Naval Officers Ass'n Backs Up Recruiting Drive

The P. E. I. Branch of the Naval Officers' Association of Canada wholeheartedly endorsed the Naval recruiting campaign now in progress in the Province and discussed plans for its promotion last night. The meeting in the war room of H. M. C. S. Queen Charlotte, studied the report of the 10th annual meeting of the association's Dominion Council, held in Regina last summer. The president, N. H. Black, commented on the various resolutions presented there and also those of the Naval Defence Conference held in Ottawa in December. It was decided to invite the Regional vice-president of the Dominion Council for the Maritime Provinces to attend the February meeting of the association and discuss general policies.

Says Farmers Can Supply Pork, Beef For 50 Million

TORONTO (CP) - Picture busy farmers turning out enough pork and beef to feed 50,000,000 Canadians—more than triple the current population. Not impossible at all, says C. W. McInnis, president of the Ontario Hog Producers' Association. In fact, he is sure Canadian farmers can produce enough livestock to feed even more than that number—if population ever increased to that extent. Producers faced some tricky problems, meanwhile, he told the Gordon economic commission Friday. Ontario farmers were concerned that the handling of hog surpluses by the trade might depress prices.

They were looking to the time—perhaps within five years—when the producers themselves would have sufficient control over the market to regulate surpluses and prices to some extent. SAYS QUALITY DROPPING Mr. McInnis predicted that Mr. McInnis predicted that within 10 years provincial marketing boards will unite and establish a national board to handle surplus products if they develop. While concerned over prices and surpluses, farmers also were concerned over quality. Canada's pork exports were of high quality but some exports of hams to the United States were not as good as desired. Therefore the Hog Producers' Association believed there should be closer government inspection of hams and bacon leaving the country. W. F. McLean, president of Canada Packers Ltd., agreed quality was a problem, but maintained that the problem was on the farm. Canadian hog quality, which had earned a world reputation, had deteriorated during recent years. Unless steps were taken to reverse the trend, Canada might lose out to competitors in Europe and the U. S. Canadian consumers were buying more of pre-wrapped cuts in self-service stores—a type of sale requiring a high-quality product.

Hicks Gives Views On New Tax-sharing Plan

HALIFAX (CP) - A letter to Prime Minister St. Laurent by Premier Hicks of Nova Scotia Jan. 12 said that the federal government's new tax-sharing plan offends the provinces' "in greater recognition" of their fiscal needs than the present tax rental agreements. The letter, released Friday, said "a lasting solution" to provincial problems "will only be found in an arrangement which will apportion the provinces' measures than at present, the provision of more equal per capita revenues from all sources." Mr. Hicks' letter also said duplication of direct taxation "will be completely eliminated only if all provinces undertake to vacate all three tax fields"—income, corporation and succession. The premier, who returned here Thursday from talks with the prime minister, said no specific changes were made in the Ottawa proposals but the Nova Scotia position was made clear.

French Present Views On Problems In The Middle East

PARIS (Reuters) - The French ambassadors in London and Washington have submitted to the British and American governments a memorandum on the French attitude to Middle East problems, the French foreign ministry announced Friday. The French government has special reasons to be anxious (about these problems), the statement said. "As a signatory of the 1950 tripartite declaration the French government has responsibilities in common with the British and American governments. The memorandum notes rivalries between Arab states, development of Israel and her neighbors, and Soviet initiatives in the area. "These factors, together with the excited states of Arab nationalism, have contributed to the creation of an extremely dangerous situation." These problems demand concerted action.

Five U.S. Jets Crash In Far East

TOKYO (AP) - Five United States Sabre jets crashed in the Far East Friday—four after they ran out of fuel near Okinawa and one in Japan. The pilots escaped unhurt. The loss, running to about \$2,000,000 was the costliest single day's toll of Sabres since the Korean War.

OTTAWA (CP) - Day-long opposition criticism in the Commons Friday blocked introduction of government legislation to ratify treasury guarantees of bank loans on farm-stored prairie grain. Spokesmen for all three opposition parties, debating a government resolution preliminary to introduction of the bill, called instead for cash advances from the Canadian wheat board to meet cash shortages among prairie farmers.

Objective For Red Cross This Year \$29,000

Hearty congratulations were extended to Mr. Walter R. Shaw and his associates on the outstanding success of the 1955 Red Cross campaign by Mr. Edwin C. Johnstone, president, yesterday at the monthly meeting of the Provincial Red Cross executive. Mr. Shaw who has taken on the campaign chairmanship again for 1956, stated that he had already commenced to contact workers for this year's campaign and was meeting with enthusiastic responses. He stressed the fact that it would be more necessary than ever to have an effective canvass carried out in every district in the Province in order to reach this year's objective of \$29,000,000, which is \$1,600,000 more than in 1955.

Canada Selling Wheat To Poland

OTTAWA (CP) - Negotiations are under way with Poland for sale of about 3,800,000 bushels of low-grade Canadian wheat, Trade Minister Howe said Friday. He said the sale is "in process of negotiation" and is not yet completed. At current prices for that grade of \$1.23 a bushel, the total price would be around \$4,674,000. Mr. Howe said the negotiations in Winnipeg reports that sale of 3,800,000 bushels of No. 5 wheat had been completed. Last July Poland purchased 1,850,000 bushels of No. 5 grade wheat and indicated it would buy another 1,500,000 bushels. Last summer's sale was made with the crown-owned Export Credit Insurance Corporation guaranteeing a one-year bank loan for 85 per cent of the loan.

Psychiatrist Advocates More Freedom For Mental Patients

By FRANK CAREY MONTREAL (AP) - One of North America's leading psychiatrists Friday advocated continuous tests by mental hospitals to see "how far you can go" in eliminating locked doors so that patients could be free to leave anytime they might wish. Dr. D. Ewen Cameron said he advocated an "open door policy" to the highest extent possible with the idea of "giving back responsibility to the patients themselves" and with the idea that although given opportunity to leave "they would not want to." Dr. Cameron is director of the Allen Memorial Institute, psychiatric hospital of the Royal Victoria Hospital. The institute is operated as an "open hospital." Dr. Cameron told a group of science writers touring psychiatric institutes in the United States and Canada that a trend toward "opening up" psychiatric hospitals has been growing steadily in recent years but that, in his opinion, there are possibilities for extension. "Our only limitation is that the patient should be willing to come," he said, adding: "Hence we have acutely suicidal patients, patients who are potentially violent, patients who wish to be relieved of addiction, a number of court cases and indeed the whole range of human behavior." If someone wants to leave and authorities don't think he is ready, his family is "tipped off," and in some instances, some such patients have been committed to state institutions by the families. But Dr. Cameron declared that anyone is free to leave. In advocating further tests by hospitals to see how far such a system can be extended, he said it is obvious that a "frankly homicidal" patient, for example should not be free to come and go.

Report Britain Prepared To Relax Trade With Red China

LONDON (Reuters)—Britain is prepared to act on her own to relax trade embargoes with Communist China, an informed source said Friday. This new British attitude will be presented by Prime Minister Eden to President Eisenhower at next week's talks in Washington, the source said. Eden once again will ask the United States to approve a joint lifting of the current ban imposed by Western countries on export of strategic materials. He will vigorously press the British view that, nearly three years after the end of the Korean War, it is highly unrealistic to continue to ban the export to China of goods which the West permits to go to Russia and European Communist states. The source said that a U.S. refusal to relax the embargoes would "almost certainly" mean that Britain will act on her own to relax the economic squeeze that the ban has imposed on certain British Commonwealth countries. Britain has been influenced in this firmer attitude by Malaysia which has suffered greatly from the loss of rubber exports to Communist China. Before the ban, Malaysia exported 30,000 tons a year to China. Ceylon, another Commonwealth rubber exporter, already has broken away from the embargo and is sending rubber to China. The British government also is extremely worried about the adverse effect of the present embargoes on the economy of Hong Kong whose balance of trade with China showed a deficit of more than \$33,000,000 last year. Although determined to relax the embargoes, Britain has provided the increased Commonwealth trade with the Chinese mainland will include no goods which China cannot now obtain via Communist Europe. Britain's arguments in favor of greater trade are not wholly economic. The government here believes that the longer the West maintains a rigid "anti" attitude to Communist China, the more sympathy the Peiping regime will receive from uncommitted countries, especially those in Southeast Asia.

Credit Union Savings Report

TORONTO (CP) - Savings in Canadian credit unions may double during the next 10 years to \$1,500,000,000, the Credit Union National Association predicted Friday. The association, in a brief to the Gordon economic commission, estimated also that union membership, including La Caisse Populaire of Quebec, may increase by 500,000 to 2,500,000 and that loans from the organizations may grow to \$700,000,000 a year from \$670,000,000. The growth may make possible savings of \$5,000,000 a year through low-interest rates, the association said.
