which party is it that is going to pieces under the patron movement and the Manitoba school question? Montreal Gazette: Mr. Clarke Wallace's resignation may trouble the lingers in the lines of Tories and Liberals quite as much as it does the Government. If it brings on, in parliament, a division on the straight issue as to whether or not the Manitoba minority is to be protected in the privileges of Parliament, must to secure the elaborate works Mr. Laurier has raised to avoid such a vote will be worse than useless. The bye-election record shows that 60 Liberal Conservatives have been elected since the last general election against 15 Liberals, and that 40 constituencies were wrested from the Opposition against 4 from the Government. All Within Sixty Days. LONDON, Dec. 15.—A despatch from Cape Coast Castle says it is the intention of Col. Scott, commander of the British Ashanti expedition, that the campaign shall be finished, and the expedition returned to the coast within sixty days. Operations Against the Abyssinians. LONDON, Dec. 15.—General Bullaire will replace General Baraters as commander of Italian forces in Erythra. Seven thousand men and four batteries are ready to embark on transports for Massawa, the capital of Erythra, whence they proceed to reinforce the Italian force carrying on operations against the Abyssinians. A Great Scarcity of Water. ALTOONA, Pa., Dec. 15.—The severe cold snap has frozen all small streams from which the Pennsylvania railroad has been pumping water, and the company's shops, employing 5,000 men, closed this afternoon. The company has difficulty in getting enough water for its locomotives. The Duaneville rolling mill shut down for the same cause. Suspected Conspiracy Against the Carr. LONDON, Dec. 15.—Despatches from Crao says it is reported that the Carr has lately received several threatening letters. The despatch adds that a nihilist conspiracy against the life of his majesty has been discovered in Moscow. The police of that city seized a number of bombs. Several arrests were made. Among the prisoners are Raspoan, a prominent nihilist, and his wife. John Morley to be Opposed. LONDON, December 15.—The independent laborists have appealed to the Carr for funds to enable Kerr Hardie to oppose John Morley, formerly chief secretary for Ireland, in the Montrose district, Scotland, where they will contest the seat in the house of commons in the paper regarding the intention of Italian ministerialism in the event of the Pope's death. The sum of his long argument, which it was stated represented the view of the Italian government, is that the conclaves which will elect the next pope must be held outside of Italy. The government means to provide for what is called an honorable exodus of the conclaves. The practical common sense of the Italian people is beginning to see that a foreign pope would be practically unable to pose as a pretender to a temporal throne in Italy, while to an Italian Pope residing abroad, such an attitude would involve the loss of the spiritual supremacy of the Italian church, and the state protecting him would be bound by the international laws applicable to pretenders d'arboring the peace of others.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

PROVINCIAL FINANCES. Sir.—The state of the Province financially is such as to create serious alarm. We all know that \$185,000 has been borrowed on debentures since the present Government came into power. The Canadian Royal Gazette shows that up to the end of October last the Peters Government had overdrawn at the Bank of Montreal over \$100,000. The writer has it on good authority that another \$100,000 is up to the present time, borrowed from the people at the treasury. In addition to this, nearly \$50,000 was collected in taxes last year, and an equal amount is now in process of collection. Here are the figures as the burden of the people \$485,000! Deducting the \$120,000 overdrawn at the banks when the late Government resigned, we have a net amount of \$365,000.00 in the short space of four years! But, added to this, a general system of evading payments by the Government is now going on. I can tell you on good authority that up to a few days ago no less than four months arrears of money due to the contractors for supplies to the Hospital for the Insane had been allowed to accumulate. The people who had tendered to supply that institution on the basis of monthly payments were told when they applied to the secretary for their money that it was impossible to get a meeting of the trustees to pass the accounts. We are told that the Hon. Mr. McMillan is always in his office, which is next door to Mr. Morrison's. Everybody knows that Mr. Farquharson is constantly in his private place, business on Queen Street. These trustees form a quorum for the transaction of business. Where is the third trustee, Hon. Mr. Peters? Echo answers where? Is it true that he spends much of his time at the "Gentlemen's" Club. Nero added while Rome was burning. It appears that at last long Mr. Peters was found and a meeting of the Trustees of the Asylum was got about a week ago. Three months arrears were ordered to be paid, but the accounts for November still hung fire. Why were these accounts passed with the others? Simply to carry them with the accounts for the month of November into the next financial year, so as to conceal the real indebtedness of the province. It is plain that the old plan of the fall of 1878 is now in force, and that a systematic effort is going on to delay payment until the end of the year. It will be remembered that in 1878 an expense account was opened by Mr. Davies and payments made which were not entered in the public accounts until 1878. For the purpose of concealing the true state of the public finances. Now, however, a bolder course is pursued. At yesterday's meeting of the Cabinet, Hon. J. F. Wood was appointed Controller of Customs, and Colonel Prior, M. P. for Victoria, Controller of Inland Revenue. Mr. Wood's transfer leaves the greatest revenue-producing department in the hands of an Ontario man, and he gets, in addition to considerable more work, the honor of being made a member of the Privy Council.
