DOMINION POLITICS.

Hot Work in Afghanistan.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, March 29.

Lady Tilley will give a dancing party on Wednesday evening.

The Banking sub-committee, in their interview with Sir Leonard, have discussed the various amendments proposed by them, viz., in future existing Banks to issue no notes under five dollars. New Banks will not be allowed to issue notes, except on security of Government bonds dollar for dollar. If Bank stops, bill holders to be paid first. There is no doubt that when the Banking Act comes before the Committee on Banking, a sharp lookout will be had by those who favor a national currency. They are opposed to tying up the question by giving banks extended rights as to circulation, or by giving them charters of long duration. The probability is that the time will be limited to ten years, and that the Government will take to itself large powers of issuing Dominion notes.

The scheme for consolidation of the Western Counties and Windsor Railways contemplates a Dominion guarantee of interest.

Mr. Noble to-day made a number of tests in Canadian and American oils, before the Minister of Inland Revenue and others. He explained that it was the presence of gasoline that caused explosions; that there was no gasoline in Canadian oils, and that the actual difference in the fire test between the two articles is ten degrees. The Minister is giving his best attention to the subject in order that the coal oil question may be settled satisfactorily to the Maritime Provinces.

LAHORE, March 29.

Fort Baltic, situated beyond Gundamuk, was attacked on last Friday and a Lieut. and 12 men were killed and 19 sepoy wounded. The enemy were repulsed.

CABUL, March 29.

The British Commission, at an interview with the Chief Sirdar, said there would be no permanent annexation and no restoration of the ex-Ameer. Afghanistan would be separated into its old constituent provinces and the Government would be guided solely by the wishes of the people regarding a ruler.

JELLALHABAD, March 29.

A large body of men are reported preparing rafts to cross the Cabul river to raid on the British outposts, and a force has been sent to disperse them.

The Hazara have defeated Mahomed Jan; the latter's loss was 70 killed, including his brother.

It is believed that Jan will yet attack the British line of communication, avoiding Shirpur on account of its strength.
